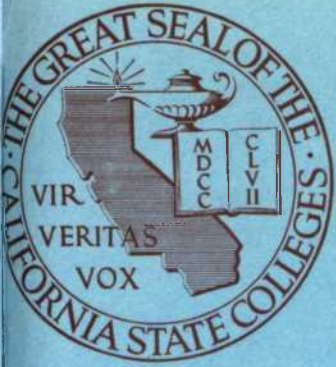

### THIEF STRIKES IN PARKING LOT

Two thefts were reported last week in the CSCSB parking lot. A stereo unit was removed from one car. Another car was broken into, via a window, and a tape recorder was stolen. Herbert Brown, Director of Physical Plant, urged CSCSB personnel to keep their cars locked and leave nothing valuable in open view.

The thefts are believed to be the work of outsiders. Numerous car break-ins have been reported at Valley College recently.
