SALARIES IMPROVE
SUBSTANTIALLY,
REPORT STATES

Dr. C. Mansel Keene, Assistant Chancellor, Faculty and Staff Affairs, has cited the substantial improvement in faculty benefits and salaries achieved during the eight-year period the Board of Trustees has been in existence.

Dr. Keene made the following statements in a report requested by Trustee Louis H. Heilbron:

The average weighted all-ranks salary for the regular faculty of the University of California in 1961-62 was 18.7 per cent above that for the California State Colleges. By 1968-69 this differential had been reduced to 6.9 per cent.

In 1961-62 the average compensation (salary plus overall fringe benefits used by the AAUP) for the University of California was 20.3 per cent above that of the California State Colleges. By 1968-69 this differential had been reduced to 10.5 per cent.

STUDENT BOOK COLLECTION
CONTEST TO BE HELD

The College's first annual Student Book Collection Contest will be held April 20 through 26, National Library Week.

Sponsored by the College Library and the Library Committee, the contest is designed to stimulate book collecting and reading.

Deadline for submission of entries is April 14. First prize is a \$25 book certificate from D - J Books. Second prize is a book from Pickwick Book Store. In addition the best undergraduate winner will be nominated for the \$1,000 Loveman National Award for a personal library sponsored by the Book-of-the-Month Club, the Saturday Review and the Woman's National Book Association.

The contest is open to all graduate and undergraduate students, whose collection, based on a unified theme, must consist of not less than 35 titles nor more than 50, owned and collected by the student.

Each contestant must also submit a brief essay and bibliography on his collection. Entries should be submitted to Jeanette Bernthaler, Head of Public Services at the Library.
