Message from the University Librarian

On Sept. 28, 1965, California State College, San Bernardino opened its doors to 293 students, 29 faculty -- and 320 parking spaces. The library collection numbered 50,000 volumes and was housed in what is now Sierra Hall.

This year the John M. Pfau Library celebrates the university's 40th anniversary with the addition of its 750,000th volume, *The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway System Map, 1929*. It is dedicated to the memory of Art Nelson, who served as university librarian from 1963 to 1988.

Art Nelson is remembered with fondness and respect. Among the very first staff members hired by President John Pfau, Art served for 28 years, retiring in 1991. He established the initial 50,000-volume collection and library facility that opened to students in 1965. He planned the six-story building located at the exact center of the campus that opened in 1971. A consummate bookman, Art championed quality services. An avid, ardent train collector, Art's interest and intellectual pursuits were many and varied.



Michael Burgess Retires

When Michael Burgess was first employed as a librarian at the California State College, San Bernardino in September 1970, he was 22 years old and the youngest faculty member ever hired on campus.

At the time, the library was housed in the southern half of Sierra Hall and served a community of only 2,300 students. After 35 years of faithful

service to the library, Michael retired on Sept. 14 with his record as youngest faculty ever hired intact and having witnessed tremendous growth of the library, campus, and surrounding community.

Prior to arriving at the university, Michael had completed his undergraduate degree from Gonzaga University and a master of library science from the University of Southern California.

His initial job title was periodicals librarian, but in the early years of his career he was a jack-of-all-trades, dabbling in reference, cataloging, and collection development as well. In 1981 he was appointed chief cataloger and achieved the designation of full librarian three years later.

Starting in 1994, he was head of technical services and head of collection development for nearly a decade. However, a life-threatening heart attack in the summer of 2003 forced Michael to scale back his workload. After recovering and returning to his duties he served as head of collection development until the summer of 2005.

Outside of the library, Michael's accomplishments as a writer and publisher contributed to his successful academic career. Michael authored his first book in 1970 and has since authored or edited 107 books, edited three magazines, and written 20 short stories. His literary endeavors include works of fiction, history, genealogy, and several reference books.

Most of his fiction was written under his pseudonym, Robert Reginald, including two recent modern adaptations of H.G. Wells' *War of the Worlds*. In 1975, he started his own publishing company, Borgo Press, a venture he and his wife, Mary, carried on until 1999 and through which they oversaw the publishing

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DATABASE ADDITIONS AND UPDATES: BIOLOGICAL ABSTRACTS ON BOARD FOR FALL

We are extremely pleased to be able to offer the premier literature index for biological sciences, *Biological Abstracts with BIOSIS Previews*. The *Biological Abstracts* subscription offers indexing from 2001 to the present. The Pfau Library was able to purchase an additional five years of back file data, so our subscription includes indexing of biology literature from 1997 to the present. We hope to purchase further segments of the back file as funding becomes available. Access began Sept. 1st and has been funded centrally for all CSUs, thanks to the efforts of the system's SEIR office and the CSU Council of Library Directors. This new subscription replaces the far less comprehensive *BasicBIOSIS* database.

Three major research databases, *PsycINFO* (psychology), *MLA Bibliography* (language/literature), and *CINAHL* (nursing), have different interfaces this fall. All migrated from the old SilverPlatter platform to the EBSCOhost platform, which is familiar to many CSUSB library users as the front end to our most frequently used database, *Academic Search Premier*. Experienced researchers should check the "Advanced Search" tab for any special search options they need. *PsycARTICLES*, the collection of full-text journals published by the American Psychological Association, also has a new platform, on ProQuest.

The collection of Dekker-published journals is no longer available as a distinct searchable database, because Dekker merged with a larger publisher. However, we still have full-text access to all Dekker titles, which can be found in via our Online Journals List or via the "Search for Full Text" button during a database search.

The Book and Beyond, Part II: Remembrance of Things Past

I remember it was Jan. 2, 1971 when I drove in from Riverside for my first day. It was very cold, perhaps 42 degrees and the wind was blowing at what seemed to be 122 mph. I remember thinking, "No one told me about the wind." -- Johnnie Ann Ralph, university librarian

For my interview in 1994, I had been told to pick up a parking pass from the parking booth in front of campus. I was so impressed that the friendly person on duty immediately recognized my name and knew what I was here for. I went to the bookstore to pick up free information on rentals in the area. Right up front was Chewie, the bookstore cat, sleeping on a pile of books. He enthusiastically purred when I stopped to pet him. "This must be a great place to work," I thought. When I joined the library over 30 years ago, there were no computers. Information was typed on 3 x 5-inch cards under author title, subject, or call number. Students had to look up the appropriate cards to find the books on the shelves. The library had fewer books and fewer people on campus, but everyone was friendly and you recognized most people you encountered in the library and on campus. -- Maisie Conceicao, head of monograph cataloging

When I arrived for my interview, one of the first things I was given, along with my packet of information, was a bottle of water. To me, that was really unusual. I remember thinking, "I must be in the desert; if they want to be hospitable, they offer you your own water supply." I also remember thinking how great it would be to live where you could see mountains every day. I'm from the prairies, so mountains were a big novelty to me. 
