COLLEGE'S EIGHTH ANNUAL
COMMENCEMENT TO HAVE
33 MASTER OF ARTS CANDIDATES

The College's Eighth Annual Commencement will see an unprecedented number of Master of Arts candidates receive degrees. To date 13 graduate students in the Department of Psychology, 8 in the Department of Administration and 12 in the School of Education have filed petitions to receive M.A. degrees. At last year's commencement, the first time masters degrees were awarded, six students received M.A.'s.

Assoc. Dean of Activities R. DeRemer, who is coordinating the ceremony, has announced the marshals for the event. John Craig, Asst. Prof., Chemistry, will serve as College Marshal for the second consecutive year; Paul Johnson, Assoc. Prof., Philosophy, will be Faculty Marshal and Dalton Harrington, Chairman and Assoc. Prof., Biology, will serve as Student Marshal.

This year the CSCSB Concert Band, under the direction of James Gibford, will provide music for the processional and recessional.

The exercises will be held at 10:30 a.m., Saturday, June 15, on the South Gymnasium Lawn. The Bookstore is presently taking orders for caps and gowns rental at a fee of \$6.25. Deadline is May 23. Tickets will be required for guests attending the ceremony and are available at the College Relations office until May 29.

PROCEDURE OUTLINED FOR
CANCELLATION OF VOLUNTARY
PAYROLL DEDUCTIONS

The Chancellor's Office has asked the CSUC campuses to publicize the procedure to be followed when cancelling voluntary payroll deductions.

The complete seven-step procedure is contained in Faculty and Staff Affairs (FSA) 74-29 dated April 16, 1974, and applies only to voluntary payroll deductions, not deductions for the State-sponsored programs (health benefit program and State-sponsored deferred compensation plan). It is emphasized that requests for changes in payroll deductions should be initiated early in the month so that there is adequate allowance for the mail delivery time and processing time required by a company or organization to act on a request.

The Personnel Office (Ext. 215, SS-151) has copies of the procedure as outlined by the Chancellor's office and will be glad to assist College employees who plan on cancelling voluntary payroll deductions or who have been having trouble in having deductions cancelled.
