Governor Brown has authorized holidays on Friday, December 24 and Friday, December 31, for state employees, due to both Christmas and New Year's

days falling on Saturdays.

The Friday, December 24 Administrative Holiday already designated by the College Calendar (in-lieu of November 11 holiday) will be observed as scheduled, but instead of using the November 11 in-lieu day, it will become a floating holiday, to be taken at the convenience of employees and departments.
