COMING: Distinguished Lecturer ROLES OF HUMANITIES AND SCIENCE IN PROBLEM SOLVING, LECTURE TOPIC

A lecture by an engineer-educator will deal with society's seeming inability to channel technological developments in directions that

sufficiently meet the broad range of human needs.

Dr. Daniel Rosenthal, Professor Emeritus in Engineering at UCLA, will discuss the importance of combining science and the humanities in solving problems. His talk, entitled "Humanities and Science: A Dual Approach to Problem Solving," will be given Thursday, April 28 at 1 p.m. in PS-10. The College and the public are invited to attend the lecture free of charge.

Dr. Rosenthal obtained his education in civil and aeronautical engineering from the University of Brussels. He taught at UCLA from 1946 to 1967 and has been professor emeritus since then. For three years he was a member of the Department of Humanities and Social Sciences at Harvey Mudd College in Claremont.

His books include "Engineering: Its Role and Function in Human Society." He is currently advisory editor to "Science, Medicine and Man."

Dr. Light, Professor of Psychology at Pitzer College, Claremont, is presented by the Psychology Colloquium. Her lecture will deal with the question: "Why are faces remembered so well for so long, when corresponding names are forgotten relatively quickly?"

# PRESIDENT PFAU NAMED TO STATE AND NATIONAL HUMANITIES COMMITTEES

President John M. Pfau will serve in two new positions relating to the humanities. He has just been appointed to a four-year term on the

California Council for the Humanities in Public Policy, which is a two-year-old organization funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities.

He also is one of six college presidents who will be called to Washington, D.C. later this month by the National Endowment to formulate policy for the NEH's new "Challenge Grants" program. The committee also will be reviewing applicants for grants and awarding a portion of the \$12 million in federal funds available this year for support of the humanities.

In his new state-wide position, Dr. Pfau will serve on the 20-person California Council, which includes educators, labor leaders, businesss executives, writers and housewives.

Currently, President Pfau is chairman of a committee on the humanities for the American Assn. of State Colleges and Universities.

### N.S.F. SEEKS APPLICANTS FOR ROTATOR'S PROGRAM

The National Science Foundation in Washington, D.C. is seeking qualified women, minorities and handicapped individuals for the NSF's Rotator Program. Under this

program individuals who are selected for participation will serve as program directors or associate program directors on the Foundation's staff for periods of one to two years.

A rotator assumes the responsibility for the Foundation's support of scientific research, science education and information exchange in a specified area, through review and evaluation of proposals for support. Desired qualifications are Ph.D. plus six years of successful scientific research experience. However, overall education, background and talents will be assessed.
