VAST RE-EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM LAUNCHED IN UNIT ON TWO-POINT BASIS; ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE TO SET UP LABOR PRIORITIES; ECONOMIC COUNCIL OF RESIDENTS COLLABORATE WITH ADMINISTRATION

Poston I yesterday launched a vast re-employment program based on two major points: (1) the re-opening of job possibilities in most divisions based on individual preference and past "outside" experience; and (2), the shifting of labor from previously overstaffed departments to understaffed divisions. The only exception to the entire re-employment program will be applied to tho-

se individuals who have undergone intensive "in-training" for the · past several months in some departmental positions.

Job specifications are now being set-up by divisional and departmental heads stat-

ing (mong other provi-sions, the exact duti-es of the employees and minimum requirements. 1

The Unit I Employment Department is busily preparing a regular list of positions open, similar to the Civil Service, which vill be conspicuously posted thrudut the Unt. The listings, it was disclosed, will lescribe in detail, as much as possible, the vailable jobs. This procedure is expected to give all those conperned a clearer Dioture of the labor sitlation.

It was reported that skeleton craws were lready "on the job" in requisite departments. Residents interested may now apply for positions in which they are most interested.

An Administrative committee, composed of R.H. Rupke, H.A. Mathiesen, Nell Findley, and f. . Empie, has been appointed to set p labor priorities or particular lines of work. The subsistence units have already been determined as IA, and these divisions will be staffed first with qualified and interested personnel.

The entire program is being hendled by the Administration in collaboration with temporary economic council set up by the Committee of 72 which is representing the Unit One residents for the time being.

16,025 ELM TREES IN FOSTON FROM NEW MEXICO INDIAN RESERVATION: CPB OK'S UNIT II PLANS

A special crew of 75 has been recruited by H.A. Mathiesen, Foston Agricultural and Industrial Chief, to dist-ribute the 16,025 Chinese elm trees brought here Thursday evening.

The trees will distributed on a 3-1-1 basis in the three Foston Units. It was reported that surveyors are already staking the Unit II blocks for the placement of the traus. Each block will be required to dig its own holes for the plantings. The landscape and nursery divisions of the agricultural department will do the plantings. The Planning Board of Unit has approved blueprint plans. block will eventually be shaded by 150 elms.

The trees were delivered in Foston by 8 trucks from the Shiprock Indian Reservation in New Maxico. group of 12 men from the Ag departments of Units 1, 2 and 3 made the trip, leaving Foston on November 9.
