Message from the University Librarian

Welcome to the Pfau Library for the 2006-2007 academic year, our 41st year of service. We hope the library's resources and services will help make your studying a successful, enjoyable experience. Please take time to become acquainted with your library resources and services ... look around (there have been collection relocations) ... look online (OLLIE has been revised) ... and ask for assistance if you have questions.

We are extremely pleased to have received funding for a new integrated library system. In spring 2007 the Pfau Library will implement the Millennium Library Automation system developed by Innovative Interfaces. This is the system currently in operation in 14 California State University libraries, with three new CSU installations scheduled in 2006-2007. A great deal of planning and work is needed to transition to this new system, but the results will make the efforts well worth it. You, the user, will enjoy improved access and new services.

On a personal note, I plan to retire in December. The mosaic of my professional career has been created solely at Cal. State San Bernardino. My first and only professional job began here Jan. 2, 1971 – a really windy day! I feel fortunate to have participated in the growth of our library and campus. Beyond Horizon to a new Millennium:

A New Catalog for the Library

Tentative planning for the new catalog began nearly two years ago with a committee report on the need and feasibility of a new catalog. Comments from librarians, faculty, staff members, and students indicated that the Horizon catalog had serious limitations. Vendor demonstrations and drafting of a request for proposals followed. The RFP was sent to three library system vendors in January, and by the spring, Innovative's Millennium system was chosen as the superior product to replace the decade-old Horizon.

Millennium will provide superior service that will coordinate with campus- and system-wide computing initiatives. It is the system of choice at 14 out of 23 of the CSU campuses. Millennium will make the new catalog more user-friendly because it allows for greater customization, so you can expect easier-to-understand search screen, result screens, and record displays. The preferred searches feature will allow users to save frequently-used searches to their account. These searches will run periodically and the results can be e-mailed, alerting users to new books by a favorite author or on a specific subject. Librarians and library staff members look forward to when ordering new library materials will be automated and integrated with the library catalog using the Millennium system.

Staff training has just started for the new catalog and will include four on-site visits between now and March. In addition to training, library staff will be spending time this fall evaluating and customizing the new catalog database. The library plans on having its bibliographic records cleaned-up before importing them into the new "live" catalog spring 2007.

Over the summer, the Pfau Library purchased a new Minolta digital microform scanner for use with our vast microform collection. The state-of-the-art scanner system allows users to view, scan, print, save, or e-mail copies of documents that have been preserved on microfilm and microfiche. Printing costs 11 cents per page, and e-mailing is free! The system is very easy to use, making microform research pleasant and hassle-free.

For those who wish to take advantage of all of the scanner's features, there is a concise instruction booklet available. The scanner is located on the first floor in PL-III. Stop by and try it out. An interesting trial run would be to scan the front page of *The New York Times* from the date of your birth and then e-mail it to yourself. San Manuel Donates \$30,000 for Native American Books

In February 2005, the campus-led Inland California Television Network (ICTN) project faded to black. A cheerless moment for the campus indeed, but one that held a silver lining for the Pfau Library book collection. The Board of Directors of the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians generously voted to reallocate \$30,000 of its ICTN donations toward funding the library's purchase of books on Native American sovereignty issues. With these new funds the library procured more than 400 items, only a portion of which could have been purchased without the gift. The new books, coupled with the library's existing holdings, give the campus a near comprehensive collection of Native American sovereignty works published in the past decade and longer. The donation was substantial enough that the library was able to purchase more than just sovereignty-related books. The remaining funds were used for materials on Native American art, culture, history, law, literature, and other topics, especially those focusing on California and other western states.

The new works include reference sets, microfilm of historical records of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, as well as a multitude of books that will circulate to campus patrons. Highlights include: Indian Claims Commission Decisions (43 vols. covering 1948-1978), Native Americans and the Law (6 vols.), and The Native American Reference Collection: Documents Collected by the Office of Indian Affairs (more than 75 reels of microfilm covering 1840-1948).

Database Developments

For the past academic year, CSUSB has had access to *Biological Abstracts* with coverage from 1992 to the present. *Biological Abstracts*, produced by BIOSIS, is the most comprehensive index to the published research literature of the biological sciences. Starting in July, thanks to a systemwide CSU purchase funded by the Chancellor's Office and approved by the CSU Council of Library Directors, we now have access to the complete back file of *Biological Abstracts*, covering the years 1969 to the present. This increased access to a core scientific index represents a major addition to the library's collection of online research tools.

While the library has had access to *Safari Tech Books Online*, thanks to another system-wide CSU upgrade, we now have access to the full collection of Safari's online computer books; formerly, we had access to only select titles. The Safari collection offers well-known computer handbooks from publishers such as O'Reilly, Sams, Cisco Press, and New Riders.

Education Index Retrospective is a historical index to education periodicals covering 1929 to 1983. As an archival file, Education Index Retrospective will never have new content added, so it could be purchased with one-time funds from the College of Education. This database should prove very useful in support of the new education doctoral degree.

Similar to Ed. Index Retro., Reader's Guide Retrospective is a historical archive of the well-known Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature, which indexes popular magazines of the United States. We continue to have the current version of Reader's Guide as part of the Wilson OmniFile database, but the retrospective version covers 1890-1982. Reader's Guide Retro. will make historical research into the events of the 20th century simpler and faster, and because it will never have new content added, it too could be purchased with one-time funds.

Mental Measurements Yearbook and Philosopher's Index have changed search interfaces. We are pleased to be able to move these products onto platforms that are more user-friendly and more accessible to screen-readers for users with visual disabilities.
