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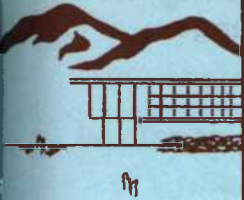

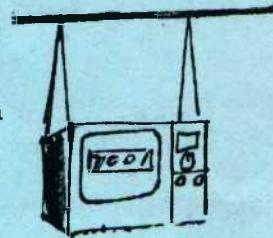

COLLEGE RECEIVES  
\$27,500 IN GRANTS

The National Science Foundation has granted \$20,000 for the 1971-72 year for "Maintenance of the Tribolium Stock Center" under the direction of Alexander Sokoloff, Professor of Biology. Dr. Sokoloff's research stock control center was established in 1967 on the CSCSB campus after stocks were moved from UC, Berkeley, and has been supported by NSF grants since then. Following this year's support, the NSF has reserved \$21,00 to continue support for another year, contingent upon availability of funds.

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The Petroleum Research Fund, administered by the American Chemical Society, has awarded a three-year grant in the amount of \$7,500 for individual fundamental research in the petroleum field, to John H. Craig, Assistant Professor of Chemistry. The grant is especially designed to assist young faculty members with modest programs of self-conducted research.

A service charge, subject to annual adjustment from the Chancellor's office, will be added to fees for lost and damaged books.
