### WINTER PRE-REGISTRATION PACKETS TO BE PICKED UP AT ADMISSIONS OFFICE

Winter Quarter pre-registraton begins today, starting with Graduates and seniors.

This quarter eligible students will pick up their pre-registration packets and instructions at the Information Counter at the Office of Admissions and records. Packets will not be mailed as they were last year.

The following schedule will be in effect for picking up packets:

Students admitted after the pick-up date for their category will receive their packet by mail as soon as it can be prepared.

Students returning a completed registration packet and a check for their total fees on or before their priority date will be given every consideration possible when class cards are selected. After receiving registration packets, students should see their advisors to select courses.

Pre-registration will continue until December 12. Students not pre-registering will register January 5, 1970.
