The purpose of the meeting is to provide faculty members basic information concerning the AFT petition requesting the Trustees of CSC to hold an election to select an exclusive collective bargaining agent for the faculties of the California State Colleges. All members are urged to attend.

DR. DENNIS IKENBERRY SELECTED FOR NSF RESEARCH PROJECT

Dr. Dennis Ikenberry, assistant professor in Physics, has been named a participant in a National Science Foundation Research project for this summer at Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio.

Dr. Ikenberry will be working with Dr. Joseph Weinberg of Western Reserve in the field of Bio-physics.

NEW PRESIDENT FOR CHICO STATE COLLEGE

Dr. Robert E. Hill, 40, dean of the School of Business at Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, Illinois has been appointed President of Chico State College.

Hill will succeed Dr. Glenn Kendall, president for the past 16 years who is retiring July 31.

The appointment by the California State College Board of Trustees was announced by Chancellor Glenn S. Dumke who said Hill will provide "imaginative leadership" for the college. Dumke also paid tribute to retiring President Kendall.

The newly appointed college president, a 1954 graduate of Illinois Wesleyan University, received his Ph.D. in finance from the University of Alabama.

He joined the Southern Illinois University faculty last September, where he is also professor of economics, after 5 years at Kent State University (Ohio) where he was dean of the College of Business Administration.

Hill will be the 12th president of the college in its 79-year history. His appointment was recommended by Chancellor Dumke following conferences with a Chico State faculty-elected advisory committee.
