### FALL '72 ENROLLMENT UP 300 OVER SPRING

2,613 students have enrolled for the Fall, 1972 Quarter, as of the second day of registration. This represents an increase of 300 students over the Spring, 1972 Quarter.

There is still space available in all majors, at graduate and undergraduate levels, according to H. Stephen Prouty, Associate Dean of Admissions and Records. The Admissions office will continue to accept new applications through October 4, the last day to add classes.

Students may apply until 8 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, October 2-4.

### OPTION IN HISTORY UNDER M.A. IN ED.

### APPROVED BY CHANCELLOR

Word was received this week that approval has been granted for the College to offer the option in History under the Master of Arts in Education, effective with the 1972-73 academic year. Chancellor Glenn S. Dumke notified President John M. Pfau of the authorization.

To be admitted to candidacy in the program a student must have (1) a B.A. degree; (2) a credential or year's teaching experience. In addition he must take the GRE exam and have completed three of the following courses: one in history, one in education and another either in history or education.
