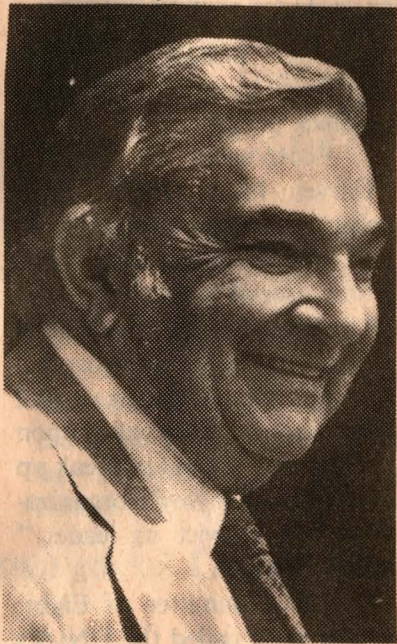

Congressional Hearing Comes To San Bernardino

Norton Employees Invited To Testify

Rep. George E. Brown, Jr., is encouraging civilian employees at Norton Air Force base to submit written testimony, detailing how they will be personally affected by the closure of Norton, when a House of Representatives Subcommittee holds a hearing in San Bernardino on July 9, 1990. The House Post Office and Civil Service Subcommittee on Human Resources will be looking at Norton as a "test case" to determine the needs of military base employees who face lay offs due to base closures and realignments.

The hearing will be held at 9:00 a.m. at the Norman Feldheim Library Lecture Hall, 555 West 6th Street, in San Ber-

nardino. Television station CATV of the City of San Ber-

nardino will tape and televise the hearing.

Witnesses at the hearing will include local and national representatives of the employee unions at Norton, as well as representatives from the military and from local job training organizations.

Brown is a senior member of the House Committees on Agriculture and on Science, Space, and Technology, and chairs the Agriculture Subcommittee on Department Operations, Research and Foreign Agriculture. He is also a member of the congressional Office of Technology Assessment executive board and the Task Force on Crime and Drugs of the Democratic Caucus.

Mandela's Triumphant Visit

The extraordinary impact made by Nelson Mandela on his visit to the U.S. is easily explained. The man is an authentic hero in an age where such people are in short supply.

Americans have just come off a decade of worshipping wealth for its own sake; of venerating financial manipulators, of indifference to the plight of poor people and minorities.

How refreshing then, to have among us someone who really believes in something worth believing in - and who has suffered 27 years in a South African jail for those beliefs.

And how inspiring that such a man could emerge from his unjust imprisonment bearing no hate, preaching racial peace, and still holding fast to the principles for which he sacrificed.

And in a television age that rewards sensationalism and media-grabbing tricks, Mr. Mandela proved to be the model of grace and dignity.

His acclaim in our country sends a very strong message to his oppressors in South Africa that the American people support his cause of Black liberation.

That will give a big boost to the beleaguered Black majority in South Africa, which, despite the new realism of the country's

rulers, is still under the thumb of apartheid.

Mr. Mandela himself has made the point that while he is now at liberty, he still cannot vote and is still subjected to racial restrictions imposed by the White majority.

His political message to our national leaders was to keep the pressure on White South African, and that message must be heeded.

There's too much talk about "rewarding" South Africa's president, Frederik de Klerk, for releasing Mr. Mandela and some other political prisoners - although many remain in jail - and for moving toward serious negotiations about turning South Africa into a democratic state.

President de Klerk, his sympathizers say, is under heavy pressure from the extremists in his country, who will do anything to prevent Black liberation.

He is, and as Mr. Mandela has said, he deserves the kudos he's received for finally doing the inevitable and leading his country down a more reasonable path.

So long as he continues to negotiate seriously with Mr. Mandela's organization, the African National Congress, the

U.S. should be very vocal in support of his efforts.

The U.S. should inform the South African people that once an agreement is reached between their government and the ANC, we are prepared to lift sanctions and provide support for a new, racially fair South Africa.

But, as Mr. Mandela repeatedly stated during his visit, it would be a terrible mistake to do that now, while Blacks are still denied elementary human rights.

Sanctions brought South Africa's White leadership to the negotiating table - crippling the economy to the point where it was necessary to recognize the ANC and negotiate a new order.

When African Americans and their allies were fighting to have sanctions imposed, the official line was that they wouldn't do any good.

Well, they did. And they remain a valuable tool to keep the nation's rulers at the table, and to force them to negotiate seriously.

Our support for South Africa's struggling Black majority has been amply rewarded by the inspiration Mr. Mandela's visit brings to all Americans, and especially to African Americans still struggling to win our fair share of the land we helped build.

S.B. School Board Member, City Councilman Head New Anti-Gang Task Force

There is a good chance that the future of San Bernardino City Schools will be brighter because of two dedicated community leaders - Hardy L.

Brown, Board of Education member, and City Councilman Jess Flores, who are co-chairmen of the new Anti-Gang Task Force.

An impressive group of concerned citizens, which includes representation from City government, the schools, the police department, the business community, parents, former gang members, and all ethnic groups within the city, is meeting to share concerns and develop strategies to attack the scourge of gangs, drugs and violence which threaten schools and neighborhoods.

Brown and Flores agree that there is a disparity when you look at percentages of Blacks and Hispanics who are endangered by gangs and drugs as compared with the popula-

tion at large. This is one reason the new task force is being co-chaired by leaders from the Black and Hispanic communities.

A goal of the group is to provide a forum where people from different ethnic and economic groups can exchange ideas and engage in open dialogue as they explore ways to confront the growing threat of gang and drug activity in neighborhoods and around schools.

City government officials, school personnel, and police leaders are interested in hearing from parents, students, business leaders, former gang members, and others as they work together to stem the tide of violence in San Bernardino.

School Board member

Brown said: "There has been considerable public discussion about what the San Bernardino City Unified School District is or is not doing in relation to potential gang activity on our campuses. If a gang threatens the safety of Black students or attracts them into crime, those gangs must be stopped, whether they are Black gangs or gangs composed of any other ethnic group."

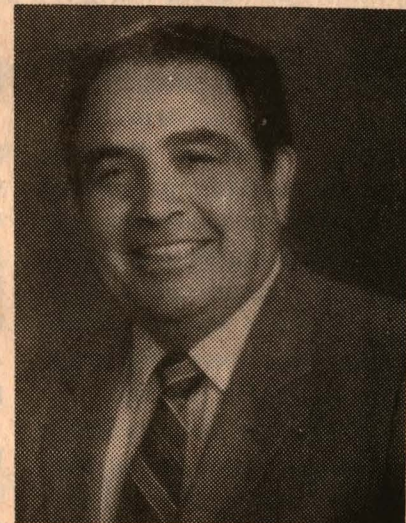
Brown further added, "I have no intention of surrendering the safety and order of our campuses to any gang, no matter what its ethnic makeup may be. Further, I intend to cooperate fully with law enforcement agencies to ensure that our neighborhoods are not surrendered to gang control as some area of Los Angeles Coun-

ty seem to be."

"As a Black man and as an elected official, I will not tolerate discrimination against any race, nor will I sit still for civil rights violations; but at the same time, I will not accept violence, especially not on school campuses."

In explaining why a task force is needed, Councilman Flores said: "Our state and country are being devastated by this phenomenon. To address this deterioration of values and restore respect for our fellow humans, we must return to the basics: love of God, self, community, and country and we must teach our children to respect themselves and others."

"This country's greatest natural resource - our children - is going to waste. We, as

The Amazing Mandela

The world is changing at a rapid rate, but our government's view of communism hasn't changed. When Nelson Mandela refused to denounce three of the United States enemies, eyebrows were raised. And Mandela's reply was, "your enemies are not my enemies." He stated that these leaders gave him and his people full support during his many years in prison.

Additionally, Mandela has angered some because he refuses to adopt non-violent tactics and denounce his supporters, Castro, Arafat, and Khadafi. However, his unwavering position has earned him respect from the African American community.

We must continue to keep all sanctions in place until all of the citizens of South Africa are free to vote for representation of their choice.

Ayala Challenges Bader To End Ghost Voting

Senator Ruben Ayala (D-Chino) recently called on his opponent to voluntarily stop "ghost voting" in the Assembly Chambers. Ayala said that on June 14, 1990, Charles Bader (R-Pomona) took credit for 69 Assembly floor votes which he was not actually present to cast.

"Despite the fact that Bader did not set foot in the State Assembly Chambers for the evening session of one of the busiest legislative days of the year, the Assembly Journal reads as if he were actually present," Ayala said. "I think that is deceptive."

"Mr. Bader may very well have had important business to handle while the rest of his colleagues were working that night. However, in the spirit of legislative ethics reform, I feel he should be honest enough to let the record show he was not present rather than taking advantage of tricky techniques like using Northern California legislators to cover his tracks," Ayala said.

June 14 was the deadline for acting on bills in their house of origin. Most legislators worked late and a large gallery of staff and other observers noted that Mr. Bader did not return after the dinner break.

"During the following three hours, Fresno Assemblyman Bill Jones went to Mr. Bader's desk and operated his voting lever 69 times. It's not clear to me how someone from Fresno would be very sensitive to issues in cities like Ontario, Pomona and Chino," Ayala said.

In 1984, California voters approved Proposition 24, a measure to reform state legislative practices. While it was ultimately invalidated because some provisions conflicted with the State Constitution, the measure called for an end to ghost voting. Many Assemblymembers have voluntarily adhered to the ban.

"No one has ever cast a vote in my name in the State Senate," Ayala said. "I have never allowed anyone to impersonate me. And if I miss a vote or choose not to support a bill, it is properly recorded in official records," Ayala said.

"Mr. Bader, however, is

using a system which allows him to duck out of Assembly sessions and use legislators from other parts of California to ghost vote for him."

"This is simply an instance of one date where official records will indicate that Assemblyman Bader participated in debates and cast votes for his district when, in fact, he had ducked out of the Assembly Chambers that evening and let someone else's fingers do the talking for him. voters have no way of knowing how many similar occurrences have taken place in the past."

"In the Senate, every vote I cast or don't cast is recorded for public review. That's the way the system should work. I think as a matter of professional ethics, Mr. Bader should voluntarily accept those same guidelines for himself," Ayala said.

"During our campaign for State senate, each of us will stand on our records. The difference apparently will be that I actually cast the votes recorded after my name."

"Until Mr. Bader changes his ghost voting system, there will be no way to tell how many of his votes were actually cast in his absence by people representing Fresno or other parts of California," Ayala said.

New Study Says Majority Of Blacks In Or Near Poverty

Although the Black middle class continues to grow, a recently released study by a group of business and academic leaders concludes that a majority of the nation's African-Americans live in or very near poverty.

The study by the Business-Higher Education Forum found that approximately 33 percent of Blacks lived in poverty and that another 25 percent to 30 percent "lived at the margin" of poverty earning minimum wage and not qualifying for government assistance.

Meanwhile, an estimated 36 percent of Black families had

Where's Jesse? He Should Be In The Library

I don't know if Jesse Jackson got a bum rap or not when Time magazine reported that within Nelson Mandela's entourage there was the fear that Jackson "would take advantage of his (Mandela's) presence and upstage him."

Time said that Jackson "had a way of getting into camera range at nearly every point along Mandela's route. The New York-based organizers of the Harlem rally made a point of keeping Jackson off the list of speakers, despite his best efforts to be added to the program."

"It didn't help when the master of ceremonies told the crowd. 'I know for many of us it's been a long time since we've really loved a leader,' " Time reported, referring obliquely to Jackson, generally considered to be America's premiere Black leader.

However, Jackson was so invisible at the Mandela rally at Yankee Stadium, that the New York Daily News, also conditioned to expect Jackson at all media events, asked in a headline: 'So What Happened To Jesse Jackson?'

"That was the big question everyone was asking last week after Jackson abruptly disappeared from the stage as Nelson Mandela was speaking. Just before, Jackson and his entourage were seen frantically whispering to Mandela trip organizers," Mike Santangelo wrote.

"Jesse, Jess Everywhere" was the headline for Tony Kornheiser's Washington Post column. "At breakfast, we all write down three places where we think Jesse Jackson will be during the day - a labor dispute in Miami, a political luncheon in New York and negotiating for a hostage release in Beirut. Then we tune in the 6 o'clock news to see where Jesse's been, and who's ahead."

"And he's on TV every day. No matter who's making news, Jesse is right there at his side. If he was any closer to Nelson Mandela, they'd be doing the lambada. You can't crop him out of a photo," Kornheiser observed.

On one of those many appearances on TV, the ubiquitous Jackson also proved that he was correct when he told Playboy magazine that he hated to read. For a fact, he has never read "Marcus Garvey, Hero" (The Majority Press, Dover, Mass.) by Tony Martin or, better yet, "Garvey" (Dodd, Mead) by Elton C. Fax.

During a TV interview, in which he named Black victims of government conspiracies by White people, Jackson included Marcus Garvey. His point was

that D.C. Mayor Marion Barry and all other Blacks who are caught smoking crack cocaine or stealing the public's trust are only guilty of being the victims of White racism.

Garvey was innocent of the legal charges, but was largely convicted because of the anti-Garvey climate created by the nation's most prominent Black leaders. Since 1917, undercover police had spied on Garvey and by 1919, U.S. officials were looking for a way to deport him. Powerful Black integrationists, "whose main goal was to try and win acceptance by White Americans," Tony Martin explains in his book, gave the government racists what they needed.

In addition to waging a relentless campaign against Garvey for believing that Black people could build their own institutions and succeed without White help, Black leaders "actually made fun of his color and physical features."

"A little, fat black man, ugly, but with intelligent eyes

and a big head," W.E.B. Du Bois, of African-French ancestry, called the man who had accomplished for Black people what all of his Black-leader enemies combined could not do. And "black" in those days to the integrationists was a pejorative term.

The integrationists were powerful; they had the ear of the influential Whites in government and industry, although they failed to mobilize the mass of Black people.

Following a vicious "Garvey Must Go!!!" campaign, the integrationists who had named themselves "The Committee of Eight," wrote the United States Attorney General in January, 1923 and demanded Garvey's immediate arrest and deportation. "They called upon the attorney general to break up the UNIA (Garvey's organization) and convict its leader," Martin writes.

The Committee of Eight, whose letter called the UNIA's members "Negro criminals and potential murderers moved by intense hatred against the white race," also protested the time it was taking the government to bring Garvey to trial, writes Fax

in "Garvey."

"The Eight" signers who wanted Garvey imprisoned because he believed in Black self-help were: Robert Abbott, publisher of the Chicago Defender; Rev. Robert Bagnall, a high-ranking NAACP official; George Wesley Harris, publisher of the New York News and a lending Harlem Republican; Harry Pace; John E. Nail; William Pickens, field secretary of the NAACP; Chandler Owen, a leading socialist and joint editor with A. Philip Randolph of the Messenger magazine, a vortex of anti-Garvey hate; and Julia P. Coleman.

These Black integrationists were also psychologically White racists. "The Blacks who fought him (Garvey) so bitterly were by so doing giving expression, in their own way, to what racism had done to dehumanize them," concludes Elton Fax in "Garvey."

If Jackson is going to spend so much time promoting himself in the media as the leader of Black people, he needs to spend more time in the library studying their history - like Nelson Mandela has.

Tips On Overcoming Sleeplessness

Dear Dr. Levister,

I recently developed problems sleeping. Why? What can I do? Insomniac at 65.

Dear Insomniac,

The sense of not getting enough sleep affects 20-40 percents of adults.

There may be predisposing factors such as being tense or driven. Depression or neurological problems can be a cause. Some people are programmed to sleep for short periods.

Precipitating factors are events in life that trigger sleeplessness such as increased responsibilities, loss of a loved one, shift work or jet lag.

Perpetuating factors are behavior that help to maintain

sleeplessness such as irregular sleep habits and the use of drugs.

You should try to get a good nights sleep without drugs by:

Keeping to a regular schedule of going to bed and getting up; avoid napping.

Exercise regularly, preferably in the late afternoon or early evening to burn up those stress chemicals but not immediately before bedtime.

Avoid caffeine in coffee, tea, colas and chocolate from early afternoon on.

Drink alcohol moderately and not after dinner as when the alcohol wears off sleep is disturbed.

Keep the temperature consistently at a comfortable level, 65 to 68 degrees Fahrenheit.

Eat lightly if you eat at bedtime.

If you can't sleep get out of bed, go to another room and wait until you are sleepy to try again.

Sleeping pills will transiently treat the symptom. If your insomnia persists despite the above, talk it over with your personal physician to cautiously approach and evaluate the reason for disruption of your sleep.

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Nutrition alert for the over-50 set.

Millions of adults over 50 are literally starving themselves of important nutrients each day when they sit down to eat, according to recent studies. 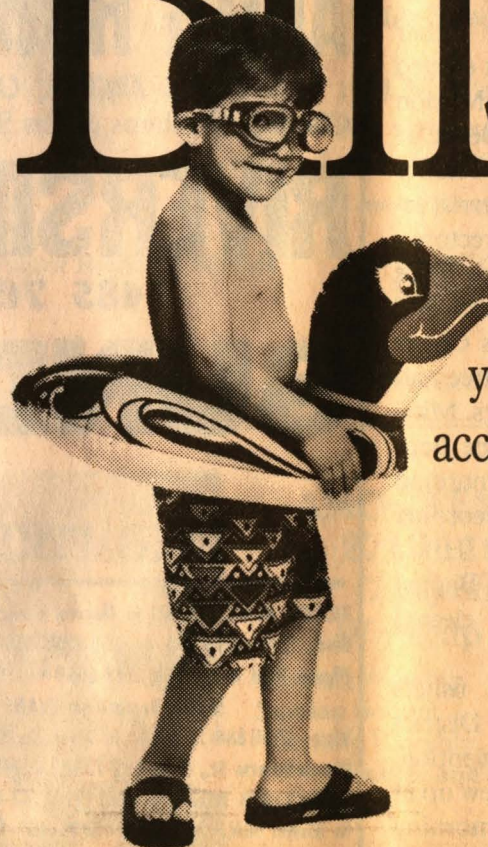
Cool Your Summer Electric Bills.

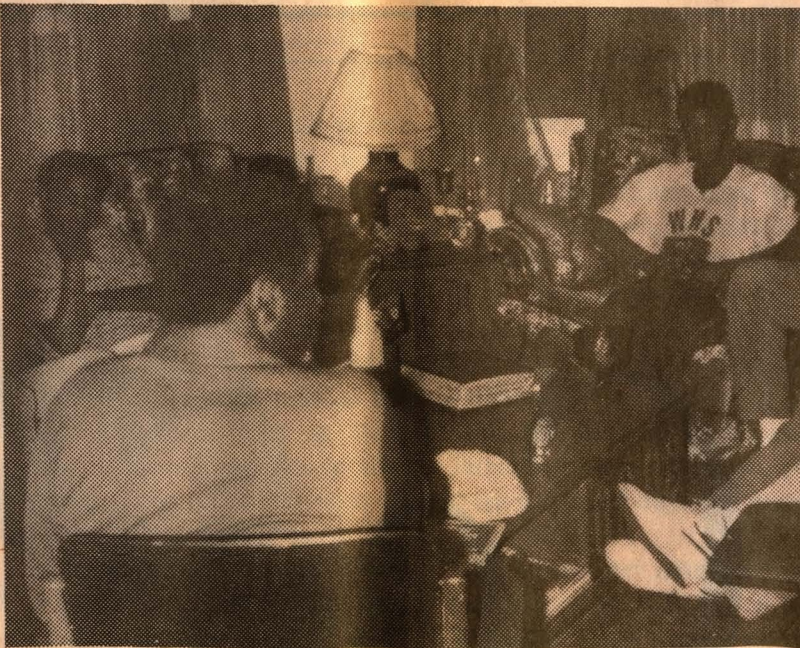

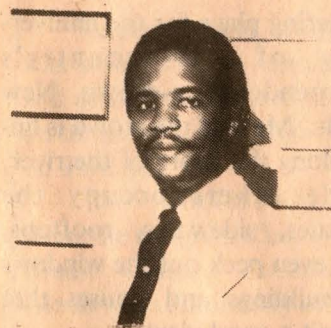
During the installation ceremony on Friday Night, Mr.

I WORRY TOO MUCH?

QUESTION: Dear Pastor Woods, I must confess: I am a worrier. I always worry. I worry about my kids. I worry about money. I worry about my relatives. I'm beginning to realize that this is not good. What can you suggest that will help me stop worrying?

ANSWER: You have made the first important step: that is to realize that worrying is not good.

Many people equate worrying with caring. They are not the same. What is worrying?

Worrying is meditating on a problem. The Bible says we are to meditate on God's Word. As you meditate on God's

Word you receive inspiration, hope, strength, and encouragement.

When you meditate on problems and circumstances you become anxious, depressed, sad, hopeless, and discouraged. Take a look at Matthew 6 verses 25 through 34.

It addresses the subject of worrying. It says, instead of worrying about the circumstances (which God is fully aware of) begin to trust in God and put Him first; and the promise is that He will add everything you need.

The problem is when people put their personal circumstances, needs, and desires first and then (or maybe) seek God. God cannot help you like He wants if you keep getting in the way.

Worrying is synonymous with lack of trust. You cannot act in faith/trust and worry at the same time. Realize automatically when you are worrying that you are not trusting God. By the way, when was the last time your worrying produced any results?

Let me conclude with these refreshing words from the Scriptures: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not unto your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will direct your paths." (Proverbs 3:5,6)

The VIP Travel and Social Club is a new and unique concept in the travel agency business. It was created in order that potential travelers can meet through social activities before they embark on travel ventures.

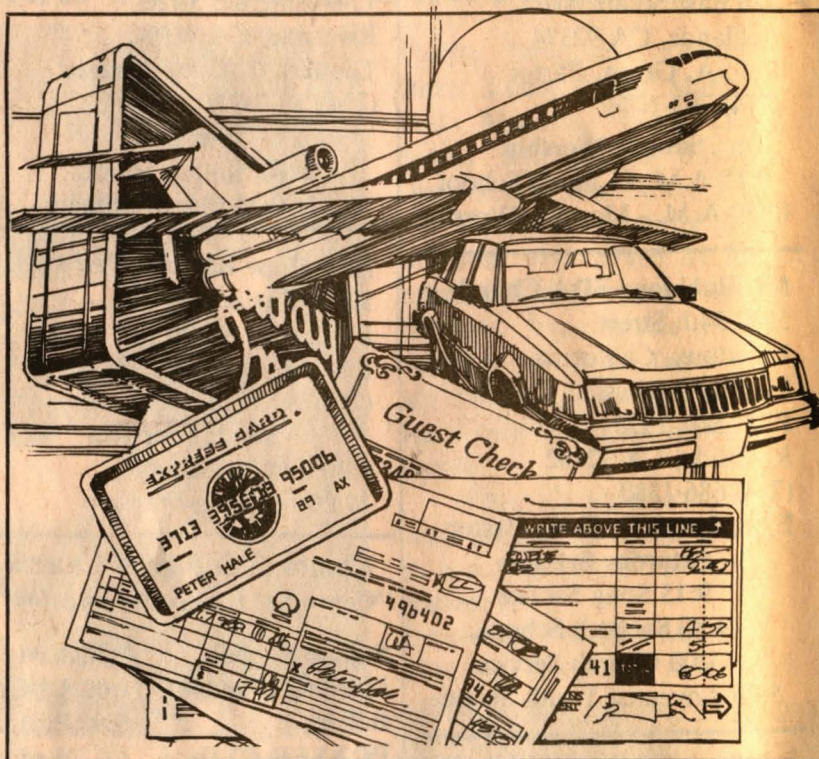

"The Greater Riverside Area Urban League Holds Third Annual Dinner"

The Greater Riverside Area Urban League celebrated its Third Annual Dinner on June 16, 1990 at St. Andrew's Newman Center in Riverside.

Though the theme for this year's dinner was the Vision of the 90's there was much emphasis on the Greater Riverside Area Urban League's recent affiliation with the National Urban League and the absence of Speaker of the California Assembly, Willie Brown, Jr. who was the announced guest speaker. Senator Robert Presley stood in for Brown.

Several other political dignitaries also attended the gala celebration. They were Congressman George Brown, Assemblymen Steve Clute, Assemblymen Jerry Eaves and Councilman Jack Clark.

Assemblyman Clute who was scheduled to introduce Speaker Brown stated several reasons why Brown may have been unable to attend the dinner. "Many budgets had to be passed through the house," he said, "this may have caused him (Brown) not to be here." He then introduced Senator Presley.

"California is growing," said Presley who chairs the Appropriation Committee in the Senate. But he said California does have problems. Some of them are crime, drugs, acid rain, pollution contaminated water, a budget that's 2-3 billion out of balance, affordability in housing and a distrust in government.

Presley said there is a wide ethnic and geographical diversity in California. But he said only 40 percent of the people are registered to vote and just a few of them bother. "Many of these people lack vision."

Presley said the most important accomplishments in the society is education which is one of the focuses of the Greater Riverside Area Urban League. He said though there are problems with our educational system that some solutions would be to improve the quality of our high schools, increase scholarship, increase students aid and a better quality of education. "Keep America learning something."

Some of the other problems Presley addressed were AIDS, health care, mentorship programs for youth and teen pregnancies. Problems that don't just pertain to California but across the nation.

After Presley spoke, a nine minute video of Brown was shown. In it Brown talked about many of the topics that Presley had covered. His main emphasis however was on the recent primary election. He also spoke about reapportionment, growth of the people in California, the budget and the affordability of health and auto insurance protection. "All of these things must be aggressively pursued," said Brown.

Another speaker, Congressman George Brown, said that we need organizations like the Urban League. He said he's encouraged because when we (Congress) look at problems for what they are; we can make it work.

Chairman of the Board,

Ameal Moore gave the State of the Urban League address while Rose Oliver, executive director congratulated supporters. In her message Oliver stated the past accomplishments of the Greater Riverside Urban League and the vision of the 90's which is to seek affiliations with various organizations to implement and develop programs to provide a better quality of life for all.

Several awards were given at the ceremony. The Outstanding Service Award went to Robert Holstein. The Vernon C. Jordan Distinguished Humanitarian Award went to Dr. Oliver Thompson.

Mr. and Mrs. Holstein received an award in appreciation for their generous contributions to the Greater Riverside Area Urban League and Chief "Sonny" Richardson received an award for chairing the banquet committee the last two years.

Winners of this year's college scholarship were Jermaine Drake and Sophana Sin. Drake is a graduating senior from Norte Vista High School who received \$1,500 in scholarships and will be attending the University of California in Riverside majoring in Computer Science. Sin is a senior from Canyon Springs High School in Moreno Valley who received \$500 in scholarships and will be attending Riverside Community College this fall majoring in Pre-Med.

Building Wealth Is The Critical Need Facing Blacks

A new report is out highlighting the desperate economic situation collectively faced by this nation's African-American population.

Reviewing a summary of the report by the Business-Higher Education Forum, one can only conclude the following: Black folk need money and they need it badly! Stated differently, every major social problem faced by Blacks in America would be eliminated or significantly lessened if Blacks owned and controlled more of this nation's wealth.

Note some Forum findings and those of similar studies:

- * The typical White family has twice as much yearly income as the typical Black family. But more alarming, the typical White family has accumulated nearly 12 times as much wealth as the typical Black family.

- * A clear majority of Blacks either live in poverty or very close to it. According to the Forum report 32 percent of Blacks are officially classified as poor. Another 25 percent live "at the margin" of poverty.

- * As for the Blacks not living in or near poverty, an estimated 36 percent has incomes of at least \$25,000 a year and are thus technically labeled "middle class." Finally, there is the remaining 7 percent of Blacks who can be said to be prospering.

- * Add the above figures, factor in inflation and do some quick division and you will reach the same conclusion the Census Bureau did: Overall, the economic standing of American Blacks has gotten worse over the last ten years while that for Whites has generally improved.

Third-World status because of our apathy and neglect.

"In referring to gangs, I am talking about groups that are formed for self-protection, turf identify, and for intimidation of others both in an out of their immediate surroundings. Because of peer pressure youngsters and adults in gangs and prevented from obtaining an education and developing the intelligence to make good choices.

NSBA Publishes Legal Guide On Religious Issues And Public Schools

Understanding how the U.S. Constitution affects religious issues and the public schools is the focus of a new monograph published by the Council of School Attorneys, a component of the National School Boards Association.

Religion, Education and the U.S. Constitution is a 112-page compendium of nine articles, written by 13 attorneys who serve public school clients. Collectively, the articles explain how the establishment and free exercise clauses of the First Amendment affect curriculum, student programs and activities, employment and administrative decisions made by local school boards.

"The information provided gives practical tips for school leaders in considering the constitutional provisions affecting the public schools," said Donald B. Sweeney, Jr., chairman of the NSBA Council of School Attorneys, who is a school attorney in Birmingham, Alabama.

The articles discuss:

- * Public aid to parochial schools;

- * Religious-based objections to public school curriculum and instructional practices;
 - * Unemployment compensation laws and employer policies concerning the rights of an employee to freely exercise religious beliefs;
 - * Use of school facilities by outside religious groups;
 - * Religious apparel worn by teachers;
 - * Home schooling;
 - * Accommodation of employees' religious observances;
 - * Policies and practices concerning religious expression in the schools, including prayer, Bible reading, religious holidays and displays; and
 - * The Equal Access Act and student groups.

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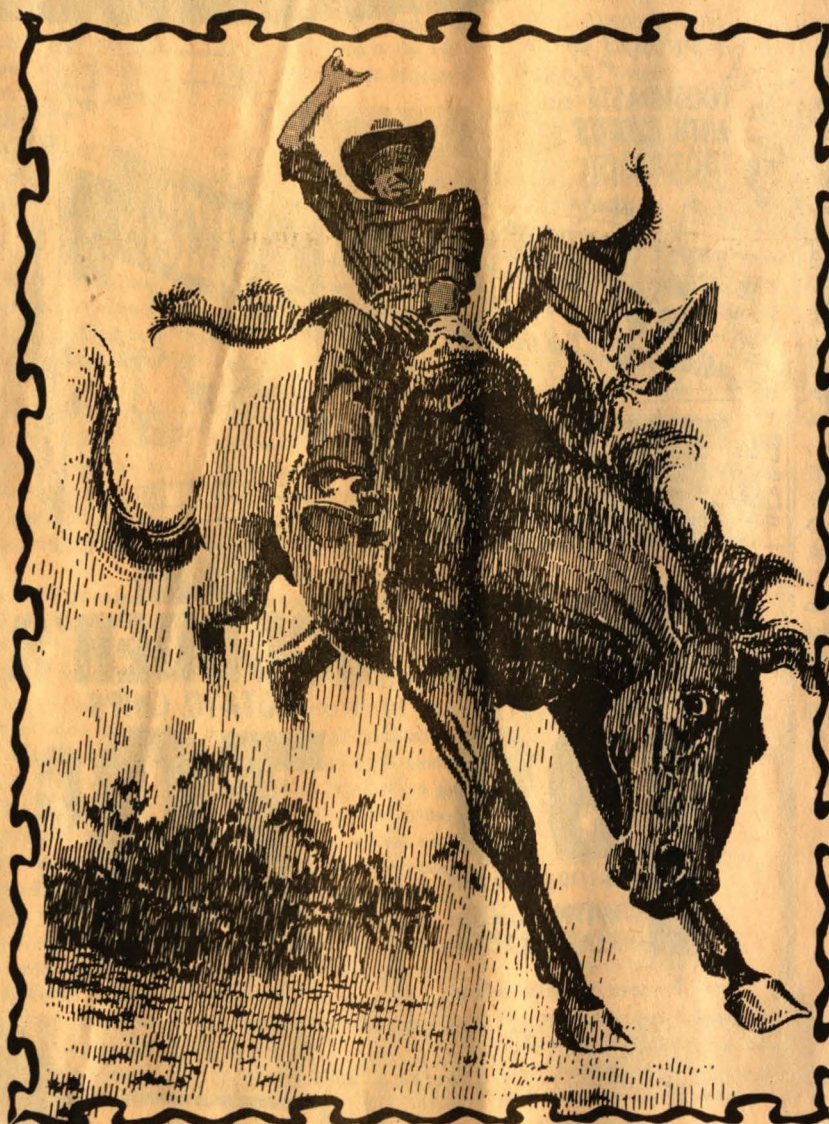
Actor Glynn Turman Named Grand Marshall Of Coors Pickett Rodeo/Black Voice News Named Official Sponsor

the Spirit in games through Monday.

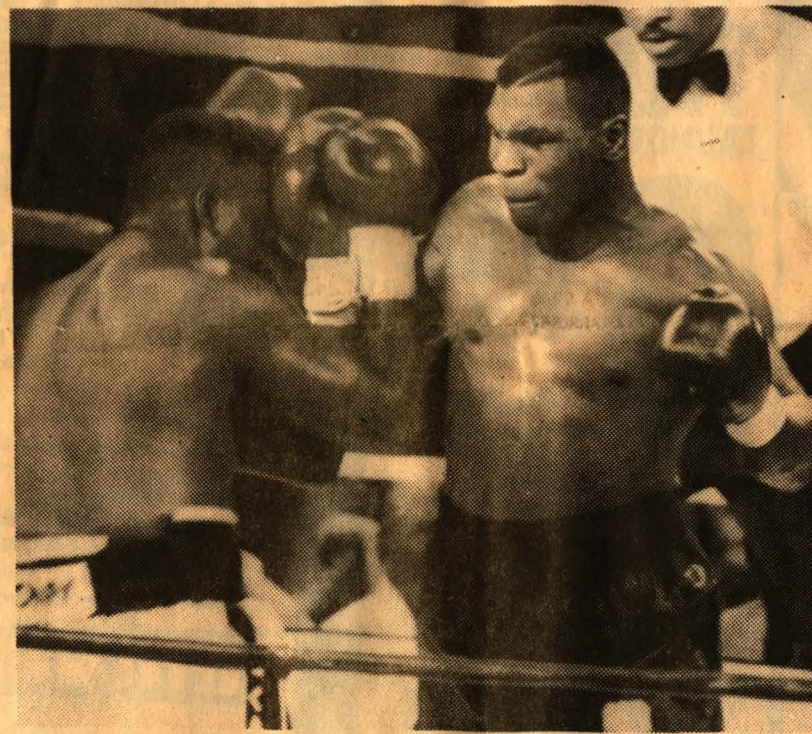

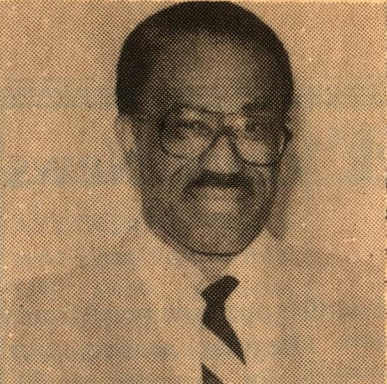

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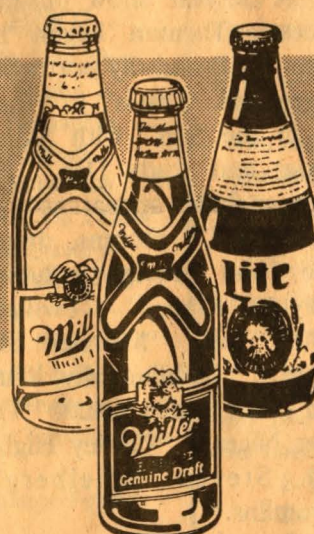


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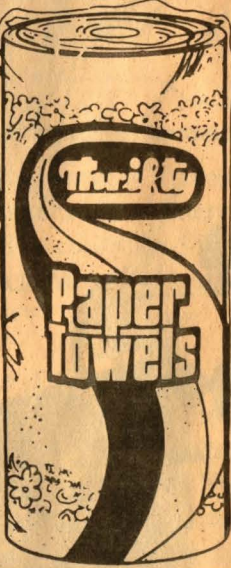
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Black And Hispanic Students Show Gains In 1990 Cap Tests - Riverside City Results

Recently released results of the California Assessment Program tests from December 1989 - a survey of the academic skills of 12th grade students - showed

According to Dr. Robert Ferrett, the district's Director of Research and Evaluation, RUSD twelfth grade Hispanic and Black students outscored their county and state counterparts on the December 1989 12th grade state writing test. Hispanic students scored at 243 (up 10 points), and Black students averaged 225 (up 14 points). The comparable statewide scores for these minority groups were: Hispanic 218 and Black students 215.

that RUSD Black and Hispanic students made significant gains in reading over the previous year, and were ahead of their counterparts in the County and State in both reading and math with one exception.

Blacks students at RUSD high schools scored 215 in reading, while county students

scored 214, statewide the score for Blacks was 199. In math, Black students scored 198, county students 199, and state students 193.

Similar results were noted for Hispanic students. Hispanic attending Riverside City high schools scored 232 in reading, countywide their score was 201, and statewide this score was 202. The math score were 218 for RUSD high school Hispanics, 200 in the county, and 210 in the state.

Saturday Academy For African American Youth To Be Held At UCR

The University of California, Riverside next fall will host the Saturday Academy, a new community-based program for African-American youth from Riverside designed to enhance academic skills and expose students to the contributions of African-Americans throughout history.

Up to 40 African-American youth in grades six through nine will participate in the twice-a-month Saturday morning classes from Oct. 6 through Dec. 15 in UCR's Learning Center. Additional sessions are planned for each quarter during the academic year.

The Saturday Academy, presented by the Youth and

Education Committee of the Riverside civic organization Black Summit, is based on similar programs elsewhere in California that help foster greater enthusiasm and achievement in school among African-American youth.

UCR's support of the program addresses a key recommendation in "Making the Future Different," a report of the University of California Task Force on Black Student Eligibility. The task force identified factors that contribute to the relatively low rates at which African-American students become eligible.

"That report was the catalyst for our campus getting involved in this project," said

Eric Gravenberg, director of Undergraduate Admissions at UCR and coordinator of the Saturday Academy.

The curriculum will include math, science, language arts, communication skills, African American history, and cultural awareness. Courses will be taught by teachers from the community who are volunteering for the project.

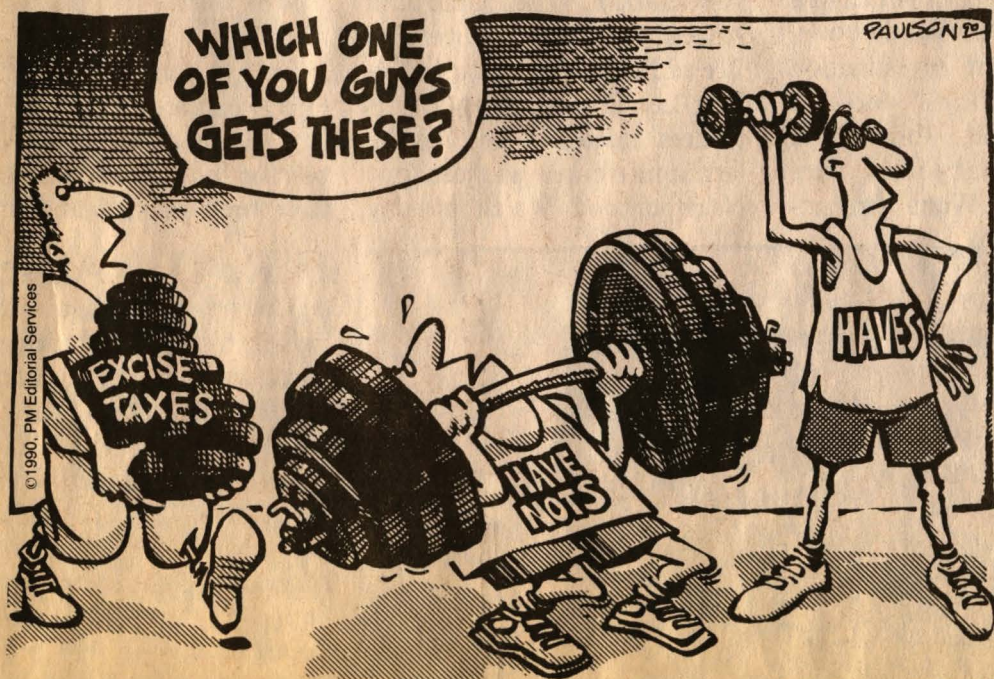
In addition, workshops on topics such as reading, health awareness, substance abuse prevention, and preparing for college will be offered for parents to enhance guidance of their children through their formative years.

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Community Members Fight Against Crime

In response to increasing crime and gang influence from south-central Los Angeles moving into the east Hollywood area, the Church of Scientology and neighbors recently launched the first anti-crime Neighborhood Watch in the area. More than 125 community members turned out to the meeting to join forces to "take back the community" stated Church of Scientology spokesperson, Cat Tebar.

The meeting was sparked by a gang member attack on a member of the Church of Scientology and his five-year-old son, who were shot when the Church member stopped to admonish a group of youths spraying graffiti on a building, close to his home. One shot was fired, going through the child (who was being held by his father) and wounding the man. The child is currently in stable condition.

Subsequent investigation by police officials and the Church security force have found that the youths were members of a Watts gang at-

tempting to expand their territory into the east Hollywood area.

"There is a war going on and we are under siege in our own community by drug influenced gangs," stated Tebar, "by joining together and resolving to rid the area of this influence in cooperation with the police, we can reduce crime and make our community safe for everyone."

The meeting was held to organize the new anti-crime watch and brief the community on the increasing gang influence as well as give the facts and successful actions on how to diffuse the encroachment of gangs in the community. Speakers from Councilman Woo's office, the Los Angeles Operation Clean Sweep program, President of the Silver Lake Improvement Association, the Guardian Angels, and LAPD officer Ben Lee addressed the meeting. Officer Lee, in addressing the attendees stated that this was the largest turn out he had seen for a Neighborhood Watch meeting

in his five years working in the Hollywood area.

"Gang related violence has been on the increase since gangs have been making and selling

"crack" - a mixture of cocaine & other chemicals dried into "rocks" for smoking. Gang members in Los Angeles

Tebar, "It's not a small time operation. We need to band together to keep our neighborhood safe."

H.R. 4330 Allocates Funds To Develop Programs For K-12 Children

Earlier this year I was pleased to introduce legislation to promote voluntary national service. The bill, H.R. 4330, The National Service Act, addressed the needs of K-12 school children and channels the desires of America's college students to improve their communities through activities that provide loan deferment or loan forgiveness. This legislation authorizes the creation of the American Conservation Corps (ACC) and establishes the Youth Service Corps (YCS).

As we enter the last decade of this century, a consensus has emerged about the need for a governmental role in promoting and coordinating efforts to address social problems through community service. H.R. 4330 authorizes \$35 million to promote "service learning," a tool which combines community service with academic and is a method by which teachers can energize themselves and their students.

The bill provides \$25 million to encourage college students to tutor disadvantaged students in schools which provide Chapter I services (federal math and reading programs); to encourage those who take part in the Students Literacy Corps to tutor the illiterate parents of disadvantaged elementary school students; and, to enable institutions of high education to train teachers and create or expand service opportunities or

their students.

The bill provides \$83 million for the ACC and YSC. The ACC is intended to perform such projects as conservation, rehabilitation and improvement of wildlife habitat, rangeland, parks and recreational areas as well as urban rehabilitation, historical and cultural preservation, and others. The YSC would allow youngsters to perform community service in government agencies, nursing

homes, day care centers, law enforcement agencies and other nonprofit organizations.

The legislation also authorizes \$40 million for a series of demonstration projects intended to call attention to special social needs. For example, it authorizes a demonstration program to prompt intergenerational exchange by encouraging foster grandparents to participate in the Head Start program. It creates a program

intended to enhance service opportunities for rural youth, and one which provides construction skills training for disadvantaged youth.

In short, the legislation gives disadvantaged youth the opportunity to serve their country, their community and themselves. At a time when many Americans, particularly students, feel alienated from the system, this civic-minded youth initiative makes good sense.

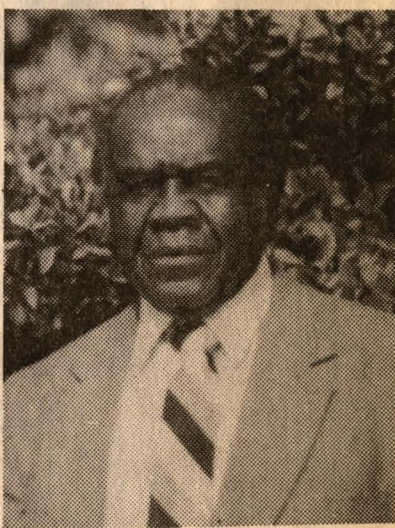
Perris Trustees Attend CSBA Meeting

Seafood on the grill is one of nature's great tastes, and fish and seafood are a natural, healthy "fast food" that takes just minutes to cook. Whole fish, steaks and fillets will take between 6 and 12 minutes per inch thickness. Shrimp and scallops take 1 to 3 minutes per side depending on size. Remove fish from the grill when it is just opaque throughout. The most important thing to remember: AVOID OVERCOOKING.

BARBECUED FISH ON A BUN

4 fresh or frozen fish fillets (6oz. each)
1 tblsp. light olive oil
1 bottle barbecue sauce
4 buns of choice
4 lettuce leaves

Rinse fillets under cold water. Pat very dry. Brush lightly with olive oil. Grill fillets skin side up over hot coals about 2 minute. Turn and brush fillets with a generous coating of barbecue sauce. Grill 2 to 3 minutes longer depending on the thickness of the fish. Grill buns slightly to warm. Place grilled fillet on top of lettuce in each bun. Offer additional sauce on side. Serves 4.
