EARLY COUNT SHOWS 3,860 STUDENTS ON CAMPUS THIS FALL

Figures for Fall enrollment, taken as of the second day of registration, show 3,860 students on campus, an increase of 450 over the same date last year. The count does not include late registrants who had from September 25 until October 1 to register.

The actual student count equates into a full-time equivalent of 3,136, an increase of 344 as of the second day of registration in 1974.

In both enrollment and F.T.E. the increase over last year's figures indicates an approximate 13% rise.

Official fall enrollment count will be made on the October 15 Census Date, which is also the last day to drop classes.

M.P.A. AND M.B.A. DEGREES NOW OFFERED

The College has received approval from the Chancellor's Office to offer the degree of Master of Public Administration, effective with this academic year. The M.P.A. program is intended to provide the student with a generalist perspective of public administration; including tools of decision making, an understanding of the total public administrative system, and a capacity for understanding and being able to work within the public environment.

This degree is intended for continuing graduate students and career people seeking to develop and/or strengthen academic and professional skills. It is open to all students, regardless of undergraduate major.

The College also has secured approval to offer the Master of Business Administration, effective immediately. This program is designed to provide flexibility for the student to prepare for a career in administration in the private or public sector. Its objectives are to provide the student with the tools of decision making, an understanding of the total administrative system and a capacity for understanding inter-relationships. This program is also open to all students, regardless of undergraduate major.

The degree of M.A. in Administration with its concentrations in business administration or public administration is being phased out.

RETIREMENT-RELATED
DIRECTIVES AVAILABLE

In July and August two Faculty and Staff Affairs directives were received from C. Mansel Keene, Vice Chancellor, both pertaining to retirement. For the benefit of employees who were not on campus this summer, a brief summary is given here.

FSA 75-52 concerned Preretirement Reduction in Time Base (Article 6.5 of the California Administrative Code) which permits an academic teaching employee to phase into actual retirement through reduction in time base to an average of half time while maintaining full retirement and other benefits and implements authority granted under the Education Code. The letter outlines payroll and reporting instructions for employee members of the PERS and the State Teachers Retirement System who request and are granted participation in the program.

FSA 75-44 pertains to PERS Legislation on Reduction in Minimum Retirement Age from 55 to 50 and has attached a copy of Assembly Bill No. 1065 which becomes effective January 1, 1976. This bill reduces the PERS minimum retirement age from 55 to 50 and provides for a corresponding actuarial reduction in the retirement allowance. This law pertains to all members of the Public Employees Retirement System.

A copy of both FSA 75-52 and 75-44, with attachments, is available in School Deans' offices and P.E. Dept. Chairman's office. A copy of FSA 75-44 is also available in the Personnel Office.

PROFESSIONAL RECOGNITION

Robert Blackey (History) has been appointed the Chief Reader-Designate for the College Board Advanced Placement Examination in European History for 1975-76. In this capacity he will also serve on the Examining Committee.

Amer El-Ahraf (Health Sci. & Human Ecol.) presented three papers on the areas of trace metals and environmental health administration at conferences this summer. The first was presented in the Conf. of the Nat'l Environmental Health Assn. (Minneapolis, June 28-July 3), where Dr. El-Ahraf also chaired the Housing & Urban Development Section. The second two were presented in the Conf. of the Int'l Assn. of Milk, Food & Environmental Sanitarians (Toronto, Aug. 10-14).

Stuart Ellins (Psychology) has received a \$3,500 grant from the Los Angeles Co. Agricultural Commissioner to supervise a Coyote Taste Aversion Project in the Antelope Valley, the purpose of which is to avert coyotes from killing sheep by a non-lethal means and return them to their natural food supply. The project will be carried out by psychology graduate students.

Paul Johnson (Philosophy) read a paper, "The Ultimate Location of Value; An Inconsistency in Utilitarianisms and Some Other Types of Ethical Theories," before the combined Lilly Philosophy Workshops, July 29, at Stanford University.

Sarojam Mankau (Biology) presented a joint paper with her husband R. Mankau, UCR, at the Organization of Tropical American Nematologists, held in St. Lucia, West Indies, this summer.

Judith Rymer (Education) has been appointed by the San Bernardino County Commission on the Status of Women to a task force on Sexism in Education. She will direct service workshops for school districts in San Bernardino County.
