Run-off Results

The final results are in. Rod Hendry will be the next Cal State San Bernardino A.S. President and Trish Grimes was elected as the next A.S. Treasurer.

The run-offs held May 4 and 5 had a 1229 (26%) turnout, good in comparison to seven entire past elections. Rod Hendry won 786 or 64% of the votes to Lee Ann Overstreet with 448 or 36%, respectively.

The contest for Treasurer was somewhat closer, with Trish Grimes receiving 652 or 56% to Steve Wood's 509 votes or 44%, respectively.

This years elections were the hottest contested in memory. Posters caught every eye and the candidates almost over-stepped themselves in trying to gain public notice and votes.

All involved seemed to have breathed a sigh of relief when the results were announced last Thursday night in the Student Union.

Poets to Read May 11

Two award-winning American poets, Mark Strand, the first recipient of the Edgar Allen Poe Prize, and Charles Wright, twice runner-up for the Pulitzer Prize, will read selections from their works Wednesday, May 11 at Cal State, San Bernardino.

The free reading will begin at 8 p.m. in the Recital Hall of the Creative Arts Building.

Currently at the University of Utah, Strand has taught at Columbia, Princeton and Harvard. He has been a Fulbright scholar to Italy and received grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Rockefeller Foundation and the Guggenheim Foundation.

In 1974, Strand received the Academy of American Poets' first Edgar Allen Poe Award and in 1975 received an award from the National Institute of Arts and Letters and the American Academy of Arts and

Letters. Most recently, he received the fellowship of the Academy of American poets for "distinguished poetic achievement."

Wright, who also is a recipient of the Edgar Allen Poe Award, teaches at the University of California at Irvine. He holds an MFA from the University of Iowa.

His *Selected Poems* appeared in 1980. Strand currently is working on a short fiction to be published by Alfred Knopf and on a book about contemporary realist painters.

His awards include the PEN Translation Prize for his translation of Eugino Montale's *The Storm and Other Things*. In 1982, his book *Southern Cross* was nominated for the Pulitzer Prize in poetry. In 1983, he won the American Book Award for his book, *Country Music* which also was nominated for the Pulitzer.

Committee for Clubs Advises, Coordinates

Have you ever wondered what the M.E.C.H.A. club and the Wood-pushers Anonymous have in common? Well, it's another group called the Committee for Clubs.

The Committee for Clubs consists of three elected A.S. Activities Committee persons and three appointed persons selected by club representatives.

The main purpose of the Committee for Clubs is "to advise, coordinate, and provide financial assistance for the activities of campus clubs", according to the Rules and Procedures. This means that if a club wants to organize a fund-raiser, but they lack the initial funds to begin with, they request help from the Committee for Clubs. For example, when a club decides to raise funds through a donuts-and-coffee

sale in front of the library, the initial funds for supplies came from the Committee for Clubs.

This committee began in April, 1978 and is still going strong. The officers meet once a week to consider requests. "Membership in the Committee for Clubs shall be open to all duly recognized student organizations." The only restrictions are that funds can't be used to purchase alcohol, and that the A.S. may request a certain reimburse-

ment, usually 30%, not to exceed the original amount of the request. Amounts requested usually don't exceed 200 dollars.

So, next time you sink your teeth into a jelly donut that you just bought from a club member outside the library, remember that the club probably received some help in the beginning from the Committee for Clubs.

Robert Judge Selected

Robert Judge of San Bernardino is one of 12 students selected from more than 500 applicants for the California State Assembly Fellowship Program in 1983-84.

The son of Dr. Joseph and Janet Judge of Ridgecrest and a graduate of Ramona High School in Riverside, Judge will begin his work for the State Legislature in August, assisting an assemblyman in the writing and presentation of legislation through June 1984.

Applicants must have completed their bachelor's degree by the time the fellowship begins. In addition to grade-point average, honors and basis of his performance during two oral interviews, one in Long Beach and a six-hour session in Sacramento.

Judge, who plans to enter law school after his fellowship, will complete a bachelor of arts degree this spring in economics and political science, as well as a certificate in international relations.

He has been active in the Economics Club and Political Science Council at Cal State and chaired a delegation to the Model United Nations. He also is president of the International Club and a member of the college's Instructionally Related

Programs Committee and Phi Kappa Phi, the national honor society.

Judge studied at Waseda University in Japan last academic year under the California State University Program.

He has held an internship as legislative analyst with the San Bernardino Area Chamber of Commerce and tutored in the Equal Opportunity Program at the college. Currently, Judge is marketing director for Sunworld Airport Van Service in San Bernardino.

Speaker on Computer Equipment for Blind

On Wednesday May 18th, Alan Crafton will speak on computer equipment adapted for the blind. Mr. Crafton is from Telesensory Systems Incorporated. He will demonstrate three impressive pieces of adaptive equipment: the VERSABRAILLE machine, a system which permits spoken taped matter to be converted into Braille; the new VERT system, a method of obtaining computer readouts in Braille; and the OPTICON, which transforms printed words into alphabetic (not Braille) raised dot version. Mr. Crafton will have films and will schedule hands on time for use of the equipment.
