TRUSTEES ADOPT POLICY ON AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

The California State University and Colleges Statement on Nondiscrimination and Affirmative Action was approved by the Trustees on January 23.

The statement calls for each campus of the CSUC to "treat all persons in employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex or national origin, and to distinguish among persons on the basis only of merit - their abilities, talents, knowledges and achievements."

Under the provisions of the statement each campus is to develop a written affirmative personnel policy consistent with the Trustees' statement and must adhere to its principles and policies.

On the CSCSB campus President John Pfau has appointed James Thomas, Dean of Academic Administration who has been placed in charge of the overall coordination for the College, as Chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee - Affirmative Action Plan. The committee is charged with bringing the existing CSCSB Affirmative Action Program of October 4, 1972, into conformance with the new Trustee policy. The committee, asked to complete its work by March 29, held its first meeting yesterday. Members are Carol Goss, Melvin Hawkins, Oscar Jackson, Joe Martinez, Raymond Mendez, Ralph Petrucci, Michael Rasmussen, Lydia Sanchez and Lyn Young.

Copies of the Affirmative Action Statement of the Trustees are available on campus at the offices of Faculty Senate, President, Personnel, Academic Administration and Staff Council Chairman.

LIBRARY RECEIVES
DONATIONS OF TWO
LAW BOOK COLLECTIONS

The Library now has 122 years of California case law on file, thanks to the generosity of Mrs. E. John Eriksson, whose late husband practiced law in San Bernardino for 46 years, and Homer Bail, Mr. Eriksson's partner of 39 years.

The Eriksson library of 689 law books, codes and assorted volumes and the 683 volumes of the Bail collection, including 63 volumes of case law dating from 1850 to 1883, will help present and future students at the College with their research in political science, government, California history, criminal justice, public administration and even fields such as economics, acknowledged Arthur Nelson, Library Director.

Mr. Eriksson began his practice in San Bernardino in 1927 and was joined by Mr. Bail in 1933.

A CONCERT PIANIST

Pianist James Spaight will be guest artist in a Noon Concert held on campus next Wednesday in FA-104. The program, open to all, is free of charge.
