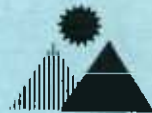

OPEN ENROLLMENT PERIOD BEGINS FOR HEALTH INSURANCE

An open enrollment period on basic and major medical insurance for College employees began October 1 and continues through November 15. During this time employees can change plans, sign up for the first time and/or add dependents not now covered. For further information and application forms, contact the Personnel Dept., SS-151, Ext. 7205.

New employees are reminded that they have 60 days from the date of their appointment to enroll for health insurance coverage. Enrollment forms are available in the Personnel Dept.

OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR DEFERRED COMPENSATION

During the same period (October 1 through November 15) there will be an open enrollment period for College employees interested in the State of California Deferred Compensation Plan. This will be the only time during the year in which changes may be made in existing enrollments, or new enrollments may be received.

The Plan gives state employees opportunity to set aside a portion of their net income now, deferring payment of income taxes until the money is actually received (during retirement when the tax base will be lower). Minimum amount deductible is \$25. Maximum cannot exceed 90 percent of the employees' total monthly gross earnings.

There is a choice of three investment companies: Cal-Western States Life (fixed or variable annuity); T. Row Price Assoc. Inc. (offering shares in a no-load Growth Stock Fund); and Great Western Savings & Loan (savings). Some new companies will be added to the program this year.

An official state holiday, Columbus Day, has been designated by the College Calendar as an in-lieu day, to be used on Friday, November 28.

Commissioned and funded by the State of California, the murals are the work of Joseph Moran, Asst. Prof., Art; Dan Vasquez, Juan Esqueda, Peter Rodriguez, and Nick Bashaw, art majors, and Shirley Bowers, CSCSB graduate. The paintings depict transportation development in San Bernardino and are part of a statewide DMV project to make the field offices an integral part of the community served and to reflect the culture of the area.
