CSCSB POPULATION JUMPS AS STUDENTS RETURN

Heavy demand for pre-registration materials indicates the student population will increase about 50 per cent.

Students began returning to the campus in large numbers this week for testing, orientation and information.

About 900 individuals, the equivalent of 752 full-time students, are expected to be on campus when classes start Thursday, September 28.

Registration will be held Tuesday, September 26, for all new and continuing graduates, seniors and juniors. Sophomores and freshmen will register on Wednesday, September 27.

Greeting the new student body will be 72 faculty members, 61 of them full-time. Of the full-time faculty, 41, or 67 per cent, have earned their doctorate.

MOBILE X-RAY UNIT TO BE ON CAMPUS

On Thursday, September 28, the Mobile X-ray unit of the Tuberculosis and Health Association of San Bernardino County will be stationed on campus to give free X-rays to all staff, faculty and students. It will be located on the mall in front of the Administration Building from 8:30 to 3:00. From information received from the Student Health Center, it is good health practice to have a chest X-ray each year.

DATE SET FOR ALL-CAMPUS COOKOUT

Saturday, October 7, has been set as the date for the next All-Campus Cookout.

All College personnel and all students, plus families of both groups, are invited to attend. Last spring's Cookout attracted 385 persons.

The Cookout again will be held at the athletic area. Food will be served starting at 6:00 p.m. Organized activities will start at 4:00 p.m., although the athletic facilities will be open from 1:00 p.m.

The Associated Student Body is sponsoring the Cookout, in cooperation with the Department of Physical Education.

"We haven't finalized the menu yet, but it will be interesting Barbecue-type food," said C. Michael O'Gara, chairman of the Department

of Physical Education. "We will issue softball, tennis, volleyball and handball equipment. Golf and archery equipment will be locked up as a safety factor."

Anyone with a dollar is eligible to participate in the Cookout. Children under 10 will be admitted for 50 cents.

HEALTH CENTER INFORMATION

The Student Health Center is open from 8:00 to 4:30, with a full-time nurse on duty. Beginning October 1 the medical staff will be increased from one part-time doctor to three part-time doctors.

EMERGENCY LOAN PROGRAM FOR NEW EMPLOYEES

An emergency loan fund has been established by the Trustees of the College Foundation for new employees. Loans may be made to any full-time employee during the first three months of employment under the following provisions: \$100 maximum for any one loan; repayable in 30 days; non-renewable; bookkeeping charge of 75¢; payroll deductible.
