MR. BROWN RECEIVES NATIONAL PEACETIME AWARD

Col. Herbert E. Brown (ret.), the Director of the Physical Plant here at San Bernardino State College, has been awarded the Legion of Merit Award, the nation's second highest peacetime award.

President Johnson, under authorization of Congress, awarded the medal to Col. Brown for "exceptional meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services" to the U.S. Corps of Engineers. The award was presented to Col. Brown by General Stell of the U.S. Army in President Pfau's office with about fifteen guests attending. With the presentation of the medal a citation was read which reviewed Col. Brown's illustrious career in the Corps of Engineers. The Administration, Faculty, and the Student Body are proud to have Col. Brown a part of San Bernardino State College and wish to congratulate him.

The 1966-67 International Programs will send students to Aix-Marseille, France; Berlin and Heidelberg, Germany; Florence, Italy; Tokyo, Japan; Granada and Madrid, Spain; Stockholm and Uppsala, Sweden; and Taiwan, Republic of China. Students who are eligible must be of upper division or of graduate standing and have a B average.

STUDENT HEALTH INSURANCE

All students enrolled in two regular courses are entitled to the benefits of a basic health and accident policy, which is in effect during the college year. Benefits of the policy include: limited ambulance service, emergency care at any medical facility, limited x-ray or lab work, and care and treatment normally administered at a physician's office which will be rendered at the Student Health Center. However, the health and accident policy is not applicable to treatment received from any source other than the Student Health Center unless the case is an emergency. Students are eligible to purchase medical-hospital insurance that provides much broader coverage than the basic plan. For additional information consult the Dean of Students. Those students requiring medical attention should report to the Student Health Center.

AEROSPACE LIBRARY NOW OPEN TO STUDENTS

The facilities and services of the Technical Library at Aerospace Corporation, 1111 E. Mill Street, San Bernardino, will continue to be open to students and teachers of the State College on Wednesday evenings throughout the school year. Dr. Ernst H. Krause, vice president and general manager of the company's San Bernardino operation invited students and faculty members in the San Bernardino area to use the library as a supplemental source for research material in science, engineering and mathematics. The library contains: technical books on physical and applied sciences, a reference collection including chemistry, physics, electronics and engineering handbooks, abstracts and indexes including Chemical Abstracts, Science Abstracts, and indexes to unclassified Federal Research and Development reports, some 330 different technical journals. In all, it contains 50,000 books, documents, and periodicals in an atmosphere conducive to research. The library is open on Wednesdays from 4:45 to 8:45 p.m.
