ASB Elections Near

This week marked the beginning of the frenzy that will eventually end on Monday April 24th, the date of this year's ASB elections. Hopeful candidates began circulating petitions early last week, and they must be turned in to the Election Committee by Tuesday, April 3rd. Each candidate must secure 25 names on his petition. The signees must be a current member of the Associated Student Body of Cal-State San Bernardino. The Election Committee will review the petitions Wednesday April 4th to determine the legality of the documents and to establish the eligibility of the candidates.

Candidates for office must be full time students, and possess a 2.0 cumulative grade point average at the time of election and maintain at least that average for the full term of the office, according to the ASB Elections Code. The Elections Committee will post a list of the qualified candidates on Friday, April 6th.

On Monday, April 10th, the campus will break out in the peculiar array of election posters that mark every campus election. The banners are likely to be found anywhere on campus, for this is the only time that such advertising is allowed to overflow the campus bulletin boards. The only exception to this is the college cafeteria and the administration building which are out of bounds for election posters.

The various candidates will have their chance to voice their respective programs on Monday, April 17th. The campaign speeches will be held in the cafeteria patio at 11:30 am. Office-seekers will then have one week to wind up their campaigns before the elections are held on Monday, April 24th.

Petitions for the offices of ASB president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and judicial representative, may still be picked up either in L 112 or A 148.

One month from now students of the California State College at San Bernardino will vote for an ASB president for the 1967-1968 academic year. The successful candidate will assume the responsibilities of student government in a college of approximately one thousand students, and he will operate with a budget of some twenty thousand dollars.

Next year's ASB president will be required to meet the demands of a student body dissatisfied with many aspects of campus life. Senior Comprehensives, the bookstore and cafeteria, the lack of competitive sports, and the dull social life head a large list of problems which student government has not yet been able to handle.

As an active participant in the formation of student government on this campus, Inter-Club President, and AS Judicial Representative, I have had the opportunity to become familiar with the structure of student government and with the problems which face us. I believe that experienced leadership with the backing of the student body can solve these problems. With this as the projected role of student government, I announce my intention to campaign for the office of ASB President.

I will conduct a vigorous campaign based upon a platform calling for: (1) a faculty review board, (2) transformation of available ASB rooms in the new buildings into a temporary student union, (3) limited intercollegiate athletics, and (4) a student-owned bookstore. All of these goals are obtainable and each of them have been reached in at least one of the other state colleges.

I challenge all candidates to discuss and debate these issues. I welcome all suggestions and support from the student body.
