Two accreditation teams will be on campus Thursday and Friday, November 13 and 14.

A six-member Western Association of Schools and Colleges committee, led by Dr. Franklin P. Rolfe, Dean of the College of Letters and Science at UCLA, will evaluate the total efforts of the College.

A six-member Department of Education team, headed by Dr. Olaf Tegner, Chairman of the Department of Education, Pepperdine College, will evaluate the Elementary Credential, Secondary Credential and Elementary Intern Programs.

CSCSB WILL ACCEPT
WINTER APPLICATIONS
UNTIL DECEMBER 15

CSCSB is one of five of the state colleges which are still accepting students for the Winter and Spring Terms. According to the Admissions and Records office, 600 more ap-

plications can be accepted for the Winter Quarter before the December 15 deadline.

Spring Quarter applications will be accepted until March 17.

The four other state colleges still accepting applications for remaining terms this year are Stanislaus, Fresno, Long Beach and San Fernando.

Pre-registration for the Winter Quarter will be held November 14 to December 12. Pre-registration packets will not be mailed out but will be picked up at the Admissions office according to schedule.

Dr. James G. Nutsch, Asst. Prof. of History, was recently appointed to serve as editorial consultant and campus representative for The New Scholar: A Journal of Graduate Studies

in the Social Sciences. Dr. Nutsch states that manuscripts and articles by faculty and students are earnestly solicited for the publication which is a professional journal published bi-annually linking the Cal-State colleges.

Its scope encompasses the fields of social sciences as well as many related disciplines. The journal's policy is to provide an opportunity for graduate and qualified undergraduate students to publish scholarly works in a professional journal, a forum for students to express their opinions and attitudes on graduate and undergraduate education in the state colleges and the state of the social sciences at large, and a communications link between the students of the campuses of the state colleges.

State college professors, in co-authorship with a student, may submit manuscripts provided the student is cited as the senior author.
