KUDOS & PUBLICATIONS

Professor Alexander Sokoloff, recently promoted to Professor of Biology on this campus, has also been promoted to the rank of Research Geneticist in the Department of Genetics, University of California at Berkeley where he is on the staff each summer and where he will spend his leave during the Spring Term of 1967. The Academic Press has just published his book, The Genetics of Tribolium and Related Species. A member of the Entomological Society of America, Dr. Sokoloff spends several days each month at Berkeley working on his research project with the flour beetles. When the biological science building now in process is completed, he will be able to do his work here.
