\$56,000 GRANT AWARDED FOR BILINGUAL PROGRAM

A state grant of \$56,000 has been awarded to the College for a bilingual cross-cultural teacher training program.

The career progression plan will enable teachers' aides in bilingual (Spanish-English) classrooms to work toward a B.A. degree and a teaching credential. Ernest Garcia, Professor of Education, is director of the grant.

Six school districts are participating: Coachella Valley Unified, Ontario-Montclair Elementary, Chaffey High Unified, Riverside Unified, Colton Joint and San Bernardino Unified school districts.

Thirty full loads of schooling are provided by the grant, according to Dr. Garcia. "It is intended primarily for juniors, seniors and graduates working toward their teaching credential."

Twenty-four students are now enrolled at CSCSB under the program, which started with the Fall Quarter. All receive a \$1,700 stipend and will continue assisting in the bilingual classrooms as well as attending classes.

In other areas within the state, such programs as Portuguese-English, Chinese-English and Navajo-English are in effect, depending on the need.

**LIBRARIAN-AUTHOR
TURNS PUBLISHER**

Michael Burgess, Public Services Librarian, recently formed his own publishing company, R. Reginald, The Borgo Press. The company's large-sized quality paperbacks will be distributed by Newcastle Publishing Co., Inc., of Hollywood, which has distribution agreements with other firms in Canada and Australia.

The first three titles in the series, to be published in March, 1976, are The Beach Boys, Southern California Pastoral, by Bruce Golden, Associate Professor of English; Robert A. Heinlein: Stranger in his own land, by George Slusser, former member of the CSCSB English faculty, and Star Drek, a parody of the TV series, by "C. Everett Cooper."

Mr. Burgess has five books appearing from various publishers in 1976: Science Fiction and Fantasy Literature: A Checklist and Contemporary Science Fiction Authors II (Gale Research Co. of Detroit, publishers); three anthologies (Arno Press Supernatural and Occult Fiction Series), edited in collaboration with Douglas Menville.

Mr. Burgess is also editor of the Forgotten Fantasy Library. Six volumes have already been published in this paperbound series, the last two in September, and four more are scheduled for publication in 1976.
