NEW DISCIPLINE AND GRIEVANCE PROCEDURES FOR ACADEMIC PERSONNEL

Under recent Executive Orders new grievance and disciplinary action procedures for academic personnel of the California State Colleges have been implemented by Chancellor Dumke. The Board of Trustees authorized the changes last September 23 to "provide fairness, peer judgment evaluation and prompt disposition of cases within the State College System."

The resolutions were approved by the Board on an emergency basis. A public hearing on the Trustees actions is scheduled at the Board's November 23-24 meeting in Los Angeles.

The new grievance procedures provide for committees of senior tenured faculty on each of the State College campuses to consider and make recommendations in faculty complaints in areas of retention, promotion and tenure, taking the form of peer group hearings.

The new disciplinary action includes provision for professionally qualified impartial hearing officers for the colleges, appointed by Chancellor Dumke, and a committee of senior tenured academic employees to make recommendations.

Cases for disciplinary action will be initiated by a campus
