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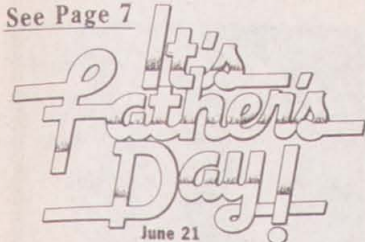

Detroit claimed that many blacks, Hispanics and others were missed in the 1980 headcount.

Ferguson Named Chaffey President

Dr. Samuel A. Ferguson has been named Superintendent-President of Chaffey College and becomes the only Black in the Inland Empire to obtain such status.

Ferguson has been the acting President of Canada Community College in Redwood City, Ca for the past two years, replaces James Catanzaro, who resigned earlier this year to accept the Presidency of Lakeland Community College in Mentor, Ohio.

Ferguson was chosen unanimously out of 82 applicants. Board President Sharon King-Jeffers said, "The board of trustees selected Dr. Ferguson on a unanimous vote, we believe that

he will be the center of stability that this college so sorely needs. He will be an asset to the college and to the district."

Ferguson received a doctorate in general Physiology, with an emphasis in Pharmacology from the University of Pennsylvania in 1961. He earned his Bachelor's degree in Biological Sciences at Oakwood College, Hunsville, Ala. He taught Anatomy and Physiology for the U.S. Medical Corps. He has taught at the University of San Francisco, College of Dentistry, San Francisco and the College of San Mateo.

He is listed in Who's Who in the West and "Who's Who in Black America."

He is married and has five children.

Post Office Announcing Dog Bite Prevention Campaign

As the U.S. Postal Service prepares for delivery during the forthcoming summer months, the public and delivery employees are being encouraged to be especially alert to the potential for animal attacks on public streets or private premises.

Mr. J.O. Starnes, Postmaster, said today that precautionary safety measures taken by the public and delivery employees will aid in the movement of the mail during the vacation period and more importantly, help

reduce employee injuries due to dog bites.

Across the nation, thousands of letter carriers, special delivery messengers and delivery and collection personnel were injured last year mostly during the summer vacation period due to the hazardous condition of unrestrained dogs during delivery hours. During the summer period last year, Riverside carriers alone reported twelve dog bite injuries.

Scouts Shocked At United Way Action

San Geronimo Girl Scout Council is shocked and dismayed at the recent action by United Way of Riverside to cut our allocation from \$34,000 in 1980-81 to \$0 in 1981-82. \$34,000 is a significant amount of money in providing services to Riverside girls. These funds must come from some source. The \$34,000 amount does not

reflect any increases for 1981-82 even though Girl Scouts have 10% more girl membership this year. It also does not consider the inflation factor.

Through the years, as a participating agency in the United Way of Riverside, we have provided loyal support and assistance in the efforts put forth by the United Way

and worked cooperatively with all facets of that endeavor. A point of serious concern, of course, is that since we have been included as a member agency in promotional materials and events, the people of Riverside have supported the United Way in the belief that this support was to be shared by Girl Scouts this

year as in the past. At this time, however, that is untrue.

The Riverside Community has always been very active in Girl Scouting and continues to grow in support as evidenced by the 10% increase in girl membership this year. Through special efforts, including our Community Organization Team, our

Minority Membership increased 12%. Such Girl Scout events as the Riverside Spring Arts Day Camp, Girl Scout Council Birthday Party at UCR, Tot Corral at Tyler Mall (A Christmas Service Gift to the community), the Annual March Up Mt. Rubidoux during Girl Scout Thinking Day and the Brownie Play Day at Lake

Perris provided special program activities for over 1200 Riverside girls.

Girl Scouting is a traditional part of the Riverside community. It is an important Nucleus, offering wholesome activities to Youth that provide viable alternatives to vandalism and build positive self images. Today, more than ever, we need the Girl Scout Program which emphasizes values and concern for others and the environment.

The United Way of Riverside allocation of zero dollars is a tremendous blow to the Girl Scouts and to the community of Riverside. It will necessarily reflect on our ability to serve the growing membership in the Riverside community unless a reversal of the decision should occur. We are confident however, that a review of the situation by the United Way of Riverside Board of Directors will lead to an equitable allocation to Girl Scouts.

Gilchrist Enters Bionic Profession

"Bionics are here now"

"Many people are not aware of our services or how easy it is to obtain prosthetics (artificial limbs) and Orthotics (braces) appliances, to help people ambulate more comfortably and safely," said Jeff Gilchrist a Prosthetist-Orthotist who has passed a 12 week probation period and is now employed by Orthometrics in Riverside, Ca.

Born in Philadelphia, Mississippi and raised in a military family, spent his high school years in the Canal Zone. He is a graduate of Balboa Sr. High, Balboa, Panama Canal Zone. As a youth he lived in Utah, California (San Bernardino), Germany, France and other places. Upon graduation he joined the Army.

All letter carriers and messengers are being encouraged this year to follow safety tips in an effort to reduce the dog bite injury rate.

The Postmaster also noted that delivery service personnel bitten by customer animals are encouraged by the Office of Workers' Compensation Programs (OWCP) under the Federal Employees Compensation Act (FECA, 5 USC 8101 et seq.), to pursue a claim

against the person or party responsible or his/her insurance company. Often such settlements result in damage payments amounting to thousands of dollars.

Effective control of personal pets, however, is the most effective safety precaution a customer can take to ensure his delivery carrier is properly safeguarded against dog bites, the Postmaster said.

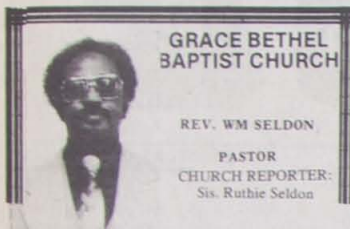
The Prosthetist-Orthotist job is to be a part of the clinical team. "We do the evaluation the Doctor will O.K. it or not," said Jeff.

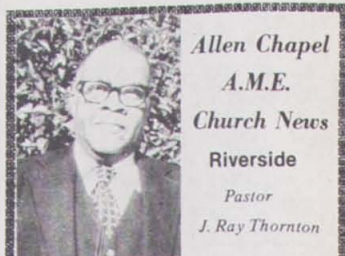

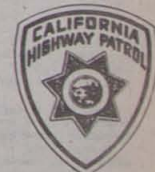

Civil Rights: The Need For A New Approach

It is widely recognized that the struggle to improve the social and economic life of black Americans and poor people in the United States has reached an impasse. While we are fully aware of the impending problems and hardships we face, too little thought has been given to three important questions:

1. What economic changes have occurred in the 1970s and 1980s which require changes in the strategies and tactics used so successfully in the 1960s?
2. Why do we appear to have lost the support of those allies who stood so firmly alongside us in the 1960s?
3. Why do so many of the major objectives and programs we in the civil rights movement earlier espoused appear to have lost support even within the black community: integrated schools and housing, busing, etc.?

To intelligently answer these questions we must ask:

1. To what degree has race declined as the dominant factor in the continuing inequality of the races, and in what areas is this development most apparent?
2. Which problems have not traditionally received significant attention by black leaders, but require their attention today?
3. Can we develop a strategy to deal with the decline in black political participation? This question involves both the role of blacks in the electoral process (political party participation, registration levels, voter participation rates) and the relationship of blacks to such grass roots forces as community groups, business, the trade union movement and the like.

4. Can new approaches to affirmative action be devised which can win the support of a consensus of those groups which comprise the civil rights coalition? Here it would be essential to carefully look at whether a course of action based on economic and class criteria or on ethnic, religious, racial, and sexual criteria should be pursued.

5. An examination of the process by which blacks can achieve further economic and social progress.

6. An assessment of the differences between the social and economic programs of the traditional civil rights organizations and those of the black political leadership, with a view toward creating a common program for the future.

7. The attitudes and relations of American blacks towards refugees and undocumented aliens who are perceived to be in competition with blacks for jobs and social services, and how these attitudes and relations affect the process of coalition building.

8. The role of elevated racial identity as a motivating force towards progress and, simultaneously, the role of race consciousness as an impediment towards the development of effective strategy and tactics.

9. How can the educational process be modified to meet the changing needs of the job market?

10. Can new careers be created to meet the needs of the poor? Can the very nature of work be redefined?

There is a need to bring together the most creative minds in America to explore these questions. Such a group must try to develop a new social policy for the 1980s, founded upon the results of their philosophical, sociological, and intellectual exploration.

This group, or institute, would need to examine both domestic and foreign policy issues which affect minorities, women, and the poor. For instance, it is imperative to recognize that black may lose a vast number of American jobs, not because of discrimination, but because of the shift of labor intensive industry abroad - a fact largely ignored by the black community. There is a clear and urgent need to respond to this and similar developments.

A broad range of very important issues, require from us a serious analysis, and the formulation of new objectives. If we in the civil rights community do not make such an effort, we will continue to hold on to those policies, programs and strategies of the past which demonstrably are failing.

There are serious scholarly studies and informal journalistic reports to back that up.

One such report comes from a surprising source, conservative Fortune Magazine, which in 1978, analyzed one day's want ads in a small town in New York State.

The local paper carried 228 help wanted ads. After eliminating come-ons, commission work, part-time jobs, and business opportunities for people with cash to invest, only 131 ads were for actual full-time jobs within commuting distance.

Over two-thirds of those called for special skills, often for skills that are in short supply everywhere. Trained hospital workers, nurses, technicians, experienced automotive mechanics, and similar skilled workers were advertised for. But few people in those categories are unemployed; that's why those ads run week after week. Other jobs demand educational degrees, licenses, or other requirements that effectively exclude most of the unemployed.

Only one out of five of the advertised jobs were for unskilled workers, and they were snapped up immediately. One job in a motel paying \$3 an hour had seventy applicants. And that was typical of low-skill, low-pay jobs in the area - an army of applicants appeared as soon as they were

advertised.

So one city's newspaper appeared to be running help wanted ads for 228 jobs but actually ran ads for only 42 jobs that could be filled by the area's jobless, who actively ran after those few openings.

The kicker is that 7,800 people were officially counted as unemployed in that county at the time the ads ran, and only about a fourth of them were collecting unemployment insurance.

That is just one story from a conservative source. There are plenty of others. Try it yourself - study the want ads carefully and see how many jobs actually are available that the unemployed could fill. Better still - next time you hear someone say that the jobless don't want to work, ask them to study those ads and then follow up by calling advertisers of unskilled jobs to see what kind of response they got. It never fails - they always report being swamped by applicants.

Most people get their jobs through friends whose employers spread the word that they need additional workers. Impacted neighborhoods where many people are out of work just don't have that kind of job-producing network.

The President should know that the unemployed want to work, that unemployment insurance benefits go to relatively few of the jobless, and that federal programs to provide the jobless with skills employers need would go a long way toward cutting the jobless rolls and boosting national productivity.

The Help Wanted the unemployed need is jobs, and it is unhelpful for national leaders to spread myths long proved false.

Thus an important feature of the directory will be a Survival Guide of crisis hotlines, shelters, health and legal clinics and other community resources. Yes, the "Movement" is getting more pragmatic everyday!

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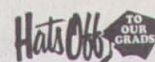

The United States has nearly 8 million people actively seeking work and unable to find it. While the underlying economy is strong, high interest rates and reduced federal spending probably will add to the unemployment rolls in the period ahead.

Against this background, the Reagan Administration is seriously considering a plan to import hundreds of thousands of Mexican nationals to work in America's factories, mills, stores and offices.

These new jobseekers would be called, in the euphemism of the times, "guestworkers."

The aim of the White House is not to "soak up" the illegal or undocumented workers already in this country who are variously estimated to total 2 to 12 million. Rather, it is to develop a new program as part of a "North American Accord" to improve relations with Mexico. It also may give President Reagan a card to play when he discusses Mexican oil, gas and other matters when he met with Mexico's president.

The recruiting of "Guest workers" stopped with the 1973-74 energy crisis and rising unemployment. The problem then became one of trying to persuade the "guest" to go home while integrating those who had settled.

A task force of the National Committee for Full Employment has urged the Reagan Administration not to repeat the "disasters" of past programs which exploited Mexican workers.

The bracero program which operated from 1942 to 1963 brought hundreds of thousands of campesinos to work for U.S. agribusiness, the task force recalled, and it did not help U.S. Mexican relations.

In the 1950s when Congress periodically considered what could be done about the bracero problem, Galarza proposed an ambitious bi-national Rio Grande Valley development program to absorb Mexico's unemployed and build harmony between the two nations. That was never done and the U.S. remains the "safety valve" for job-hungry Mexicans.

Today, members of the Full Employment Committee's Task Force are urging the Reagan Administration to act constructively on the "undocumented" worker problem instead of pursuing the "guestworker" plan. They would offer a two-layered amnesty plan: "green card" or commuter status for the more senior undocumented workers and H-2 or temporary job status for others.

It is to be hoped that President Reagan will choose to work on the problem at hand rather than create new ones.
