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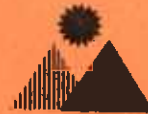

SCIENCE DAY FEATURES DNA RESEARCH AUTHORITY

Dr. Donald Helinski, an internationally recognized authority in the field of DNA research, will be the featured speaker on the College's Science Day program, Thursday, April 20. Invitations have been extended to area high school students, science faculty of community colleges and universities and interested community members.

Dr. Helinski will address the high school visitors at 11 a.m. in the Gymnasium. Earlier in the day students will visit the College science departments to see demonstrations and watch a film on DNA, a 19-minute basic introduction to what the DNA molecule really is.

The College will host an informal reception for visiting science faculty at 3 p.m. in the foyer of the Physical Sciences Building.

Dr. Helinski will speak on "Recombinant DNA--Genetic Engineering" at a 4 p.m. lecture in PS-10. The program is open to all, free of charge.

The author of numerous research papers in the field of molecular biology, Dr. Helinski, professor of biology at UC, San Diego, is currently a member of the National Institute of Health's Committee, responsible for formulating guidelines for recombinant DNA.

His major research interests are molecular characterization of plasmid elements in bacteria and eukaryotic cells and the development of plasmids as vehicles for cloning of genes in bacteria and plant cells.

NEW FORMS COMING FOR ADMINISTRATIVE INTERN PROGRAM

The Chancellor's^{*} Office^{*} has notified the College that it has made some changes in the Administrative Intern Program application forms and that revised forms will be sent to the campus soon. Those applicants who have already submitted forms will be supplied with new ones as soon as they become available.

Completed applications should be submitted to the President's Office by 5 p.m., May 8, 1978. Forms may be obtained in the office of James Thomas, Dean of Academic Administration, AD-189.

Dr. Thomas states that some questions have been raised concerning the placement of interns during the training period. The Chancellor's Office states "Every endeavor will be made to place the successful applicant on a campus near his/her home campus, but this may not be possible in all cases. Interns will be assigned to their home campus only under very unusual or compelling reasons. Therefore, applicants should seriously consider their mobility as a factor in their personal decision."

HUMANITIES AWARD

Arthur A. Moorefield, Professor and Chairman of Music, is one of 12 CSUC faculty selected to receive fellowship awards under a program of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Each of the 19 campuses nominated two faculty members for the awards.

He will receive a stipend of \$2,500 to support study and research this summer which will take him to libraries in Budapest, Bratislava, Dresden and Leipzig, where he will continue his work studying the various manuscripts and musical sources of the 16th century composer, Johannes Galliculus. He will work on volumes 2 and 3 of a four-part series. Volume 1 was published in 1974.
