PUBLIC WORKS BOARD APPROVES FINANCING OF CAFETERIA PROJECT

Plans for construction of the College's first permanent cafeteria building passed another hurdle this week with Public Works Board approval of the financing arrangements.

Joseph K. Thomas, Executive Dean, said the last step before seeking bids is the securing of federal approval since Housing and Urban Development is loaning \$400,000 toward the \$2 million project.

"We hope to open bids in six to eight weeks," said Dr. Thomas. Completion of the facility will be keyed to the opening of the first residence halls in Fall, 1972.

The cafeteria project had been shelved for nearly two years awaiting clearance of funds. The HUD loan is based on the use of the cafeteria by the residence halls students. The balance of financing is from the state.

The split-level building will be constructed of reinforced pre-

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STATE COLLEGES NOW HAVE COMMON ADMISSIONS PROGRAM

A system-wide Common Admissions Program for all 19 California State Colleges was recently announced by Chancellor Glenn S. Dumke.

Beginning with the Fall, 1971, term, all applicants to State Colleges will file a single application between November 2-30, 1970, and will indicate as many as four choices of State Colleges in order

All applications received during the November period will receive equitable consideration within established categories and quotas, regardless of the time and date received. The single admissions application will be available by October 15.

A late filing period is scheduled to begin December 1 for colleges not filling enrollment categories during the November filing period. Applications will be accepted during the late period until quotas are filled.
