### COLLEGE RECEIVES ACCREDITATION FOR THREE CREDENTIAL PROGRAMS

The State Board of Education reaccredited the College's elementary and secondary credential programs and gave initial accreditation to the new program in early childhood education.

The accreditation, granted for the maximum period possible, extends through June 30, 1975, coinciding with the college-wide accreditation granted by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

The State Board of Education's approval means candidates recommended by the College will automatically receive their state credentials.

### JAMES CRUM NAMED NATURAL SCIENCES DIVISION CHAIRMAN

James D. Crum, Professor of Chemistry and Chairman of the Chemistry Department, has been named Chairman of the Natural Sciences Division,

CRUM NAMED CHAIRMAN - (Cont'd) Dr. Crum joined the College in 1966 and has served as a member of the Faculty Senate for four years, and recently concluded a two-year term as Chairman of the College R.P.T. Committee.

Dr. Crum has earned national recognition for outstanding work in organic chemistry and is the author or co-author of numerous professional papers and chapters in books and is co-author of Experimental Organic Chemistry, a widely-used text. Prior to coming to CSCSB, Dr. Crum was on the faculty at Case-Western Reserve University and, before that, a Postdoctoral Fellow at Harvard University.

DR. ROBERT HARRISON NAMED CSCSB'S FIRST PROFESSOR EMERITUS Robert Harrison, the College's first professor of art and Art Department chairman, became the College's first emeritus faculty member upon his retirement at the end of the academic year. The appointment was made by President Pfau in recognition of his service to the College and his leadership to the Art Department.

Dr. Harrison, who joined the College when it opened in 1965, also served as coordinator of the Art Department until November, 1970, when he was named Art Department Chairman. In addition, he served on Faculty Senate Admissions and Academic Standards Committee, Appeals Committee and Appeals Panel for two-year terms and on various other committees.

In community affairs, he served as a director of the Arrowhead Allied Arts Council and a member of the Orange Show Art Committee for a number of years. Dr. Harrison is listed in Who's Who in American Art and is a member of the College Art Association of America and the American Society for Aesthetics.
