The Bear Fire which raged last week, threatening residences of many College personnel, was beaten

Over 500 of the weary firemen rested and showered in the Gym. At one time some 40 fire trucks were on campus. Jim Penman, President's Assistant, Gil Rangel, Jr. and Clifford Ellis, students, "on-call" firemen with the Muscoy Fire Dept., assisted in halting the flames endangering the homes of Mireille Rydell, Fred Roach and Dominic Bulgarella. Bob Lohnes' home in Smiley Park was one of 63 left standing out of 112. Others who were evacuated or on alert to do so were Mary Williams, Art Nelson, Vivian McEachern and Keith Dolan.

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Wednesday, Nov. 24 - A panel discussion featuring members of the College faculty is scheduled from 4 to 5 p.m. in L-149. It will cover the need for international education.

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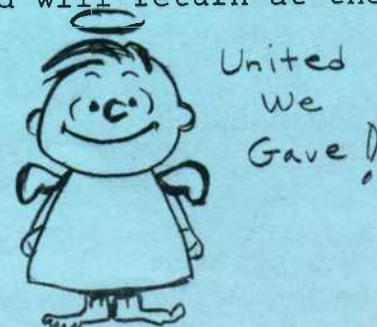
