SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO  
REVIEW COLLEGE ACADEMIC  
PROGRAMS AND GOALS

An ad hoc committee to review the academic goals and programs of the College will begin interviewing individuals and groups regarding the College's General Studies Program early next week.

Alfred Egge, chairman of the committee, states that the general studies requirements will be the first priority of his task force, which plans to hold weekly open forums dealing with the various aspects of general studies.

Meetings with each of the campus organizations are also planned. Dr. Egge states that the members of the ad hoc committee are interested in talking with each and every person who has ideas to contribute on the general studies program. "We all need to work together on the many questions which need to be resolved," said Dr. Egge.

In appointing the committee, President Pfau also charged it to review the large, medium and small class pattern; to review the educational goals; to review the number of professional programs; to review the phasing-in pattern of the master's degree programs and to explore whether or not the College should develop some form of external degree program.

The committee is also very interested in articulation of credits of transfer students.

Mr. Swim died at his home in Carmel on Monday of a heart attack. Chairman of the board of National Airlines, he became a trustee in 1968 under appointment of Governor Reagan.

170 STUDENTS NAMED TO ACADEMIC HONOR ROLLS Academic honors were awarded to 170 CSCSB students at the end of the Fall Quarter. Among the honor students were 13 students who carried 20 units and one who carried 25 units. Sixteen freshmen and 40 transfer students in their first quarter at the College were among the 170 honor students, which equals about 34% of the total list (10% first-time freshmen; 24% first-time transfer students). Fifty-one students were named to the President's List for achieving a straight A average for the quarter and 119 to the Dean's List for a B+ or higher average.

PATRICIA MARKS READS PAPER AT PSYCHOLOGICAL CONVENTION Patricia Marks, senior psychology major, wrote and presented a paper on "Development of a Flexible Generalized Control for Sitting Behavior" at the Behavior Modification section of the annual meeting of California State Psychological Assn. convention at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles, January 28.

Mrs. Marks also works at Pacific State Hospital in Pomona as a retarded children's specialist under the direction of Thomas S. Ball, sponsor of the paper. Research for the article was obtained from Mrs. Marks' work with retarded children, using techniques of operant conditioning.
