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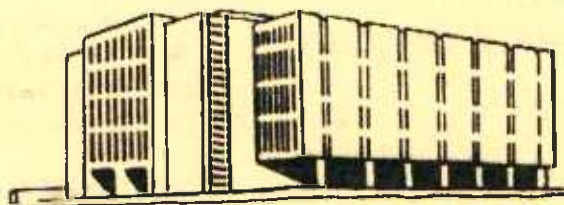

CLARK MAYO NAMED ENGLISH CHAIR

Dr. Clark Mayo has been appointed English Department Chair for the 1981-82, 1982-83 and 1983-84 academic years. Dr. Mayo joined the college in 1967. He currently serves as professor of English.

Dr. Mayo holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Brown University, a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary and Master of Arts and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Chicago. His major was religion and literature.

Prior to joining CSCSB, Dr. Mayo served as a teaching assistant and, later, as dean of students at the University of Chicago. His wife, Brenda, is a 1969 graduate of CSCSB who teaches the educationally handicapped.

CSCSB TO HOST HEALTH FAIR

While registration goes on inside the Physical Education Building Wednesday and Thursday, a Health Fair will be in progress outside. The Health Fair will give faculty, staff and students a chance to have health professionals evaluate a long list of bodily functions at little or no cost, and to see demonstrations on health subjects.

Among the tests which will be performed for anyone who stops by are a height/weight evaluation, blood pressure, hearing, vision, anemia, pulmonary function, reflexes, dental screening and skin fold (body fat). The only test for which there is a charge is a blood chemistry evaluation, which will cost \$6.50. When given by a private physician, the same test would cost as much as \$100.

One of the tests which has implications for the future direction of medicine is a computer-generated health risk appraisal. This program evaluates the subject's chances of developing certain diseases based on the subject's lifestyle. Factors like cigarette and alcohol consumption, dietary habits, physical activity and many others are fed into the computer, which then feeds back information on likely health risks in the near or distant future.

The Health Fair is sponsored by the Health Science and Human Ecology Department with financial and other assistance from the National Health Screening Council and the American Red Cross, as well as the Nursing Department and the Physical Education and Recreation Department. Faculty members involved are Dr. Larry Cappel, who originated the program, Dr. David Null and Dr. Cynthia Paxton (all Health Science and Human Ecology). In addition, students Patty Boris, Jan Moran, Patricia Sullivan and Cindy Rosen played key roles in organizing the program.
