COLLEGE ESCAPES SEVERE DAMAGE IN BIG STORM

The College escaped any severe damage as a result of last week's storm, according to Executive Dean Joseph Thomas. He stated that "the campus is fortunate in being located on soil which filters water into the Devil Canyon Basin and in being on a slope which drops 150 feet in elevation northwest to southeast."

There has been a loss of two weeks' working time on the Library-Classroom Building due to rains. Since the need is critical for occupancy in the spring of 1970, it is hoped that the contractor will soon begin to pick up some of the lost days.

The two science buildings experienced some minor leaks which are covered under the guarantee period.

The Physical Plant Shops and Offices suffered a two-week delay because of the winds and the rainy season.

The Administration and temporary Library Building showed some minor damage as a result of the storm.

College Employees Assist During Storm

The rainstorm closed a road to homes in Devil Canyon, just north of the College. Several homes were cut off. During the emergency, H. E. Brown, Director of Physical Plant, authorized use of a skip-loading tractor to clear the road. Fred Cordova (Physical Plant) volunteered to operate the tractor and Jim Newman (College Police) assisted in contacting the College's cut-off neighbors.

Ron Moore (Purchasing), a ham radio operator, handled 318 emergency telephone calls via radio relay during the storm. His phone number is TU 2-1964 and his call number WB6IGU. He can hook up with a nationwide ham radio net for free emergency calls, if any College employee should require this service. Most of his calls last weekend came from skiers who were stranded in the San Bernardino Mountains.

Lincoln's Birthday, February 12, will be a regular work day for all College employees. Classes will be held and offices will be open as usual.

EARNs TAX BREAK

The Alumni Association of CSCSB has been granted tax-exempt status under the Internal Revenue Code.

John W. Francis, Foundation Manager of Cal Poly Kellogg Unit Foundation, Inc., has commended CSCSB for the ease with which tax-exempt status was obtained. (Some of the larger California State Colleges still lack this status for their alumni organizations.)

"A primary factor...was the fact that they are organized as an association rather than a corporation," Francis told the annual conference of the California Association of College and University Managers. "An association of the type developed at San Bernardino is obviously an 'integral part' of the educational institution... I congratulate Mr. Richard J. Bennecke, Activities Advisor at the College, for his successful approach to tax-exempt status for alumni associations," Francis said.
