U.S. PANEL TO SUBMIT RECOMMENDATIONS ON CSUC SALARY INCREASES

Representatives from the California State University and Colleges and representatives of other state employee groups went before the Cost of Living Council last Tuesday in Washington, D.C. to appeal salary increase recommendations.

The increase of 7.5% for faculty and 12.2% for other employees has been held up pending approval by the council, which following the Tuesday hearing, stated that it will submit its recommendations within 15 to 30 days. Under Phase 3 wage controls, still in effect under Phase 4, the Cost of Living Council may challenge salary increases if they are in excess of and unreasonably inconsistent with the general wage and salary standard and with the goals of the economic stabilization program.

Representing the Trustees of the CSUC were C. Mansel Keene, Vice Chancellor, Faculty and Staff Affairs; Lois Feldheim, Faculty and Staff Affairs Specialist and Richard Sensenbrenner, Assistant General Counsel. They appeared as part of a coordinated presentation with the State's Director of Finance, Verne Orr; Alan Post, Legislative Analyst and other state officials.

CHANGE IN MERIT CASH AWARD REGULATIONS NOW IN EFFECT

Revision of Board of Control Rule 831 relative to the determination of cash awards under the Employee Suggestion System. Effective July 10, 1973

- (a) Cash awards shall be 10% of the net savings or increased earnings realized by the State during the first year following adoption of the suggestion, subject to (b), (c) and (d), below:
- (b) Awards computed under (a), above, will be reduced by the Merit Award Board under the following conditions:
 - (1) By 50%, where it finds there is unresolved controversy as to whether the proposal is within the scope of the suggester's normal job responsibilities.
 - (2) By 50%, where it finds the proposal required substantial refinement for implementation or where an alternative solution was adopted as a result of the proposal.
 - (3) By not more than 75%, where both conditions (1) and (2), above, apply.
- (c) Awards computed under (a) or (b), above, will be reduced by the Merit Award Board by 50% where the proposal results in one-time savings or benefits.

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MERIT AWARD REGULATIONS - (Cont'd)

(d) A cash award may not be less than \$10 and for suggestions received by the Merit Award Board on and after August 1, 1973, not more than \$10,000. An award of more than \$150 will be granted only upon recommendation of the Board of Control with the approval, by concurrent resolution, of the Legislature.
