## NAACP Regional Conference successful

In order to succeed you must "cheat..." Dr. Samuel Furguson, President of Chaffey College told his audience at the recent annual regional conference of the National Association of Colored People in San Bernardino.

Dr. Furguson opened his address by telling the audience, "If at first you don't succeed.... CHEAT!" As he explained the letters in the word CHEAT, it was made clear to them, it is the only way to survive. The C in cheat was for the word commitment, it takes commitment to succeed; H you must have the heart, endurance, and stamina; E, he explained, was for energy and enthusiasm; A for ambition; the emphasis should be put on I can and not I can't. He told the story of a young Black woman who had the desire to become a

medical doctor, when he met her she was enrolling in classes for nursing because she thought she was too old and too poor to ever reach her goal, he told her the reasons she gave were not valid and she must think she "can" to succeed. Last spring he recieved an announcement from the new doctor. The last letter in the word Cheat was T for togetherness; if we are to succeed as a people, he said, it is working together.

Workshops filled the afternoon session of the conference. In the workshop on Trade Pacts, Fair Share agreements and Black Dollar Days dominated the workshop featuring Mr. Fred Rasheed, National NAACP office, and Quality in Education - The challenge of the 80's featured Maurice Roberson, Lois Carson and Hardy Brown, the latter two are elected officials.

During a period in the

session the dynamic Mr. L.R. Byrd of the National office of NAACP spoke vigorously about the trade pac agreements which have been signed under operation Fair Share. He said 350 million dollars in economic power is available and if we don't take advantage of it, it's our own fault. "I hear you say you want to own your own supermarket, well we don't want just "Black" businesses, we want well planned businesses based on well founded statistics and marketing data, we want Safeway and others to build more stores in our communities." Byrd said the NAACP has their commitment to return some of the investments to the community.

Byrd told of a plan now in the working. A national banking association has agreed to finance 80% of a package to establish a minimum of 4 national Black corporations structured for Black economic growth aid development. Byrd pleaded with the group to find out what the signing of the trade pacs mean.

Rasheed spoke of the success of Black Dollar Days. "We were hoping for \$2.9 million to be

exchanged during the first year in 1983 and the goal was surpassed;

\$35 million in \$2 bills and Susan B. Anthony \$1 coins was spent in

the nation during the week following Labor Day.

## Presley Opposes Lottery Initiative on November Ballot

Sacramento: State Senator Robert Presely (D-Riverside) has agreed to be one of the official signer of the ballot arguments in opposition to the proposed state lottery initiative. Presley's name will appear with State Attorney Genreal John Van De Kamp and Bobette Bennett, President of the California State Parent Teacher Association, as the three signatures to the arguments against Proposition 37 printed in the November ballot.

Citing his concern that a lottery would create additional crime problems for the state, Presley stated that the so-called "benefits" are outweighed by the detriments of the lottery proposal. "A lottery is nothing but a very expensive tax in another form," Presley stated. "It will cost more than ten times than other taxes to collect, and its backers will receive nearly 50¢ of every dollar in revenue generated." Presley went on to say that given the most optimistic predictions of the lottery's promoters, the total amount of funds raised the first year will amount to a

mere five percent of the state-wide educational budget.

"I question whether it is really in the best interests of our citizens, and in particular the youth of our State, to invite the big eastern gambling interests, the same people who manufacture slot-machines, into our state to promote these lotteries. I can assure you that the main concern of these eastern promoters is not education or the welfare of our young people. Their main concern is making money and allowing the gambling interests to get a foothold in California. The diversion of some of the proceeds to public education is simply a means of sugar coating the pill, to make it easier for the public to swallow," Presely emphasized.

Presley added, "My years in law enforcement have made me aware that local governments are likely to face increased costs because of crime problems associated with lotteries. Experiences in other states indicate that illegal numbers operations tend to flourish when state lotteries are instituted."

## Amtrak's Reign of Terror Against Employees

Congresswoman Cardiss Collins told the president of Amtrak, the publicly funded national railroad, to appear before her subcommittee September 13 to explain why his managers in Chicago, and perhaps other cities, have been firing an disciplining minorities, women and union workers without just cause and fair hearings.

"These managers started a reign of terror. They destroyed the legal guarantees that workers would get impartial hearings and appeals," the Chicago Democrat said.

Investigators from her Subcommittee on Government Activities and Transportation learned just this week such abuses may be common in a number of cities around the country and that high officials at headquarters in Washington, DC, may know that.

The hearing in Washington, DC, will get into the details of when this system of abuse came

into being and which top managers have known about it. It seems that ambition motivated some officials in various parts of the country to get tough with workers as a way of showing they were good managers. I'm going to make sure this nonsense ends, "Mrs. Collins said.

Employees have been disciplined for minor offenses. One was fired because one day he discouraged customers in his cafe car from buying a brand of soda that was difficult to reach in the storage cabinets. Then, in an act of "charity", his manager rehired him.

In another case, a manager told his train chiefs to hand out more disciplinary notices each month, then made sure employees would not get a fair hearing.

In other cases, a manager would offer to reduce the punishment if employees would plead guilty. Workers with families to feed

facing severe punishment really had no choice but to admit to what they had not done.

The investigation has led, so far, to the transfer of three Chicago managers. "Amtrak's management admits there is a problem," Mrs. Collins said. "But we want to be sure they get to the bottom of it, and that will be the major issue at the hearings in September. We need some basic changes in

## Notice Cards Mailed To New Property Owners

Frank Seeley, County Assessor, announced today that some 80,000 value notice cards are being mailed during this week and the next week to the new owners of properties which changed hands during the past year, and to the owners of properties which were newly

constructed, added to, or altered during the past year. All of these properties, under Proposition 13, have been appraised and the new values have been added to Riverside County's Secured Assessment Roll for 1984-85. For properties which have changed hands between March 1, 1983 and March 1,

1984, the Assessor has valued them as of the date of transfer; properties newly constructed have been valued as of the date of completion; if construction work was in progress as of March 1, 1984, a "partly-complete" value has been found for 1984-85. Two "special" types of properties that

will be covered by the value notice programs for 1984-85 are mobile-homes on the property tax and certain timeshare interests. Properties not involved in change in ownership or in new construction or alterations generally will retain the same base year value as last year, according to the Assessor.

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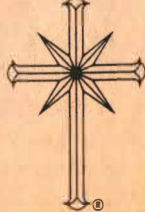

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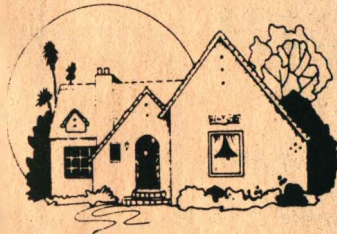

Consumer News

Question: What is the new rule concerning sodium labeling?

Answer: The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) issued new rules concerning sodium labeling, after consumer input, to become effective July 1, 1985. The sodium content will be included as part of the nutrition labels on packaged foods. New terms will be in use on the labels. The term "sodium free" means that there are less than 5 milligrams of sodium per serving; "very low sodium" means that there are 35 milligrams or less; "low sodium" means 140 milligrams or less; "reduced sodium" if processed in a way that reduces the normal level of sodium by at least 75%.

Question: What are sulfiting agents?

Answer: Sulfite is a common additive in many beverages. There are six different sulfiting agents: Sulfur dioxide, sodium sulfite, sodium bisulfite, potassium bisulfite, sodium or potassium metabisulfite. Persons hypersensitive to the sul-

fites may have adverse reactions; such as nausea, diarrhea, acute asthma and even loss of consciousness. These sulfites are commonly used to keep salad bar ingredients looking fresh and potatoes and fish "white." They are also used in processed foods; including fruit drinks, beer, wine, baked foods, vegetables and dried fruits.

U.S. House Votes To Increase Food Stamps

Washington, D.C. -- Only one day before federal government figures were released reporting that the number of poor people in the U.S. rose to 15.2 percent in 1983, the U.S. House overwhelmingly voted approval of the Hunger Relief Act of 1984 which would provide small increases for food stamp recipients beginning in 1985.

The Senate, however, has not yet taken any action to increase food stamp funding.

"Recent government figures clearly mirror what many sensitive and concerned national leaders already recognize, the millions of Americans have been denied admission to the most recent 'economic recovery,'" Bread for the World Executive Director Arthur Simon said today.

"This bill indicated that both Republicans and Democrats in the House want to strengthen the Food Stamp Program. The Senate must now act on this opportunity to help the growing numbers of poor people in this country," he said.

Bread for the World is a Christian citizens' movement against domestic and world hunger. Many of the organization's 45,000 members have been working on behalf of legislators in Congress that would provide more funds for food stamps and for national nutrition programs.

Dems need Jesse's rainbow

The reluctance of many members of Jesse Jackson's Rainbow Coalition to join the Mondale-Ferraro campaign may doom the Democratic challengers to defeat.

Jackson and his supporters say they left San Francisco empty-handed; that women, organized labor and white Southerners won more than they did. They argue that they've been frozen out of campaign politics by the Democratic team, that their advice isn't sought or appreciated when offered.

Curiously, some of these complaints are echoed by Mondale's black supporters.

While generally pleased with the convention's results, many blacks who supported Mondale now say their phone calls aren't returned and their opinions aren't sought when campaign decisions are made.

But unlike the Jacksonites, those blacks who signed on early with the former vice president aren't jumping ship now. Instead, they're determined to help the Mondale-Ferraro ticket in

spite of itself.

For example, after telling an audience that Mondale's inner circle was composed of "smart-ass white boys who think they know it all," Atlanta Mayor Andrew Young quickly added that he intended to see the Democratic ticket victorious in November.

But for many Jackson supporters, that decision apparently isn't so easy. Most expected something more for their man's efforts during the primary campaign. Without something "more," many seem willing to sit out the campaign, thereby helping the re-election of President Reagan.

But a respected Washington, D.C.-based black think tank reports that Jackson's overall efforts should be viewed as an overwhelming success — not a failure.

In a study of the campaign, The Joint Center for Political Studies says Jackson's effort, more successful than any attempt by a black candidate for the presidency, must be judged a victory by three of the four objectives the candidate himself set for it.

The campaign increased black

political participation, articulated issues and positions of concern to minorities, and began to change state rules and party procedures that many believe hinder minority participation.

Only in the hoped-for creation of a multi-ethnic coalition of progressive forces within the party can Jackson's effort be seen as a failure.

Furthermore, the center's report says that while Jackson articulated "relatively conventional" positions on domestic issues, his "international agenda continued the evolution of a progressive black voice in foreign policy."

The report was issued before the convention and therefore does not include the victory that Jackson forces won in forcing the party to adopt a reform commission to examine and correct flaws in its delegate selection rules.

Nor does the report calculate the negative reactions of many Jews and white Southerners to the Jackson campaign. But it urges that these differences not obscure "the real accomplishments of the Jackson campaign."

But without help now from the reluctant Rainbow Coalition, Walter Mondale and Geraldine Ferraro may not have the chance to make accomplishments of their own.

The principle upon which the Jackson campaign was founded may be lost unless his followers carry the movement that led them to San Francisco forward to the polls in November.

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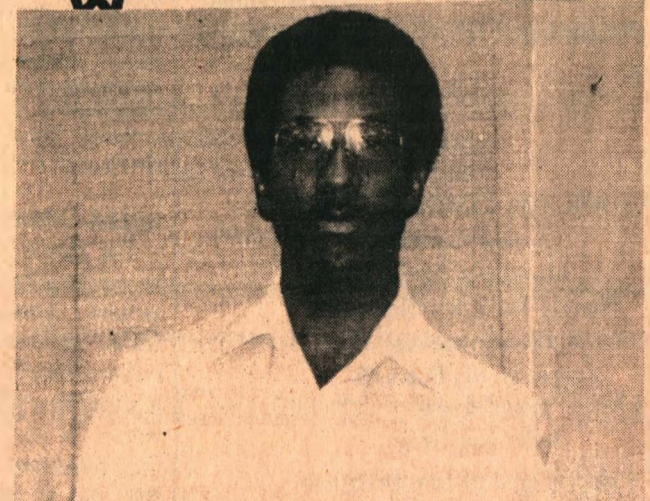

"I have been a worker at Children's Haven for six months," said Ethel with pride. "I used to work at the day care center at our church."

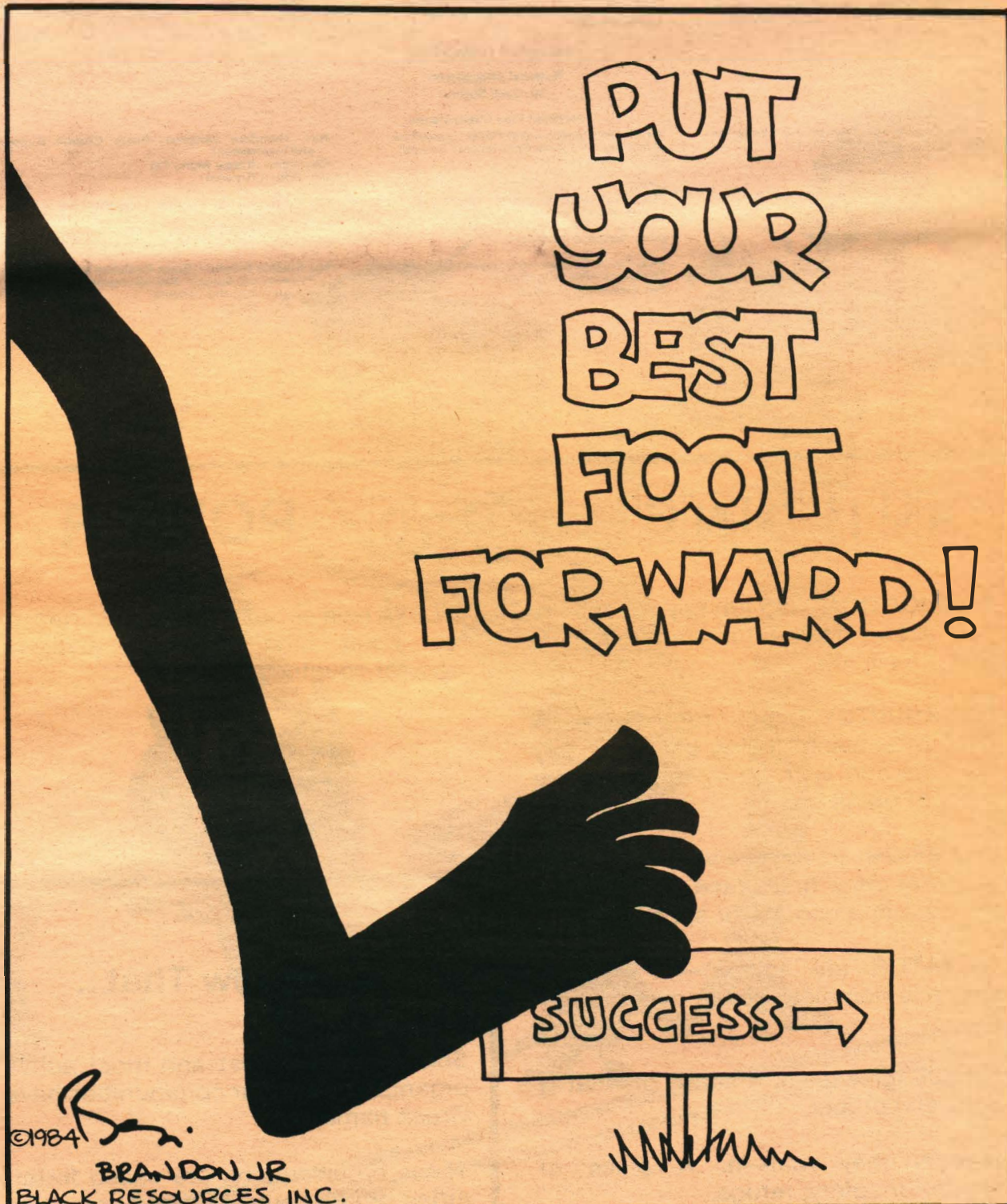
"Ethel is a good worker," said Mrs. Tyler, the teacher. "She helps me look after the children while they play and eat."

## Jesse Owens Makes a Name—At Last

One gold medal! Two gold medals! Three gold medals! Four gold medals! It was hard to believe. But it was true. Jesse Owens had won four gold medals at the Olympics held in Berlin, Germany in 1936.

What excitement there was for this young Black American. He had won great honors for himself and his country.

Jesse had come a long way. When he was growing up in America, Black people were not allowed to ride in the front of the bus. They were barred from eating in most restaurants. But Jesse Owens was proud that he was allowed to **represent** his country, the United States, in the Olympics.

When he won the four gold medals in Berlin, the Nazi **dictator**, Adolf Hitler, refused to shake Jesse Owens' hand. This young Black American had destroyed the Nazi **myth** of the master race.

The world knew that this young American had made a name for himself and his country. Jesse's name became a household word and young Black people in the United States had someone they could look up to and feel proud.

After becoming an Olympic **champion**, Owens made many public appearances, often without any pay. Soon things became bad. Owens found it hard to feed his family. He ended up penniless and had to declare **bankruptcy**.

Today parks are named for Jesse Owens all over our country. The new movie, "The Jesse Owens Story," is being seen and praised by people all over the world. Yes, Jesse Owens has made a name for himself—at last. Yet, in his own humble way he said, "I just came along at a time when Black Americans needed an image."



What better image could our young people have to show them how to learn

to live, to grow and to respect themselves and others?

## BLACK AFRICA

We have been learning about Black Africa. We have learned that Africa is the second largest continent on earth. Do you know which is the largest continent on earth?

The area of Black Africa is over 8 million square miles. Black Africa takes up almost all of the continent of Africa. Black Africa is almost twice as big as the United States. There are over 334 million people in Black Africa. (There are about 227 million people in the United States.)

"Hello, my name is Ahmed Obadalah. I live in Moroni (mor-on'-ee). Moroni is located on an island called Grande Comore. Grande Comore is the largest of the islands. There are two other main islands called Anjouan and Moheli.

"Moroni is the capital of the Republic of the Comoros. There are more than 300,000 people in the Comoros. The largest ethnic group is known as the Antalaotra. We are a people of African, Arab and Malagasy descent.

"Some French is spoken in the Comoros, but our national language is Comorian. It is a language a lot like Swahili. Swahili is understood by most of my people, too.

"The Republic of the Comoros became an independent country on July 6, 1975. Next year we will celebrate our 10th anniversary of independence.

"Most of the people of the Comoros are Muslims. There are also some Christians in the islands.

"Most of the people of the Comoros are farmers. They grow cassava and coconuts to sell at market.

# TUTOR'S GUIDE

The primary objective of *The ADVANCER* is to fulfill a basic part of the reading, motivational, comprehension enhancement and ego strengthening needs of our young and older adults not presently in any formalized public school system. Its secondary purpose is to serve as excellent supplemental reading for the large number of young people in public (and other) formalized schools where such help is indicated.

This new learning enhancement tool is being put together on a volunteer basis (there are no paid staff either nationally or locally in AOIP) by experienced professionals who often have varying views concerning how (level-wise) such students should be approached. Since many of you, too have opinions as reading specialists, we welcome your comments and would appreciate greatly your suggestions. Also, we invite—and urgently need—articles for inclusion in *The ADVANCER*. Each article must include a set of questions for use in our Tutor's Guide.

Since we may have to combine similar articles and significantly edit others, we feel it is best to maintain a policy of no credits. The objective of all of us is to do what we can to eliminate the awesomeness of illiteracy wherever it exists.

## General Guidelines

This guide is primarily designed to arouse and maintain motivation in the student by continuously highlighting those elements in these articles which focus on issues of major concern to them; address their ego strengthening needs and sense of self; and convey productive alternatives to preconceived notions and ways of thinking that have hindered us from maximizing our potential.

This orientation can help make the necessary mechanical process that follows more meaningful and acceptable to the

student—something that he/she can see as making sense and helpful to them. Accordingly, we suggest that you:

(1) Motivate student interest by introducing difficult words in each article with a discussion. If a chalkboard, easel or chart paper is available, write them before or as they are used in context.

(2) Guide the reading of each article by posing questions using words in the text. If necessary, take a sentence at a time. As the student progresses, you can take a paragraph at a time.

(3) Teach one skill after each article.

(4) Have student re-read to put the skill word taught back into context.

For this issue, you might concentrate thusly:

**ETHEL OF CHILDREN'S HAVEN**—Ask: Why does Ethel work at Children's Haven? Where did Ethel work before she started working at Children's Haven? Why do the parents like Ethel to take care of their children? Why did Mrs. Walker ask so many questions? Why do you think Mrs. Walker might make a good day care worker?

Skill: Find these words in the story with the sound of a as in cat: *at, have, nap*. Find these words with the sound of a as in cake: *day, play, take, may*. Find these words with the sound of a as in car: *are park*. Now find these words in the story with the sound of e as in ten: *center, telling, help, else, get*. Find these words with the sound of e as in even: *he, eat, read, week, see, leave, feel*. Find these words with the sound of e as in father: *her ever*.

The letter i is another vowel sound. The letter i has different sounds, e.g., i as in is, i as in ice. Find these words in the story with the sound of i as in is: *children, with, it, will*

office, fill. Find these words with the sound of i as in ice: *like, I, pride, while, right*.

**JESSE OWENS MAKES A NAME—AT LAST**—Ask: What was it hard for Jesse Owens to believe? Why did Hitler refuse to shake Jesse Owens hand? Why did Jesse Owens declare bankruptcy? How has Jesse Owens made a name for himself?

Skill: Find these words in the story and tell what the a sounds like: hand, had, Black, race, many, made, name, bad, became, pay, way, last.

**BLACK AFRICA**—Ask: Where is the Republic of the Comoros located? What is the capital of the Comoros? What is the national language of the Comoros? When did the Comoros become an independent country? To what religion do most of the people belong? What crops do the farmers of the Comoros grow?

**LUIS MUNOZ RIVERA**—Ask: Why was Munoz sad and happy at the same time? Why did the Republicans give Munoz trouble? Why did Munoz learn to speak English at 51 years of age? How did Puerto Ricans become citizens of the United States?

**THE SOLAR SYSTEM—MARS**—Ask: Who is the planet Mars named for? Why is it called the Red Planet? How big is Mars? How long is a year on Mars? A day? What were Martians called? What is Mars' atmosphere made of? What is "dry ice"? Name the two spaceships that followed a path around Mars. How long is *Viking's* lander programmed to operate by itself?

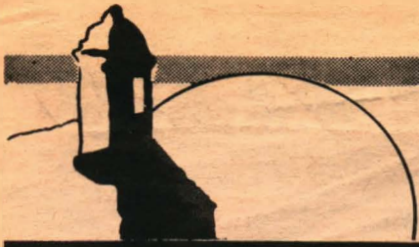

## OUR HISPANIC NEIGHBORS



We have been learning more and more every week in *The ADVANCER*. Did you know that Hispanic Americans are very much like us in many, many ways? Hispanic Americans are Americans whose ancestors came from places like Mexico, Central America and the Caribbean.

Hispanic Americans have a rich and colorful history. Let's try to learn some important things about them and us each week in *The ADVANCER*.

### Luis Muñoz Rivera

Luis Muñoz Rivera took office as the head of a six-man Executive Council (the government) on February 8, 1898. His title was "Minister of Grace, Justice and Government." This title was used to show that "Grace" would go along with "Mercy" and "Justice" in his government.

Seven days later the U.S. warship *Maine* was blown up in the harbor of Havana, Cuba. The United States went to war with Spain.

Three days later Doña Amalia presented Muñoz with a son. They named the baby Jose Luis Alberto Muñoz Marin. Muñoz was happy and sad at the same time. He said, "In Cuba windows are broken. In Puerto Rico we pay the bill."

On July 25, 1898—just seven days after Puerto Rico had held its first free election—the Americans took over the government. The United States officials asked Muñoz to stay to help them.

Muñoz tried to get along with the Military Governor, but he couldn't do it. The two men talked about knocking each other down. The **insults** became too much for Muñoz. In December Muñoz and his cabinet **resigned**. The Military Governor said there would be no more cabinets in Puerto Rico. The Governor and his men would run the country.

Early in 1900, Muñoz started a newspaper called *El Diario* (The Journal) in San Juan. In April the United States Congress passed a law that left the people of Puerto with no citizenship at all. They were not citizens of Spain.



They were not citizens of Puerto Rico. They were just the "people of Puerto Rico."

Luis Muñoz Rivera formed a new party called the Federalists. They were afraid that the elections would not be honest. They told the people not to vote in the elections. Muñoz did not want the Republican Party to win. But they did.

The new Republican Mayor of San Juan ordered two Federalists arrested. He sentenced them to clean the streets for a month. The men refused to do this. So the mayor put them in jail and fed them bread and water.

In his newspaper, *El Diario*, Muñoz wrote an article about this. He called it, "A Pack of Dogs on the Prowl." During **siesta** time the next day, a gang tried to wreck the offices of the newspaper.

Muñoz moved his family to New York. He started a newspaper called the *Puerto Rico Herald*. In the first paper he wrote a letter to the President of the United States telling him how bad the laws were. Other papers wrote about it, too. President Theodore Roosevelt declared that Spanish law could not be used in Puerto Rico any more.

Muñoz went back to Puerto Rico to try to unite his people. He began writing stories about how the big sugar com-

panies mistreated the people. A gang broke into his office again. They were screaming, "Where is *The Lion (El Leon)*?"

He stood up to face them asking, "Who wants The Lion?" The gang went away.

In 1910 Muñoz's party sent him to the United States House of Representatives to speak for them but he could not vote. At 51 years of age he taught himself to speak English so that he could talk to Congress about Puerto Rico's problems.

On May 15, 1916 the House of Representatives passed a bill that made Puerto Ricans citizens of the United States. The bill also gave the right to vote to adult men. This was not all that Muñoz wanted. But it was far better than it had been.

By this time Muñoz's body was dying with cancer. He was tired and sick. He went back to the beloved mountains where he was born. One evening a friend came to his bedside to tell him, "Don Luis, the people of Puerto Rico are all with you."

"Then," Don Luis replied, "this is a good time to die."

Early the next morning, November 15, 1916, The Lion went "to the silence and to his rest."

Young citizens of several high schools in and around the Los Angeles area have painted a number of outstanding art murals (a large picture painted on a wall). These pictures depict the history of the cultures of the western United States.

These murals take the place of words. The pictures tell the story of the different cultural beliefs of the people of the West, too.

### Kicking the Salt Habit—A Final Word

Our bodies don't need as much salt as we use. It is really the sodium in salt that is our enemy.

Here is the "salt substitute" recipe we promised to give you.

#### Salt Substitute Recipe

- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 2 teaspoons ground oregano
- 2 teaspoons black pepper
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder (not garlic salt)
- 2 tablespoons dry mustard
- 6 tablespoons onion powder (not onion salt)
- 3 tablespoons paprika
- 3 tablespoons poultry seasoning.

Mix all seasonings together. Put it in all of your salt shakers.

## SCIENCE

### A Visit to Outer Space

#### The Solar System—Mars

The planet Mars is named for the Roman god of war. Mars is called the Red Planet because of the mysterious reddish light that appears in the sky.

Mars is a little more than one-half the size of the earth. A year on Mars is 687 earth days. A day on Mars is 24 hours and 37 minutes long.

A telescope shows many markings on the surface of Mars. The markings look like canals. For a long time people thought that there was intelligent life on Mars. Many stories were told about Martians from outer space. They were called "little green men."

Mars has an atmosphere like Earth and Venus. Mars' atmosphere is made up mostly of carbon dioxide (a gas made up of carbon and oxygen. We breathe it

out of our lungs. Plants take in carbon dioxide to make their food).

Mars has a North Pole and a South Pole, too. The ice at Mars' poles is "dry ice," or frozen carbon dioxide. We use dry ice on Earth to keep things cold when packed.

In 1976 two U.S. space ships, *Viking 1* and *Viking 2* followed a path around Mars. Landers (about the size of a jeep) landed on the surface. They studied Mars' atmosphere and materials. The landers took more than 50,000 photographs of the surface of Mars and gathered soil samples.

*Viking 1's* lander is programmed to operate by itself until 1994. Look for more interesting facts about Mars from time to time.
