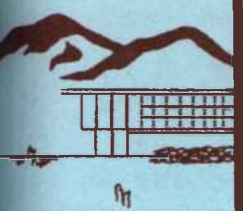

"FAIR SHARE?"

The FAIR SHARE PLAN adopted by Arrowhead United Fund has been nationally accepted for more than 20 years. It calls for pledging an hour's pay per month for most workers . . . and 1% of income for those earning over \$10,000.

This year the College's AUF goal is \$5,000. The campaign runs through November 12. Richard Bennecke, spearheading the CSCSB drive, states that this year the United campaign will be conducted on a personal responsibility basis, aimed at providing each individual member of the campus community with the opportunity to contribute his or her "fair share."

Packets of material, explaining the need and importance for contributing to the support of community organizations, are being distributed this week.

TOPIC OF WED. LECTURES

Critical environmental issues facing the world will be discussed by a geophysicist from the National Center

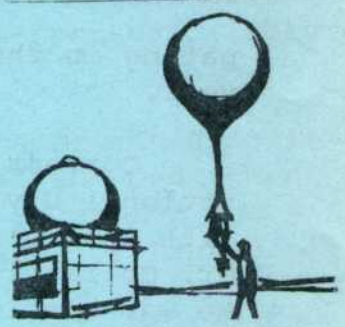
for Atmospheric Research in one of two lectures next Wednesday, November 3.

Dr. Douglas G. Fox, senior staff scientist with the Turbulent Interactions Group at the center, will speak at 11 a.m. and 4 p.m.

The morning lecture (PS-10) concerns environmental problems and will be illustrated with a 17-minute film, produced by the National Center, featuring time-lapse photography of atmospheric changes and pictures of solar flares and other natural phenomenon.

The afternoon lecture (BI-101), co-sponsored by the Sigma Xi campus chapter, will be devoted to turbulence in geophysics and what can be done about it.

Both lectures are open to the public. Interested persons and students from other schools are welcome.

COSTUMES HELP KEEP  
PLAY'S PLOT CLEAR

One of the highlights of the first play of the year, "The Conscious Lovers," will be its historically accurate 18th Century costumes, designed by Deirdre McGuire, technical director and designer for the College's Drama Department.

The bright, rich ensembles of the period were color-keyed by Miss McGuire to represent each family to help the audience follow the intricate plot. An estimated total of 1,200 hours have been spent in assembling and constructing the costumes which include velvet coats for the male actors and elaborate, corsetted gowns and other apparel for the women in the cast. One dress has 23 yards of lace and another has 15 yards of gathered lace in the sleeves.

Assisting Miss McGuire in constructing the costumes are Peggy Peden, Carol Hanvlik, Mary Alice McGowan and Dan Redfern, students. Miss McGowan and Mr. Redfern are also members of the cast.
