B.A. IN GEOGRAPHY

The College has received approval of a degree program in geography from the Division of Academic Planning in the Chancellor's office.

The geography program will be offered effective with the 1971-72 academic year.

The new major brings the total of CSCSB degree programs to 21.

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SPRING QUARTER
PRE-REGISTRANTS
NUMBER 1,862

1,862 students (or 1,700 F.T.E.) pre-registered earlier this week for the Spring Term, filling 85 classes which include 38 lower division, 44 upper division and three graduate. Four hundred and nine classes remain open until regular registration on March 26.

Applications from new students will continue to be accepted for the Spring Quarter until further notice.

CONSTRUCTION
ON COMMONS
TO BEGIN SOON

Executive Dean Joseph Thomas has received word that federal bonds have been sold which will provide the remaining \$325,000 necessary to complete financing of the Commons (Cafeteria) Building.

Bids for the sale of the Housing and Urban Development bonds were opened February 17 at the Chancellor's office. The State Department of Finance has already approved release of \$1 million funds for the building.

A start-work meeting is scheduled March 8 between the Executive Dean's office, federal representatives, and the contractor, P & A Construction Co. of Torrance. Construction equipment will probably be moved onto the job site around the first of March.

Two task forces to develop plans for innovation in curriculum and improved use of resources in the state colleges have been appointed by Chancellor Dumke.

One task force will concentrate on educational innovation,

TASK FORCES - (Cont'd) considering such areas as advanced placement, challenge exams, better assignment of faculty resources and flexibility in administering budgets and exploration of partial conversion to an "open university" where degrees would be awarded for off-campus or extension study.

The second task force on improved efficiency in use of resources will work in the areas of maximum limits on units and prerequisites for degrees or credentials, tuition for unclassified graduate work, tuition for work exceeding degree requirements, admissions screening for new graduate students, simultaneous enrollment at several campuses, transfer credit difficulties, additional afternoon, evening and Saturday classes, and cost studies concerning possible discontinuance of certain majors and courses.

Recommendations from these groups will be presented to the trustees.
