### 1972-73 REGISTRATION TO BE HELD NEXT MONDAY AND TUESDAY

and one-half of the Juniors on Monday, September 25, followed by remaining Juniors and Sophomores and Freshmen on Tuesday, September 26.

The College opens its doors for the 1972-73 academic year with registration of Graduate students, Seniors

This Fall students may pay all fees except out-of-state tuition, foreign tuition and dormitory with BankAmericard. Forms are available at the Admissions Counter. Approval is required for \$100 or over and must be obtained prior to registration by the student by calling ZEnith 22-6000. Only California BankAmericards, numbered 4019 and 4024, will be honored.

Another "first" will be student photo identification cards, which will be required this year. The color photo, encased in laminated plastic, will be keyed for Resident Hall occupants and other students. \$1 will be charged for the I.D. cards. Robert Senour and his team of A-V assistants are handling the complete identification process.

### NEW PROGRAM TO ALLOW STUDENTS TO PURSUE STUDIES AT OWN SPEED

Independent study at the student's own pace is part of two study programs now being developed by faculty members. Funded by the California State University and Colleges through two grants totaling \$42,000, the projects will include self-paced laboratories in chemistry developed by Kenneth Mantei, Assoc. Prof., Chemistry, under a \$9,965 grant and opportunity for independent study and credit by examination, directed by Ralph Petrucci, Dean of Academic Planning. His \$32,000 grant provides release time for four faculty members and funds for equipment. The four teachers are Dalton Harrington (biology), Clark Mayo (English), Jack McDonnell (administration), and Ernest Garcia (education).
