A brittle comedy of manners of the London of 1722, the College's production features attractive simplicity of the set and beautiful costumes created by Deirdre McGuire, technical assistant of the Drama Department.

Directed by Ronald Barnes, Chairman of the Drama Department, the play offers an interesting contrast of 18th Century morality against today's social standards.

Tickets are available for all performances which include, in addition to tonight's opening, productions on Saturday, November 13, a special benefit performance on Sunday, the 14th, and three showings (November 18, 19 and 20) the following week.
