NEWS RELEASE

TRUSTEES MEETING -(Cont'd) Wednesday, September 27:

- Approved a 1973-74 State-funded Capital Outlay Program request totaling \$128.9 million and a 1973-74 Non-State-funded Auxiliary Facilities Capital Outlay Program totaling \$18.3 million.
- Requested funds to provide a 7.5 percent salary increase and a 5 percent fringe benefits increase to faculty for 1973-74.
- Approved special salary adjustments to correct existing inequities ranging from 1.0 percent to 6.5 percent beyond the general and equity salary increases previously authorized in July and August for certain non-academic positions, retroactive to July 1, 1972.
- Increased student fees for Summer Sessions to \$27 (from \$24) per semester unit and \$18 (from \$16) per quarter unit.

In order to keep the College community better informed--especially in light of its growth and spreading physical distances--actions of the Administrative Council will be summarized in the weekly Bulletin.

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIONS -(Cont'd)

1. Endorsed the Chancellor's office proposal to the Board of Trustees revising enrollment ceilings for the California State University and Colleges campuses; maximum enrollment at some schools, such as Long Beach and San Diego, would be 25,000 with other students being diverted to different campuses; CSCSB San Bernardino's enrollment ceiling under this plan would be 12,000;
2. Set a \$3 replacement fee for lost student photo identification cards;
3. Approved operating procedures for investigating students' unpaid charges; set policies for withholding of college services when debts are unpaid;
4. Approved a 24-hour answering service for the College telephone; to be maintained by the College Police between 5 p.m. and 8 a.m.

U.S. PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN
MEMORABILIA NOW IN LIBRARY

Dale Wagner, Assistant Professor of Political Science at CSCSB, has amassed one of the largest collections of campaign buttons and memorabilia in the U.S. Part of his collection, 16 years in the making, is currently on exhibit on the First Floor of the Library.

Included in the group of buttons are medalets issued by Andrew Jackson supporters in 1824. a 1896 McKinley button, an 1860 ferrotype button for Abraham Lincoln ("one of the biggest users of buttons in our history," according to Prof. Wagner), a Stephen A. Douglas tintype from 1860 and countless other fascinating items.

The A-V- Dept. has set up tape recording of the voices of Grover Cleveland, William McKinley, William Jennings Bryan, Eugene Debs and many others.

Prof. Wagner is the author of A Concise History of American Campaign Graphics, 1789-1972, just published by Public Policy Research Associates, Washington, D.C. Copies of his book which is generously illustrated with pictures of his collection, are also on display.
