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

FORBES, GARZA JOIN CSCSB ADVISORY BOARD

Arthur J. Forbes of Riverside and Florentino Garza of San Bernardino have been appointed to the CSCSB Advisory Board by the California State Colleges Board of Trustees.

Forbes, a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley, is community relations representative for Kaiser Steel Corp. in Fontana. Garza, a graduate of the University of New Mexico with a law degree from UCLA, is an attorney in private practice.

James K. Guthrie of San Bernardino was elected chairman of the Advisory Board for the 1968-69 academic year and Leslie I. Harris was elected vice chairman.

CHANCELLOR ASKS PROP. 3 SUPPORT

Chancellor Glenn S. Dumke of the California State Colleges has written the following message to the 19 presidents of the CSC system:

"The California State Colleges and the University of California find themselves once more sponsoring a higher education bond measure on the general election ballot. Legislative approval was urged by the Trustees during the session just ended, and at their September meeting the Trustees formally endorsed Proposition 3. This ballot measure will ultimately provide \$200 million for the use of public higher education for capital outlay purposes...



He is speech pathologist at Emeryville, Calif.
