## MULTIPLE SUBJECTS EARLY CHILDHOOD CREDENTIAL OFFERED

The College has received approval to offer a program in Multiple Subjects with an Early Childhood Emphasis this fall.

This credential will prepare a teacher to work especially with young children; however, as part of the multiple subjects credential it will qualify the individual to teach pre-school through sixth grade, according to Florence Mote, program coordinator.

Teachers already holding a multiple subjects credential would be able, with one quarter of additional course work plus five weeks of full-time student teaching, to earn the early childhood option.

CSCSB is one of the few colleges or universities in the Southland which offers the option in early childhood education. The College previously offered a similar program under the Fisher Bill, now supplanted by this new credential, authorized under the Ryan Act and approved by the California Commission for Teacher Preparation and Licensing.

THERON PACE TO WORK WITH  
E.O.P. AND PLACEMENT OFFICES

Theron Pace, College Housing Coordinator since 1969, has resigned that position to work as Educational Opportunities Program Researcher with the E.O.P. Office and as Placement Counselor with the Placement Office, both half-time positions.

As EOP Researcher, a new position funded by the Chancellor's Office and established on all CSUC campuses, he will set up a research design for collecting data on EOP students, past and present, to be used for future analysis.

As Placement Counselor he will work with the Placement Officer in developing occupational materials for graduate career employment. In this area he will assist with career monographs of majors to determine the career possibilities within each major. He will also work with video tape, exploring it as a means of presenting occupational opportunities, and assist with publication of the CSCSB graduate employment bulletin, Job News.

Dr. Pace, who minored in research and statistics at the doctorate level, was Director of Housing at the University of Redlands prior to coming to CSCSB. Here, while serving as the College's first Housing Coordinator, he saw Serrano Village population grow from 150 students occupying four houses to 250 in eight houses this Fall.

IN STUDY ABROAD PROGRAM

Four CSCSB students, selected under the International Programs of CSUC, are studying abroad this fall.

Raul Ceja and John Tarpai will study sociology at the University of Uppsala, Sweden.

Helen LaPointe and Thomas Randolph will spend the school year studying French at the University of Aix-en-Provence near Marseilles.

The students will be given six weeks of intensive language study at their European universities. Credits earned abroad will apply toward their Cal State degrees.

STUART ELLINS RECEIVES  
COYOTE RESEARCH GRANT

Stuart Ellins, Asst. Prof., Psychology, has received a \$4,500 grant from the Los Angeles County Department of Agriculture for the coming year to continue his research on the application of a conditioned taste aversion procedure for reducing coyote predation on sheep in the Antelope Valley.

Dr. Ellins has also completed construction of a coyote compound here on campus where he and psychology students will study the predatory behaviors of coyotes.
