## Another Atlanta Child Victim

Atlanta authorities found the body of a young black and tentatively called it the 26th victim of a 21 month string of child slayings. The corpse was discovered in the Chattahoochee River, where two previous victims were found.

## Boston Schools

A Boston judge ordered schools to remain open even though money ran out. The order came after last-minute talks between the mayor and city council failed to resolve their difference on funding. The schools need about \$30 million more to stay open for the rest of the year.

## AFL-CIO Reaffiliation

The UAW's plan to reaffiliate with the AFL-CIO was approved almost 2-1 by the 3,000 delegates to the UAW's triennial convention. The union said it should finish working out details this summer.

## Working Mothers

WORKING MOTHERS in New York State's tax department can take unpaid leaves again this summer; 125 are expected to. In 1980, 50 employees took the summer off, mainly to be with their children. That saved the state \$95,251 in wages and fringe benefits. It spent \$48,311 on temporary help who performed "reasonable" well.

## Legislators to Hold Townhall Meeting

Congressman George E. Brown, Jr. (D-Riverside) will hold a townhall meeting on "Crime and Violence" at the San Bernardino Convention Center on May 1, 1981 from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Joining Congressman Brown at the townhall meeting will be: State Senator Robert Presley, Assemblyman Terry Goggin, San Bernardino County District Attorney Dennis Kottmeier, Riverside Police Department Deputy Chief Sonny Richardson, San Bernardino Police Captain Ben Gonzales, and San Bernardino Sheriff's Department Inspector Chuck Follett.

According to Brown, "the senseless increase in crime and violence in the United States, and in the Inland Empire, is perhaps the most serious problem facing our society. And I am interested in hearing views on this important public policy matter."

The meeting will provide residents a forum in which to discuss their views on crime and violence and indicate what government at various levels can or should do in light of the growing incidence of crime.

A number of exhibits will be available to the public providing information on special programs and crime prevention methods.

## Atlanta-Neighbors Alert Program Now Nationwide

Pittsburgh, Pa.—The NAACP National Board of Directors announced the launching of a nationwide child safety program in demonstrating its support for the thousands of parents and youth traumatized by the unsolved child slaying in Atlanta. The Board called attention to the untold amount of suffering and mental anguish endured by children as a result of the widespread publicity in respect to the murdered and missing children in Atlanta.

In a resolution adopted at its quarterly meeting in Pittsburgh, Pa., the Board concluded that the slain children in Atlanta spotlight an even greater tragedy in our cities. NAACP Executive Director Benjamin L. Hooks explained that "Children are being destroyed everyday by drugs, poor education and the lack of jobs. The fact that the victims of the Atlanta tragedy came from low income areas served to focus national attention on the destructive elements in our communities that adversely affect these children. From the ashes and tears of Atlanta, we have renewed our determination to ease the strain and tension that has become so commonplace for young people and parents throughout the nation."

The plan in its initial phase calls for the establishment of five pilot programs in various locations throughout the country. The Atlanta NAACP branch instituted such a program last fall garnering support from area ministers and other concerned citizens. The effort resulted in an extensive safety-oriented program in the city schools and the establishment of youth centers in targeted communities to provide after school enrichment activities.

The Atlanta program which is entitled "Neighbors Alert Against Child Pickup" will serve as a model for the Association's nationwide effort to increase parental responsibility and improve the quality of life for young children in America, according to the President of the Atlanta NAACP Branch, State Senator Julian Bond.

In a forum at the University of Pittsburgh over the weekend, Bond also commented on the widespread community support the City has received. He revealed that over 15,000 psychics, nationwide, have volunteered their theories in trying to solve the case. He went on to say that the police department's special task force reviews an average of 7,000 calls every week from concerned citizens offering tips and leads.

## Warning of Klan Resurgence

As the 1980's continue to unfold before us, Americans can now see a number of popular movements — some good, some bad — shouldering their way to the top. One of the bad ones, indeed, the one perhaps most dangerous to us all, is the resurgence of the Ku Klux Klan.

For over a century the Klan has stood for one thing — the savage, relentless persecution of Blacks, Jews, Asian-Americans, Hispanics and other peoples who advocate equal rights and social equity for all Americans. The nightmare imagery of the Klan has been permanently engraved in U.S. history by its actions: ghostly nightriders, flaming crosses, firebombs, house burning, the brutal beatings and lawless lynchings of innocent citizens.

Some contemporary Klan leaders have attempted to downplay the KKK's violent, bloody past. Disguised in three piece suits, they massage the mass media with hooded rhetoric that cloaks their traditional race-hate theme with religious and patriotic appeals.

Through such hustling tactics a Southern California Klan leader duped both the State Democratic Party and the local voters, winning the party's primary for the 43rd Congressional District. Fortunately, when the man's racist affiliations were publicized after his primary victory, he was repudiated by both the general electorate and a chastened Democratic Party leadership which failed to do its homework. Ignoring partisan lines, the district's voters united behind the Republican candidate who thoroughly trounced the racist.

The Klan has carried its war of hate into many parts of our issue-oriented political system. Playing on legitimate, universal racial issues such as welfare reform, forced busing, and affirmative action, it poisons the social climate. Instead of constructively helping the nation to resolve our racial conflicts, the KKK and its allies seek to make civilized discourse difficult; for if an atmosphere develops which stifles reasonable solutions and compromise, the hate-mongers can leap to center stage, claiming to have seized the fallen banner of order and right.

Nevertheless, such slickly-engineered gains are not enough for some KKK bosses. There is a growing movement within the Klan and many of its Neo-Nazi allies to return to the old tactics, the violence, the blood-letting, the terrorism. In the last few years, such groups, especially the Klan, have been involved or suspected of involvement in a stream of shootings, beatings, and vandalism around the country: Chattanooga, Greensboro, Salt Lake City...

In California an increasingly bold Klan is stepping up its activities. In San Diego last year, a group of armed, uniformed Klansmen battled anti-KKK demonstrators and police after a street rally. In Contra Costa County the recent harassment of several Black families included severe beatings, death threats, sledge-hammers tossed through windows at midnight, crosses burned on front lawns, K-K-K's burned with chemicals in the yard and vehicles smashed through house walls.

Nighttime conclaves complete with spectacular cross-

## Ontario Parents Worried About Expulsions

Black parents in Ontario are worried a great deal about what they see as continuous harassment and discriminatory disciplinary actions towards their students attending Ontario High School.

In an interview with the Black Voice News, one of the concerned parents, Mrs. Bratton accused the school authority of finding every excuse possible to throw black students out of school, even for such minor reasons as sneezing or riding bicycles on the school ground.

This actions by the school, she continued not only disrupts the student's education but also give the student a bad record and in certain instances, makes it very difficult for him/her to be accepted back in the same school or enroll in any other school in the District. "It seems as if the teachers are unable to meet the needs of the blacks to learn," she said.

Although there is no exact number of the students said to have suffered because of the allegations, the Black Voice learned that three brothers David, Robert, and Richard Mann are a few of those students who have had to either find alternate schools or face constant suspension for no clear reasons by the school authority.

It was also learned that David Mann, after serving a six-month term in a juvenile home, was not allowed back to the school, because the authority claimed that he did not have enough credits. It is further understood that, he is now attending school in Valley View, but only as a part-time student. His two brothers are said to be out of school on suspension until further notice, or at least until their mother goes to discuss the situation over with their counselors.

In yet another incident, which involved a black and white student, the black student, Freddy McCoy was thrown out of school while the other student was not. According to reliable information from eye-witness accounts, the white student is said to have attacked the black student with a knife, and the black student defended himself with a cake cutter, but he was suspended.

Mrs. Bratton regretted that such continuous harassment does not help the student in any way, adding that "a teenager at home without his parents and with nothing to do, thinks of nothing but much devilment he can produce."

When contacted on allegations of racial incidents in the school as well as the current situation, the Principal Mr. Alfred Dakin denied that the school is unfair or discriminates against either the blacks or any group of minority students in his school. He said that the school regulations applies to all students alike regardless of race, color etc...

## R.P.D. Accused of Assault on 15 Year Old Male

The Riverside Police Department is about to investigate an allegation of police brutality if Ms. Pat Fuston follows through on her charge.

The disturbance began when her sons 12 and 15 and another 15 year old young man had in their possession some calculators and a backpack. The mother of the second 15 year old called the police. When Pat found out her sons had been somewhat involved in the stolen goods, she was in full cooperation with the police. The two sons turned in the calculators to the officers and the officers began to make the arrest.

The mother explains she was horrified at the sequence of events that followed. She said, "as the officer told him (15 year old son) to wait

a minute, (because he pulled away from him) the officer grabbed him with a flashlight and gave a chokehold. As he did I pleaded, he is an asthmatic... He has a history of asthma, during the process of the choke hold he hit him in the mouth with the flashlight and choked him until he almost passed out, he was slumping to the floor". As the 12 year old saw what was happening he threw a glass at the officer but he (the officer) held his hand up and it bounced off. As they put him in the car they slammed the door on his legs.

One officer, even said I can think of a number of charges to arrest you, you'd better keep quiet about what happened here."

Fuston also said that her house was searched and the

dogs were brought in and officers wouldn't give their badge numbers. The 15 year old son was taken to a Riverside Hospital treated and released.

Sargent Gil Olivaria, spokesman for the police department said "there is a (verbal) allegation of excessive force, and if she (Pat Fuston) follows through with an official complaint an investigation will follow."

Gil Olivaria was asked specifically by the Black Voice Reporter, about the use of dogs and said they were brought there because one suspect escaped, the dogs were brought in to scout him. Apparently he went into the orange groves for they were unable to find him.

Olivaria said that the badge and names of officers

were given to him by Ms. Fuston.


"At present the only area where we think there may be an investigation was in the area of excessive force but a complaint should be made in 30 days" he said. "If a personnel complaint is made we can't discuss it by law, when questioned further he said we will however give results and punishment if any."

When asked why there seems to be so many complaints about the R.P.D. he said, "this will be the second complaint this year, if there is anything going on people should inform us. If there is any abuse we want to know about it."


The last complaint he explained was in Casa Blanca and the officer was reprimanded.



## APRI Memorial Fund Established

Norman Hill, President of the A. Philip Randolph Institute, has announced the establishment of an A. Philip Memorial Fund. According to Hill, the fund will serve to "keep alive the legacy of Mr. Randolph, and to ensure that the organization which bears his name is able to successfully sustain and expand its work in the struggle for social justice."

The Randolph Memorial Fund will seek support for Randolph Institute activities in the areas of black voter participation, community affairs, and trade union involvement. The fund will solicit both individual and organizational support from sponsors who will be awarded Certificates of Participation in return for their financial contributions.

Fundraising activity will focus initially on generating support from the thousands of local international unions, whose members actively participate in the Randolph Institute.

Establishment of the Memorial Fund was officially announced April 15, 1981, on what would have been A. Philip Randolph's 92nd birthday. "We can think of no more appropriate commemoration of Mr. Randolph's birthday than the establishment of a fund which will continue to promote increased black participation in the labor movement," Hill stated.

The A. Philip Randolph Institute, is composed of approximately 18,000 trade unionists organized in over 150 affiliates in 36 states and the District of Columbia. The Institute carries on a trade union intern program which trains blacks to assume leadership positions in the labor movement, publishes a bi-monthly newsletter, organizes leadership seminars, conducts an Occupational Safety and Health Program for black workers, and conducts Voter Participation campaigns in election years.

## High School Proficiency Exams

SACRAMENTO—Persons wishing to take the next California High School Proficiency Examination (CHSPE) must register no later than May 6, 1981, according to the State Department of

Education. The test itself will be held May 30 at approximately 100 sites throughout the state.

To pass the four-hour

exam, a person must have a grasp of the basic skills at least equal to that of the average high school senior, the Department said.

The State Board of Education awards a Certificate of Proficiency, which is equivalent by law to a high school diploma, to those who pass the CHSPE. Persons who are younger than 18 when they pass the exam, however, must have parental permission in order to leave school before regular graduation.

Open to all persons 16 or older, including adults, the exam costs \$10 and is given only three times per year. CHSPE information bulletins, which include sample questions, a list of test sites, an application form and mailing envelope, are available at all high schools and most public library branches.



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## The Passing Of Heroes

But, together, they represented two important strands of black experience. Each in his own way stood for an entire body of black achievement, and as inspiration to countless black people who drew sustenance from the deeds of one and the message of the other.

Both were born into the deepest poverty of the Black South and made their way North to find opportunity and fame.

Howard Thurman made his way in life through the immense spiritual and intellectual resources that marked him as one of the great preachers and thinkers in our history.

He was a poet, a writer, who could construct intricate sentences that dazzled with splendor, yet also conveyed deep truths and philosophical depths. His autobiography, "With Head and Heart," is must reading.

I often play tapes of his sermons and lectures, and they are moving and profound. On one of them, he talks of the meaning of the traditional Negro spirituals and suggests the imagery of the song, Deep River, as reflective of life itself, which begins in so small and confined a sphere and then grows and courses through ever larger spheres.

Howard Thurman's life was like that, from humble beginnings he brought gifts of compassion and spirituality to many millions who drew sustenance from his thoughts and hope from his teachings.

Joe Louis made his way through life in a very different way - his success came from the strength of his body, the power of his punch, the grace of his carriage. He was probably the greatest fighter of our era.

Joe Louis really was a folk hero, in every sense of the

phase. I can remember, as a youngster growing up in an Atlanta housing project, that whenever Joe fought, every - and I mean every - radio in the neighborhood was turned up to hear the blow-by-blow account of yet another Joe Louis victory.

I can recall the tension that would build up in the days before a match. I remember the small bets in the community, and my father's advice never to bet against Notre Dame, The Yankees or Joe Louis.

Joe Louis was victimized by the racism that permeated the America of the thirties and forties. But he bore it all with a dignity that transcended the anger he must have felt. And it was that aloof dignity that endeared him to black people. We looked at him and drew inspiration and courage from the class he showed in the face of racism.

And there was black pride too, in Joe's 1938 first round knockout victory over Max Schmeling, the heavyweight from Hitlerland. It was the U.S. versus Germany; democracy versus totalitarianism; black versus self-proclaimed master race.

Never before or since has a boxing match taken on the freight of world superpower confrontation - and Joe Louis, a proud black man, was seen by blacks and whites alike as the bearer of America's banner. At a time when our home-grown racists were riding high, Joe Louis, made all black people walk taller and prouder.

What a study in contrasts those two men are - Howard Thurman and Joe Louis! Yet each in his own way expressed the great gifts of black people and made the best use of his talents to win not only personal success but to inspire and uplift others.

## Teaching Methodology For The Handicapped Child Part 5

VII. Learning Characteristics

Hyperactivity-Distractibility

Another type of hyperactive child appears in the special class. He is the one who sits quietly in his seat, apparently absorbed in his work. At the end of the period, his lesson is uncompleted. He is judged to be lazy or a daydreamer. This child is attracted by pictures and page numbers in his book, by flaws and marks on the paper, or by any feature of the material which are for the most children additional or irrelevant. If he is to get his work done, he must have nothing to distract him from the job at hand.

VIII. Perseveration

Perseveration

Children with brain injury are among the ones in which the characteristic of perseveration, as a learning and behavior characteristic is usually prominent. Perseveration makes it necessary to do a different kind of teaching than the one ordinarily used. If one uses drill or repetition in setting a learning pattern, perseveration is intensified. No matter what new material is introduced, the child may be unable to shift.

The teacher is normally inclined to insist that a paper is correct before leaving it; whereas, if the child is inclined to perseveration, he will need to have him do something else before he can come back to his errors and correct them. There is probably no characteristic more exasperating than perseveration to the teacher who does not know with what she is dealing.

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## CONSUMER QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

**QUESTION:** How does the average family head decide where to put the family's valuables?

**ANSWER:** Here are some guidelines:

- Keep savings account passbooks in a home safe, since a spouse will need money to live on until insurance benefits and pension or profit-sharing plans are available to her/him.
- Armed forces discharge papers can be kept at home.
- Large amounts of cash should, logically, be kept in a safe deposit box for sheer safety.
- Marketable securities, stocks and bonds, coin and stamp collections and valuable jewelry should be kept in a deposit box.
- Naturalization papers, divorce decrees, passports, birth certificates and tax records belong in a home safe.

**QUESTION:** What are meat tenderizers made of? If they "tenderize" the meat, won't they harm the stomach?

**ANSWER:** The "tenderizer" in meat tenderizer is a natural plant enzyme called papain. Papain is obtained from the papaya fruit. It is generally recognized as safe for use in foods that are subsequently cooked. Papain is readily destroyed by the heat required to cook meat. In the unlikely event that some of the tenderizer were not destroyed by heat, it would be destroyed by gastric juices.

## Assembly Passes Law on Supermarket Scanners

SACRAMENTO—Assemblyman Jim Cramer today voted to require supermarkets with computer scanners to continue listing prices on each individual item sold.

The Upland lawmaker helped pass Assembly Bill 65 by Assemblyman Herschel Rosenthal (D-Los Angeles). The measure has strong backing from California's consumer organizations, senior citizen groups, and labor unions.

"A number of cities and counties have adopted ordinances mandating item pricing, but we need a law that uniformly covers the entire state."

The present system is complicated and confusing. In these days of stretched family budgets, people need all the help they can get to comparison shop and spend their money wisely," Assemblyman Cramer said.

Cramer explained that the "Rosenthal Item Pricing Act" will reinstate a law that was in effect until January 1 of this year.

"The shopper not only needs adequate price information, but protection against errors at the checkout counter as well, I particularly want to single out the California Federation of Women's Clubs for their dedicated work on behalf of this legislation," Cramer said.

The bill now goes to the State Senate for consideration.

burnings and hate-filled speeches are becoming more frequent throughout the state. Klan members have reportedly roughed up Hispanic American citizens along the California-Mexico border. There have been numerous reports that Indo-Chinese refugees and other Asian-Americans have been terrorized. Threats and violence have occurred in Gilroy, Novato, Pinole, Oxnard, Eureka, Stockton and many other California communities.

Obviously, many Klansmen are impatient with the more gradual results achieved by some of their sophisticated brethren. This "re-reversal" of the Klan's image, from relative respectability to lawlessness again, is not solely, however, a function of the Klan's current strength. Much of its success is due to the apathy and indifference of the American people.

Community indifference is the Klan's best friend. People must realize that a special moral obligation rests upon those persons who are not the direct victims of organized hate-group attacks to close ranks with those who are. Only the total unity of all Americans who subscribe to our national ideals of freedom and equality will put an end to the resurgence of the Klan and its allies. And if these hate groups are not halted, no one, Black, Jewish, Asian, Hispanic or White will be safe. No one.

### Cramer Holding Hearings on Victims

ONTARIO - A crime victim, who said her home has been burglarized 14 times and once had a criminal place a gun to her head, told members of a panel of the rights of crime victims and witnesses, that she suffered such trauma as a result of the incidents that she had to see a psychiatrist.

The young woman, who said the intrusion on her person "made me feel like garbage," testified during a hearing called by Assemblyman Jim Cramer, D-Upland, to focus on the needs of persons who are victims and witnesses of crimes.

Cramer, who opened the hearing by stating that in the past criminals have received much more attention from the criminal justice system than victims, has introduced Assembly Bill 685 which increases the maximum fines that can be imposed against criminals to help their victims.

The measure, which has been assigned to the Assembly Criminal Justice Committee, expands the category of people who may be subjected to the fines and also authorizes the courts to order forfeiture of money illegally gained by defendants.

Money from the fines finance the San Bernardino County Victim/Witness Advocacy Program as well as programs in 29 other counties.

Cramer explained to the panel that AB 685 increases the maximum fine from \$500 to \$50,000 for felons. He said the number of crimes have increased significantly and "there are many more people who need help."


