Message from the Dean

The Pfau Library Team and I have accomplished significant goals during my first quarter at CSUSB. We improved internal communication by establishing regular meetings with librarians and staff and creating an intranet. We established a liaison program designed to improve communication and interaction with faculty and students. This program will result in improved marketing, collection development, and library instruction/information literacy.

Recently, the Space Planning Committee (ad hoc) completed plans to “open up and make the entry level of the library more inviting to our users.” The newly formed Library Information Technology Council (LITC) has been busy making improvements to the library’s information technology infrastructure. We have updated and replaced obsolete computers used by the public and the staff.

In order to continue to improve our collections, we have established a decentralized collection development model that involves all librarians in the process of selecting new materials for library collections with the input from college faculty. In support of the Ed.D program in educational leadership, the library is providing access to *Dissertations and Theses: Humanities and Social Sciences*, which is now available online. We are also making great strides in updating the curriculum collection.

Our customers should also see improvements. We have automated the process of updating our patrons’ records, which provide access to our services. And we have enabled our automated library system to send a courtesy notice to patrons whose materials may soon be overdue, helping them to avoid incurring overdue fines.

Finally, we have just launched a speakers series designed to attract more students, faculty, and staff to the library, and to contribute to the intellectual life of the campus.

Now Available:

Dissertations and Theses: Humanities and Social Sciences

In early December, CSUSB gained access to an important new online resource, *Dissertations and Theses: Humanities and Social Sciences*, from the ProQuest company. One section of the well-known *Dissertation Abstracts International* index, this database covers more than 1 million dissertations and theses in the areas of the humanities and social sciences. Full text is available for most dissertations from 1997-present, with some full text as far back as the 1980s. Although it is best known for its comprehensive coverage of doctoral dissertations, the database also includes a significant number of master’s theses, including some from our sister CSU campuses.

Access to this resource is funded centrally for the entire CSU system, at the recommendation of the CSU Council of Library Directors (COLD), in order to support the system’s new Ed.D. program in educational leadership. CSUSB is in the first wave of campuses implementing this new degree program.

Because of its broad subject coverage, *Dissertations & Theses* has many applications beyond the field of education. Students and faculty seeking research in fields such as art, music, theater, literature, linguistics, communication studies, social work, psychology, history, business and public administration will find much to interest them. World languages are also represented, with many theses in Spanish, French, and German. The instant availability of most recent dissertations brings a whole new set of resources to the user’s desktop. We are pleased to offer this excellent research tool to the CSUSB community.

Focus on the Staff: The Circulation/Reserve Desk

Though the circulation/reserve desk is a very visible and active place in the library, it is easy for the unwitting visitor to take it for granted, to imagine there is little more to the job than checking books in and out of the library.

But this team of six staff members has many more responsibilities. John, the supervisor, collects circulation and movement statistics, which make their way into Dean Caballero's reports to the chancellor. Sylvia, in charge of reserves, scans articles, book chapters and other materials into the e-reserve system so they are available to students. If something is overdue, Carol sends out overdue notices and places holds.

When you can't find a book on the shelf, report it to circulation and Julie will search for it and notify you when she finds it. When you browse the new books' shelves you are looking at Rosemary's handiwork. And together, they all collect money for late, damaged and over-due items; troubleshoot the photocopiers when they need toner or paper; and provide refunds when irresolvable problems arise with technology. And, yes, they do check materials in and out for users.

This team has over 100 years of experience serving the public, and most say they enjoy the opportunity to help others. They appreciate the sense of the community at Cal. State San Bernardino, experiencing a cross-section of the on-campus population. Public service can be a tough job, so next time you stop at the circulation/reserve desk, give them a smile. They deserve it. 🐾

Buying Books at the Pfau Library

Librarians call it collection development. It includes all the purchases we make in support of our users. Starting this fall, the Pfau Library made a dramatic change in how we do our collection development. Previously, the library favored a centralized model, with Michael Burgess purchasing for the entire library. When he took early retirement, Johnnie Ralph undertook the responsibility. Dean Caballero has developed a more distributed model, with all librarians sharing the responsibility.

Each college has been assigned a library liaison who communicates with that college about library services, conveys the college's concerns to the dean, accepts requests for purchase from the faculty, and makes purchases in support of the program. At this time, these materials do not include journals or databases, but only books, audio, or video materials.

The benefits of the new model include greater subject knowledge on the part of the librarians and greater service to the college. If your college or department is going up for accreditation, your liaison can help with the library portion of the documentation. The liaison can send out new book lists, offer training in advanced database techniques, and provide tutorials to new faculty. Call your departmental/college liaison for more information.

Improved Access to Online Resources

In the Pfau Library we are constantly trying to find new and better ways to use and improve technology to provide better services for our students, faculty, and staff, as well as people who walk in to use the library. For example, the online databases that we provide to our users continue to grow in popularity. Since 1999, when we first began to keep statistics on their use, we have found that their use has grown over 20 times what it was in 1999 compared with 2007.

Since we recognize the convenience of using these resources from the comfort of your home or away from campus, we want to make sure that access to them continues to be as easy as possible for users. This February, we upgraded the electrical and network support to the machines that provide these online resources so that even during a scheduled university power outage, or times when the network on campus is very busy, our users will still be able to reach our online services.

Bonnie Petry celebrates 15 years of services as of August 2007.

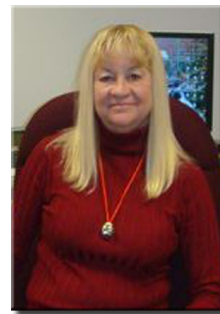

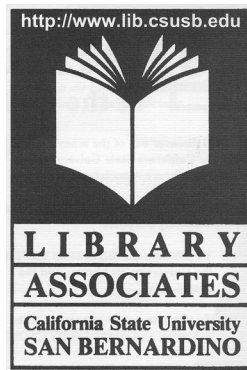
