The Cafeteria will begin 7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. hours starting next Monday, June 21, and continuing through July 30.

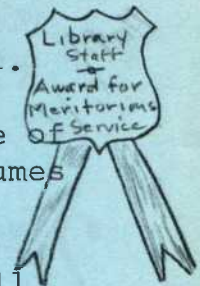
