

Alumni Gift

The CSUSB Alumni Association has made a contribution of \$2500 to the John M. Pfau Book Endowment in appreciation for the library's many years of support and service. This represents a gift of \$75 for each of the years that the library has extended borrowing privileges to members of the Alumni Association.

The John M. Pfau Book Endowment was established in September 2000, on occasion of the Library's 35th anniversary and in honor of CSUSB's founding president. Gifts to the John M. The Crisis in Scientific Journal Publishing: Consortial Agreements Give Some Relief

For years, academic and research libraries have been in the throes of a "serials crisis." This crisis results from the fact that the cost of scientific journals has increased at an annual rate far greater than the rate of inflation. A few statistics give an idea of the magnitude of the problem. According to the Association of Research Libraries, the price of an average chemistry or physics journal in 1963 was \$16 per title, but by 1996 the price had increased to \$867. Libraries spent 142 percent more for journals in 1998-99 than ten years previously, but bought 6 percent fewer journal titles. This relentless pressure has squeezed library budgets, forcing libraries to either cut scientific journal subscriptions, or shift money away from book and other library purchases that benefit other disciplines. Most academic libraries have pursued both strategies, with the result that scientific journal costs consume a larger and larger proportion of the library budget. To give a California example, about 50 percent of the UC Libraries' total library materials budget now goes to scientific journals.

Meanwhile, the rapid development of information technology and the popularity of the Internet have attracted more and more publishers into electronic scholarly publishing, and the number of scientific journals available in electronic form has grown steadily. Some of these electronic serials are traditional paper journals made available in digital format. Others have no equivalent. The 1997 edition of the *ARL Directory of Scholarly Electronic Journals* contained 3,400 titles, including only 1,049 peer-reviewed journals. The current *Directory* contains more than 3,900 peer-reviewed titles. With the growth of electronic publishing, electronic journals have become an integral part of the journal collections of academic libraries.

Like other academic libraries, the John M. Pfau Library has seen its library materials budget eaten away by spiraling scientific journal costs. Nevertheless, Pfau Library subscribes to a growing list of journal, magazine, and newspaper titles online, currently about 10,500 total. Pfau Library's ability to make a growing body of electronic resources, including e-journals, available to the campus has depended upon its participation in the CSU system-wide consortium. The CSU Electronic Access to Resources Committee (EAR) has established many successful CSU consortium contracts and has brought the California Community College system into the consortium, thereby further increasing collective purchasing power.

The Crisis in Scientific Journal Publishing: Consortial Agreements Give Some Relief

Pfau Library is pleased to be able to offer the following new journal collections to the campus community:

SCIENCE @ DIRECT®
Science Direct

Science Direct, published by Elsevier Science, AICHE (American Institute of Chemical Engineers), CRC Press and ASM International provides access to the full-text of more than **1100 key scientific, medical and technical journals** back to 1995. The subject coverage includes chemistry, materials science, engineering and technology, environmental science, economics, business and management science, neurosciences, pharmacology and toxicology, physics, mathematics and computer science, earth sciences, social sciences, biochemistry, microbiology and immunology, biological sciences and clinical medicine. It also provides access to over 1.7 million abstracts from core journals in the life, physical, technical and social sciences. Science Direct journal articles can be displayed in PDF and HTML formats with clickable graphics.

WILEY
InterScience®
Wiley InterScience

The Wiley collection provides full-text access to 400 scientific, technical, medical and professional journals published by John Wiley & Sons. The coverage is back to 1996. Full-text articles are in PDF and HTML formats. The user can create a personal home page to keep automated search procedures and store favorite journals, articles and search criteria. The illustrations, art, tables and charts are fully integrated with the text. Disciplines in both the natural and social sciences are included: business, finance & management, chemistry, computer science, earth science, education, engineering, law, life and medical sciences, mathematics and statistics, physics and psychology.

ACS (The American Chemical Society's Publications)

ACS provides full-text access to 26 journals from the American Chemical Society with coverage back to January 1996. Full-text formats include HTML and PDF. The images (illustrations, halftones,

structures, figures) are available. A new feature, called "Articles ASAP" offers users the ability to view individual articles two to 11 weeks prior to their publication in print.

IDEAL® IDEAL
Academic Press' IDEAL database, although not new to CSUSB, is also an important source of electronic scientific journals. It provides access to 288 full-text journals back to 1993 in the biomedical sciences, economics, business, law, finance, engineering and material sciences, life sciences, mathematics and computer science, physical and environmental science, psychology and social sciences.

"ASK-A-LIBRARIAN" TO THE RESCUE!

Have you ever had trouble doing research at home and couldn't find anyone to help you? Ask-a-Librarian is the new e-mail reference service offered by the Library. It's free, anyone can use it, and it's easy: e-mail your question to Ask-a-Librarian, and a reference librarian will e-mail a response to you by 5 p.m. the next business day. (This service is not available on weekends or holidays.)

We are not a research service, but rather we provide assistance and instruction so that you can successfully complete your own research. We'll answer brief factual questions, guide you to sources that may have the answer you need, or suggest search strategies for the Library's databases and other reference materials. For complex questions, we ask that you go to the Reference Desk: a face-to-face discussion with a librarian is the most efficient way to get help with in-depth research.

Ask-a-Librarian operates Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. We welcome research questions from students, faculty, staff, and community members.
