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

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Delgado Selected to Lead San Bernardino City Schools

The Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources of the San Bernardino City Unified School District is the Board of Education's choice for superintendent of the District. Dr. Arturo Delgado takes over from Dr. E. Neal Roberts, who retired on June 30, 1999.

Dr. Marlin Brown, Board president, said Delgado brings a wealth of experience and knowledge to his new assignment. The Board and I have agreed that with his extensive background in education and in our District, Dr. Delgado is the right person to guide us into the next millennium. He has been leading our Human Resources division for two years and has brought us through an extremely rough time of recruiting and hiring new teachers. Because of San Bernardino's size, class size reduction has hit our District especially hard, but

the task of finding us the very best teachers available.

The new superintendent says he is looking forward to the opportunity to lead the tenth largest school district in California. "Among large urban districts, San Bernardino stands out as a good example of what can be done with hard work and determination. Our recent test scores are a good example of that. Although, historically, students from districts like ours aren't expected to do as well on standardized tests, I'm delighted that San Bernardino has kept up with districts throughout the state. Yes, of course, I see room for improvement, but we have made an extremely fine start," Delgado says.

From his first assignment as a teacher is Baldwin Park nearly 20 years ago, he has come up through the ranks, serving as an assistant principal, principal, coordinator and assistant superintendent in the Alvord Unified School District.

He was educated at East Los Angeles City College and California State University, Los Angeles, receiving both his bachelor's and master's degrees. He earned his doctorate in Education Management from the University of La Verne.

The new superintendent was selected from a field of 29 candidates after the District instituted a nationwide search Dr. Delgado has never wavered from last March to replace Roberts.

Riverside County Community Action Plan Meets in Palm Springs

Education, government, corporation, non-profit organization, community leaders and elected officials completed a three day conference recently held in Palm Springs for first ever Riverside County Community Action Planning concept in which conference members finalized 90 day and annual community action planning projects for the county. The goal of the conference was to

bring community leaders from every sector of the county into a single location and discuss and analyze the most critical needs in the county and formulate solutions, via community action plans (CAP), to improve the quality of life for Riverside County residents, said Dr. David Long, Riverside County Superintendent of Schools, in his initial talk to the conferees.

Throughout the conference, the 180 conferees participated in a series of workshops where discussions centered on vital issues affecting the general population. Issues were identified into subject areas and conferees organized into task forces based on those issues, focusing on the development of community action plans on 90 and yearly time frames.

Forty-nine high school juniors and seniors have been designing and building robots and studying ways to reduce air pollution in a five-week residential program at the University of California, Riverside to help students prepare for college and stimulate their interest in science, mathematics and engineering.

The MESA (.Mathematics, Engineering an Science Achievement) Summer Program, was scheduled to

Senator Baca Campaigns for Congress

State Senator Joe Baca (D-San Bernardino) issued the following statement: "Congressman George Brown was a great man with an unrivaled record of public service. He will never be replaced, no matter who runs in the upcoming Special Election.

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"But despite our collective loss, the law requires that Governor Davis call a Special Election. He has.

"Seven weeks from now voters will be faced with the decision of who can best represent San Bernardino County in the United States Congress.

Washington, D.C. The Washington, D.C. office and the district office of the Late Honorable George E. Brown, Jr. will continue to serve the people of the Forty-second Congressional District of California under the supervision of the Clerk of the House of Representatives. Representative Brown died July 15,1999.

Staff members of Representative Brown remain on the House payroll under the supervision of the Clerk of the House to receive and undertake constituent casework, to help in handling business with the departments of the executive branch of the government, to provide general status information and pending legislation and to offer other general constituent services provided by House offices,

Jeff Trandahl, Clerk of the House of Representatives, said that Washington D.C. office and the California district office are presently open on a daily basis to accommodate congressional business.

Under House rules, the Clerk manages the offices when a Member dies, resigns, or is expelled. This authority which does not include voting representation, continues until a successor is elected to fill the vacant seat. This the third vacancy of the 106th Congress; nine such House vacancies of sitting Members occurred due to death or resignation in the 105th Congress.

Leader of Chicano Movement Visits Riverside on Aug. 5

Organizations at the University of California, Riverside are sponsoring a reception and book signing for Dr. Jose Angel Gutiérrez, one of the principal leaders of the Chicano movement, from 6:30 to 9 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 5 at Zacatecas Hall, 2472 University Ave., Riverside.

Dr. Gutiérrez, along with César Chavez, Reises Tijerina, Corky Gonzáles and many others, helped to shape the Chicano movement of the 1960s and '70s. His activism included co-founding MAYO (the Mexican American Youth Organization) and La Raza Unida Party (RUP), the political party that took control of Crystal City and their areas of South Texas.

Today, he is a practicing attorney and a professor of Political Science at the University of Texas. He is the author of a memoir called, "The Making of a Chicano Militant: Lessons from Cristal."

He will appear in Riverside sponsored by the Hispanic Bookcase, a Riverside book store, as well as several UCR based organizations: the Department of Ethnic Studies, Chicano Student Programs, Movimiento Estudiantil Chicano de Aztlan (MEChA) and the Ernesto Galarza Public Policy Research Bureau.

Armando Navarro, chairman of the Ethnic Studies Department, said the theme of the reception if "Revisit the Chicano Movement Era." In an earlier review of Gutiérrez' book, Navarro called it "provocative, insightful and extremely revealing...His candid portrayal of his life as a militant activist is a major contribution to the study of Chicano politics."

Dr. Carlos Vélez-Ibáñez, professor of Anthropology at UCR and the director of the Ernesto Galarza Public Policy and Humanities Research Bureau, will speak at the event. (909) 787-4577.



The following article is a plea from two separate families who each has a child in critical need of heart transplants. The families are urging the public to aid in locating heart donations.

*My name is Brenden Currie. I was born on July 8, 1999, in Vancouver, DC, Canada. I was born with hypoplastic right heart syndrome with several other complications. I was flown down here from Vancouver Children's Hospital when I was one week old. The David Foster Foundation is sponsoring my mom and dad so they can be here with me. I need a new heart soon so I can grow up and play with my big brother.

* My name is Samuel Marty. My parents discovered in May that I would be born with a fatal condition called hypoplastic left heart syndrome. They decided to move to Loma Linda so I could receive a heart transplant from the most experienced surgeons at the best medical center. They moved from Kennewick, Washington, in the middle of June and I was born on July 2. I've been waiting for a new heart for over three weeks, and my mommy and daddy are really worried.

If the worst should happen, and either of our sons dies waiting for a donor heart, we are committed to donating their healthy organs to help save other infants who may need them.

Ortiz Named Tournament Umpire

Ortiz began his career as a baseball umpire in 1972. By 1975 he was umpiring Little League baseball. Often better known as "Blue," Ortiz has officiated everything from Little League to high school and college games, including All-Stars.

He joined District 21 umpires in 1984. Since then, Ortiz has umpired district, sectional, division and Junior Western Regional tournaments.

And while as an umpire not everyone might approve of every call he makes, the players seem to respect him. Ortiz received a rousing chant of "Rob, Rob, Rob" as he arrived at Pico Park in Grand Terrace to umpire a girls' softball game.

In June, 1999, Dennis Lopez was appointed as the first Director of MESA Schools Program at UC-Riverside. The MESA Program, a 25-year program in California, is designed to prepare students to enter math and science majors at the college level.

Lopez has a long career in higher education, having served as Assistant Director of EOP/SAA at UC-Irvine, has held administrative positions in Sacramento at California Postsecondary Education Commission, worked with MALDEF as State Policy Analyst/ Lobbyist, and as National Census Director. He has also taught at Lehman College of the Bronx and Cal-State, Long Beach.

Lopez comes from the tough Southeast San Diego area in a single parent family of eight children, he being the fourth and graduated from Lincoln High School in 1975.

"I was not the best student in school, however, I was fortunate in having a mentor and role model in Dr. Ruben Carriedo, my counselor in high school, who was instrumental in encouraging me to concentrate in my studies and strived for a college career. He was responsible for my application being accepted at Irvine. He is truly a friend

Lopez said that he learned early in life that education was his only option to escape the poverty he experienced while growing up.

He received a B.A. in Comparative Cultures-Social Science at UC-Irvine, an M.Ed. Administration, Harvard School of Education and completed his Ed. D. in Administration, Planning and Social Policy at Harvard Graduate School of Education, and will complete his dissertation, "Assessing the Impact of the Elimination of Student Affirmative Action in Freshmen Admissions at a Campus of the University of California" in mid- 2000.

In reviewing his early life and total educational and professional opporunities, Lopez said that he added a second principal. "It is my strong belief that we can always give back to the community by expanding educational opportunities."

"I am very proud of my wife, , Dr. Teresa Marquez-Lopez, who earned her doctorate in 1998 from Teachers College of Columbia University, and my children, David, 10, and Andrea, 4."

HEAD START REGISTRATION IN RIV-ERSIDE COUNTY IS NOW IN PROCESS

Riverside County Schools Win Grants

Riverside County Superintendent of Schools Dr. David Long announced that the Riverside County Office of Education has been awarded two major grants to tutor students and for school-to-work programs county wide.

The first grant, a \$300,000 Academic Volunteer and Mentor Service Grant was offered through the California Office of the Secretary of Education Gary Hart. The grant was offered on a competitive basis to all public schools in California. Sixty of 184 applicants received awards totaling over \$5 million.

Six hundred students who are in need of academic tutoring will receive services over a three year period, beginning on Sept. 30. Mentor volunteers will be recruited to work one on one with students and their teachers to improve academic achievement.

The Coachella Valley and the Perris and Jurupa areas have been targeted for help with the new grant. The program will focus on students enrolled in Special Education, Alternative Education (including Court/ Community Schools and Pregnant Minor Programs), and several other county wide programs such as the Regional Occupational Program and Migrant Education pro-

lent of grams.

The Riverside County Office of Education has also received a grant award of \$1,045,169 for the 1999-2000 Riverside County School to Career Partnership.

The grant will be shared by a consortium of 18 public school districts and four community college districts in Riverside County, from Corona to Blythe. The award will allow the partnership to continue its efforts toward ensuring all students are prepared for post-secondary education.

"School-to-Career" is an approach to education that links students, parents, schools, businesses, and dator to create a brighter future for all of California's youth. It's a new way of preparing students for entry into college and careers by making learning more relevant. Students taught in this manner do better academically, are committed to lifelong learning, and gain a better understanding of the skills needed to be successful.

Thirty-seven School-to-Career partnerships submitted applications, and Riverside County's was one of only two grant proposals in the State that received a score above 90 points (out of 100).

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All proceeds go to the Advancement and Economic Development of Hispanic Owned Businesses and the TELACU Education Foundation for the Inland Empire Student Scholarship Program.

BOP Partners with Construction Professionals

SAN BERNARDINO-Understaffed by some 4,200 workers, the Southern California construction industry is forming a partnership with the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools (SBCSS) Regional Occupational Program to train students in the construction trades.

The shortage estimate of qualifed workers from the industry in Southern California comes from The Associated General Contractors of California (AGC), a trade association headquartered in Sacramento.

To address the shortage, AGC California and SBCSS ROP are in the process of developing a two year curriculum that will provide students with the opportunity to enter apprenticeships at a higher level with advanced skills. In addition to classroom instruction, the program will include field trips, guest speakers and on the job training.

Careers in the construction trade in-

industry workers need to understand weights, measures, schedules, drawings, written manuals and directions."
