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

CSCSB PASSES 1,000 MARK

Exactly 1,002 students had registered for the fall term as of 11 a.m. Thursday, October 5.

CSCSB thus passed a significant growth milestone earlier than had been expected. College officials had forecast a total registration of 900 this term.

The 1,002 figure represents a growth rate of exactly 67 per cent in one year. The fall quarter in 1966 had attracted 600 students to CSCSB.

The number of full-time equivalent students had not been computed yet, but was certain to exceed 850, also a healthy increase over the 535 FTE a year ago.

EVERYBODY INVITED TO ACTIVITIES DAY

All CSCSB students, personnel and their families are invited to share the fun of Activities Day -- tomorrow, Saturday, October 7.

Athletic facilities will open at 3:30 p.m. The Freshmen have challenged the Sophomores to the CSCSB Softball World Series at 4 p.m.

Food will be served starting at 6 p.m. in the athletic area. The menu features ham in a tortilla roll, along with beans and cole slaw. Meal tickets cost \$1 for all persons age 10 or older, and 50 cents for young children. Soft drinks are extra.

All the other activities are free. Clabe Hangan, noted folk-singer from San Bernardino, will perform between 7:30 and 8:15. A band will play for the dance, between 9 and midnight, in the quad area, weather permitting.

Meal tickets must be purchased by 5 p.m. today, Friday, in order to insure service for everyone tomorrow.

CHAMBER MUSIC LAUNCHES NOON SERIES

Vividly unusual chamber music by the Dolmetsch-Schoenfeld Ensemble will start the Noon Series at 11:45 a.m. Tuesday, October 10.

The chamber music ensemble features Carl Dolmetsch of England, whom a New York Times critic has called "the finest recorder player of the time." He is accompanied by Joseph Saxby, a harpsichordist. Alice and Eleonore Schoenfeld, a violin-cello duo, complete the quartet.

The ensemble plays baroque music dating from the 16th Century, as well as modern compositions for these instruments.

Admission to the 90-minute program, in the Physical Science lecture hall, is open to the general public as well as to all CSCSB students and personnel, free of charge. There will be an intermission at 12:30 to accommodate a partial change in audience, so persons with classes can attend half the performance.

FILM SERIES BEGINS TONIGHT

"Bridge on the River Kwai," the multiple Academy Award winner starring Alec Guinness, will begin the CSCSB Film Series at 7:30 tonight in the Physical Science lecture hall. Admission is free to all CSCSB faculty, staff and students.

The company will prepare scenes and one-act plays for informal performances at high schools and on the campus, and for formal evening presentation on the campus.

NEWS OF FACULTY & STAFF

Alfred Egge (Biology) attended a conference sponsored by the Commission on Undergraduate Education in the Biological Sciences last weekend in St. Louis. Dr. Egge reported on the current status and projected plans of the Biology curriculum at CSCSB. About 80 colleges and universities were represented, along with observers from the National Science Foundation and American Institute of Biological Science.

Bonnie Danskin (Data Processing) is instructing four nights a week at the West Coast Trade Schools. She is a State licensed key punch instructor and is helping set up a new IBM format at the school which is hoped will qualify for acceptance by the State for rehabilitation and welfare students.

Charles Slaughter (Education) and Edward White (English) attended an Asilomar conference on the "Preparation of Teachers of English" last weekend. The meeting was held by representatives of English and Education Departments and department chairmen. Dr. White also will lecture on "Modern Literature and Its Problems" next week to the American Association of University Women in Redlands.

Alexander Sokoloff (Biology) prepared, as part of his research this summer, a montage of the flour beetle, with photographs taken with a scanning electron microscope. This apparatus makes it possible to obtain photographs of high resolution up to 20,000 times the normal. His montage resulted in a picture which magnified the beetle about 350 times.

Robert West (Education) appeared as the final speaker to sum up and evaluate a three-day Principals' Workshop last week at Palm Springs. More than 100 superintendents and principals from San Bernardino County attended the conference.
