Mysterious death of Cal State prof

Dr. Marvin Frost Dies in Jungle

Dr. Marvin Frost, associate professor of geogrpahy here at Cal State San Bernardino, was found dead Thursday, April 21, in the jungle of Belize (formerly British Honduras). He had been missing for five days and it is suspected that he had been dead for four to five days.

Dr. Frost was on sabbatical this quarter. He had traveled to Belize before and was familiar with the country. He was equipped with only a camera and a machete, and was trekking through the dense jungle in an attempt to photograph Central American wildlife.

The cause of Dr. Frost's death, according to police superintendant Kent Haylock, has not yet been determined. However, the growth of the jungle is so dense an autopsy will probably have to be performed on the spot.

Dr. Frost had been staying with an American friend, 70-year old Frank Smith, in the Mayan village of Santa Ana. The village is so isolated that it can only be reached by canoe.

Smith became worried on Sunday when Frost did not return. Frost normally went into the jungle with a guide, but on Sunday he ventured off alone.

Belize is a small country located

east of Guatemala and south of Mexico. It is considered "safe" for Americans to travel to, even though it is relatively close to the hotbed of Central America. Santa Ana is in close proximity to the Guatemalan border. Although Haylock said there were no signs of violence, Dr. Frost's body was decomposing for several days and no conclusions can be made about the circumstances surrounding his death until the autopsy is performed.

For his Ph.D., which he received in 1974 from Oregon State University, Dr. Frost wrote his dissertation on the relationships between man, land, and wildlife in Belize. He also had studied this subject in Costa Rica. Dr. Frost had been with the college since 1976 and was coordinator of the environmental studies program and the college weather station.

There will be a memorial service for Dr. Frost on Thursday, April 28 at noon. It has been tentatively set to be held at the campus weather station. For further information and an updated account of Dr. Frost's death, please contact the School of Social and Behavioral Sciences office at 887-7221.

Help Save a Family

Moran Hem, a former Cal State student, is a refugee who escaped the Cambodian genocide of the last decade. When Moran came to the United States in 1976, he believed himself to be the sole survivor in his family. His father, mother, sister, brothers, and many other relatives were tortured and killed in the strife.

Two years ago he discovered his sister was alive. This past month Moran received a letter from his sister, Sithan, who fled from Cambodia to a refugee camp in Thailand. Sithan and her two small sons are living on the edge of starvation in the camp.

Friends of Moran Hem have started a collection to aid his family. Funds must be wired to Thailand to provide the basic necessities of survival: food, clothing, and medicine. Further monies are necessary to ensure that Sithan and her children will be able to leave Thailand to be reunited with

her brother here.

Without financial assistance, this family faces the prospects of remaining indefinitely in the camp under very harsh conditions, being deported back to Cambodia, or dying in the camp. Time to Vote

How can you take an active part in college government at Cal State San Bernardino? By exercising your right to vote in the Associated Students Elections for 1983-84.

"Election polls will be set up at the main entrance of the Library on April 27 and 28, from 8:00 a.m. until 8:30 p.m.," said Colleen Robinson, Associated Students advisor at CSCSB. "There is definitely more

interest in the elections this year than last year. In fact, last year we only had three candidates running, and all three ran unopposed."

"This year we have 17 candidates running for the various offices on the Associated Students Board of Directors, and the students are really getting involved," Robinson said.

The A.S. President, Vice-President, and Treasurer are the

Executive Officers of the Associated Students Board of Directors, and are ex-officio non-voting members.

The A.S. Board of Directors is the legislative branch of the Associated Students. The seven members on the Board are student positions, with one member coming from each of the seven schools at CSCSB, and each member has a vote on the Board. The Dean of Students serves on the A.S. Board of Directors as an advisor and also has a vote on the Board.

All CSCSB students are members of the Associated Students, but only those students having an Associated Students card are eligible to vote in the campus elections.

"There will be two ballots. One ballot is for the three executive offices, and the other ballot is for the seven legislative offices of the Board," said Colleen. "Each student votes for the three executive offices, and for one of the candidates from the student's school of major.

"The Elections Committee will have computer print-outs at the polls that list individual CSCSB students and the school of major of each student. Names will be verified and checked off the list at the time the student votes," Robinson said.

The A.S. Executive Officers are responsible for carrying out the laws passed by the A.S. Board of Directors. The A.S. President is the chief executive officer and official spokesman for the Associated Students. The A.S. Vice-President is the presiding officer of the A.S. Board of Directors. The A.S. Treasurer assures adherence to the Associated Students' fiscal policies and procedures. This is but a few of the duties of the executive officers.

The A.S. Board of Directors is the legislative branch of the Associated Students and is responsible for

translating student consensus into policy by initiating and passing laws. The A.S. Board also expresses its representative opinion by censure, praise, or suggestion to the administration, faculty, or any other group on campus. The A.S. Board of Directors also reviews and approves the A.S. budget by June 15 prior to each fiscal year beginning on July 1.

"Since there are two schools of major, Education and Undeclared, that have no candidates, we could end up with write-in candidates for those," said Robinson. "However, write-in candidates are allowed for each office of election. A write-in candidate must receive at least twenty-five write-in votes, and if a candidate receives twenty-five write-in votes, he or she is then treated in the same way as a candidate whose name appeared on the printed ballot."

The Associated Students is the student government of the CSCSB campus. All students are members of the Associated Students, and can take a more active role in college government by going to the polls on April 27 and 28 by voting. Think active!

Cal State Band Tops

The 43-member Wind Ensemble from Cal State, San Bernardino performed at the third annual Western States Collegiate Wind Band Festival Monday, April 18 in Fresno.

Fifteen bands were invited to perform, including the host, Cal State Fresno, and a professional ensemble of Fresno Philharmonic musicians. Many of the state's best community colleges participated, as well as universities and colleges such as Cal State, Hayward, San Jose State, the University of Oregon and UCL, according to Keating Johnson of San Bernardino, conductor of the San Bernardino ensemble.

Johnson, who teaches low brass, was tubist with the group, and student Christi Belicki of San

Bernardino was trombone soloist. Roger Rickson of Corona, who conducts the Jazz Ensemble at Cal State, San Bernardino, was guest conductor for the Wind Ensemble during a performance of "The Suite of Miniature Dances" by Applebaum.

"Both nationally recognized authorities in wind-band literature and conducting have rated this group as outstanding among small campuses nationwide," Johnson said.

The Cal State Wind Ensemble has received statewide critical acclaim at past convention appearances, Johnson said. Its guest conductors have included Frederick Fennell of the Eastman School of Music and Robert Reynolds from the University of Michigan.

Intercollegiate Forum

A campuswide forum on intercollegiate athletics will be held from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., Wednesday in the Multipurpose Room of the Student Union. All members of the college community will have an opportunity to express their thoughts about whether intercollegiate athletic competition should be initiated. The time frame will allow staff to use their lunch break to attend a portion of the forum.

The open meetig, to which the press also will be invited, is one of several steps being undertaken by a special task force headed by Dr. Ward McAfee (Social and Behavioral Sciences). Factors being studied are campus and community support, facilities, coaching staff, finance, sports conference participation and scheduling.

The focus now is on NCAA Division III competition, which involves smaller schools such as the University of Redlands and the Claremont Colleges. Sports receiving primary consideration at this time are basketball, soccer, swimming, tennis, volleyball and cross-country for both men and women; women's softball; and men's baseball. Other sports may also be considered.

The task force plans to report its findings to President Evans by early June. If intercollegiate sports were approved, the competition would not begin before the 1984-85 academic year. Dr. John Hatton (Dean of Students) chairs the task force's subcommittee on campus and community support, the group organizing this open forum.
