CLIFTON E. SNELSON, FORMER FRESNAN, WALTER H. SCOTT OF S.F. JOINS ADMINISTRATION AS CHIEF STEWARD, ASSISTANT CHIEF OF POLICE

Two important changes in the administrative personnel were announced yesterday by W. Wade Head, Project Director. Effective Nov. 28th, Clifton E. Snelson assumed duties as Chief Steward of Poston, and Walter H. ("Bob") Scott arrived here yesterday .morning from San Francisco to take over the duties as Assistant Internal Security Officer in charge of Poston I.

Mr. Snelson succeeds Luther S. Stults who resigned recently to join the Army. The new Chief Steward comes to Poston following six months active service with the WCCA as chief steward and director of mess and lodging at the Fresno Assembly Center. He is a former restaurant owner and operator in Fresno, California, Mrs. Snelson is a member of the faculty of Fresno High school and hopes to join her husband soon. Joseph Petta will continue as assistant steward, Mr. Head said.

SCOTT IS SFJC, POLICE ACADEMY GRADUATE

Walter Scott is a graduate of San Francisco Junior College and a product of the San Francisco Police Academy, specializing in police training and self-defense.

According - to Chief Miller, Mr. Scott will be in charge of the Poston Police Academy which is "hoped to be opened" the first part of next week.

"Bob" Scott is expected to be joined shortly by Mrs. Scott and their baby son.

252 BEET TOPPERS RETURN TO POSTON; 100 MORE EXPECTED TODAY

Two hundred fifty two sugar beet toppers returned to Poston early Saturday afternoon. The workers arrived in Parker on a special train which consisted of 2 baggage cars and 4 coaches. While a few returned from Wyoming and Colorado, it was stated that the great majority had labored in Scotts County, Nebraska.
