STUDENTS TO DANGER

Peter Rodriguez and Chris Taylor, student assistants in the A-V. Department, are credited with quick-thinking and perhaps forestalling what might have been a serious mishap, last Wednesday.

The two students, enroute via the freight elevator to the Fifth Floor of the Library, noticed smoke pouring into the elevator and the Fifth Floor area which was enveloped in smoke. They set off the fire alarm, saw to the evacuation of students from the study cubicles and then set about retrieving the audio-visual equipment they originally had been sent to pick up.

The alarm alerted the students and staff in the Library, who left the building. Eleven firemen and three fire engines arrived at the scene.
